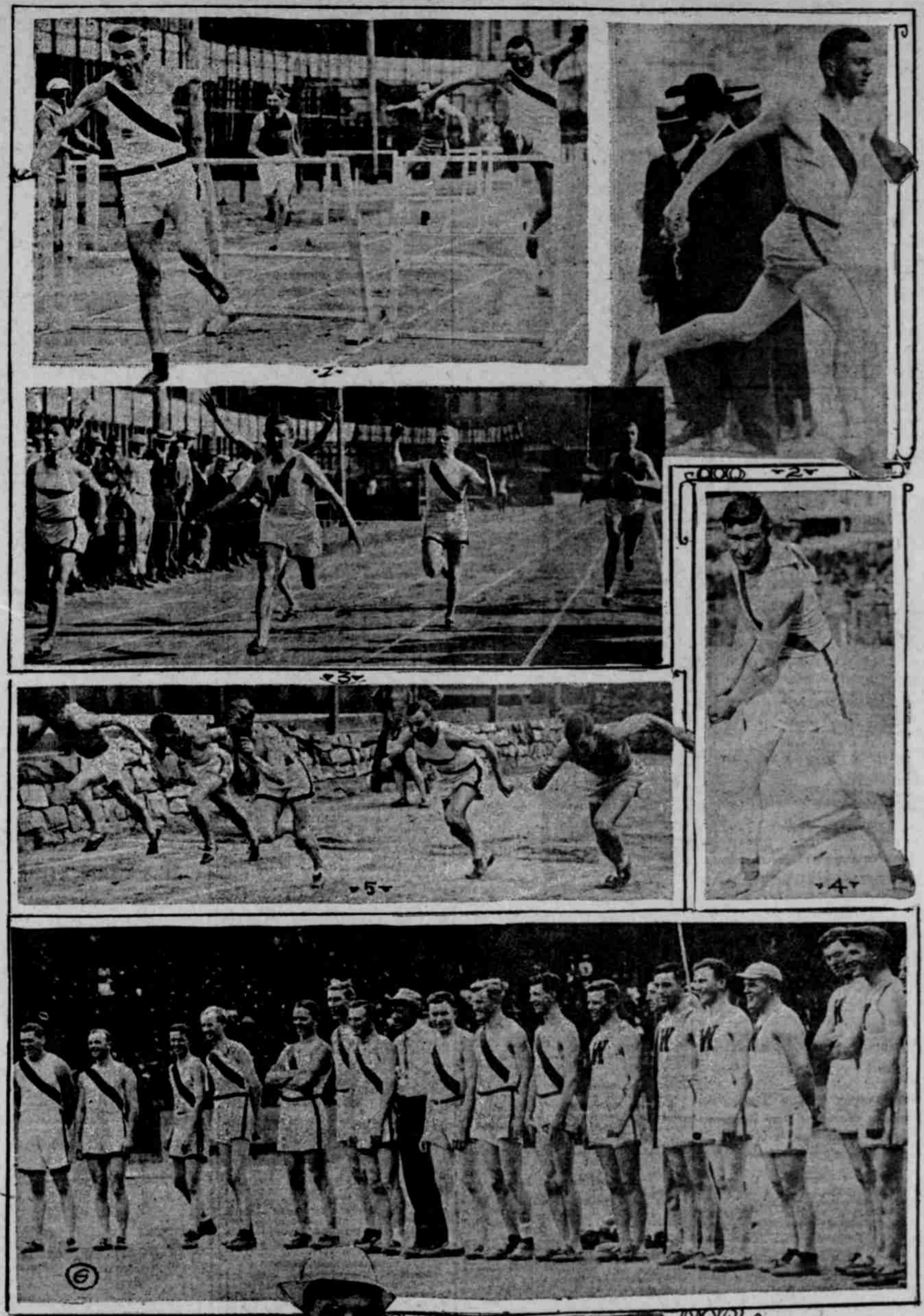

PHILADELPHIA, June 1.—The University of Pennsylvania won the intercollegiate track and field championships on Franklin field this afternoon and thus brought new laurels to "Mike" Murphy, the noted trainer, who will guide the American stars at the coming Olympic games. The Pennsylvanians won by a margin of 10 1/2 points over Cornell, their nearest competitors. The points scored were: Pennsylvania 24, Cornell 17 1/2, Michigan 15, Columbia 13, Harvard 11, Syracuse 12, Dartmouth 11 1/2, Yale 10, Wesleyan 8, Brown 5, Princeton 3, Bowdoin 2, Rutgers 2, Massachusetts Institute of Technology 1.

SHOT MEANT FOR GOON DIP

Keo Was Mistaken for Rich Chinese Is Belief of Seattle Police. SEATTLE, Wash., June 1.—The police are convinced that Charles Kee, the prominent Chicago Chinese who was killed early today as he was leaving the store owned by Goon Dip, Chinese Consul in Seattle, was mistaken for another man, possibly for Goon himself, and that the shooting was the beginning of the long war that has been feared here several months. Until two weeks ago Goon Dip, who is the richest Chinese in the state, being more than a millionaire, would not go on the street unless accompanied by a police bodyguard, but when word was received from San Francisco that all long difficulties had been settled it was believed that there was no further danger of open hostilities in Seattle and the guard was dispensed with. After the tragedy Goon refused to leave the building without a bodyguard. The police have had much difficulty obtaining information from the Chinese and have been unable to fasten suspicion on anyone. They are investigating the activities of members of the Hop Sing tong, which has its Seattle headquarters only two doors from the scene of the crime. It was this tong with which O. Sem, the pretty Portland woman was identified when the body of Selb King was found in a trunk at the King-street passenger station several months ago. The body of Charles Kee will be sent to Chicago for burial. James Chase, a commercial traveler for a New York house, told the police that he had known Kee for 15 years. He said Kee was a prominent worker in the Baptist Church in Chicago, where he was noted for his acts of charity among his own people. He had a wife and several children in Chicago. Before entering the employ of the Northern Pacific Railway, Kee was an interpreter in the United States Immigration Service.

ELOPERS ARE SEPARATED

Girl Is Caught by Officer—Boy Flees Into Brush Under Fire. WALLAWA, Or., June 1.—(Special.)—Ple Norris, the 17-year-old girl who two weeks ago was induced to leave her home because of parental objection to her marriage at Elgin to T. Hobson, was captured today in a brush near last evening by Deputy Constable Fred Hoshens. When the arrest was made Hobson broke and ran into the brush. Constable Hoshens followed him at close times with a .38-caliber revolver. Hobson has been seen three times while crossing from one patch of brush to another, trying to make his escape to the Idaho line. A posse of ranchers and cowboys is in pursuit and is expected to capture the fugitive before night. His marriage is in the part of spite after her hardships in the mountains and will be taken to her home in Elgin on tomorrow's train.
