

TYPIST, ONCE RICH, ASKS FOR DIVORCE

Financier's Wife Will Be
Happy on \$18 a Week When
She Knows She Is Free.

GEMS SOLD TO PAY DEBTS

No Word Received From James McFarland Gummy Since Day Two
Years Ago When He Flew,
Owing Friends \$100,000.

PHILADELPHIA, June 3.—(Special.)—Once a social leader of what is termed the "horsey" set here and in Atlantic City, but now working as a typist at \$18 a week, Mrs. Sophia D. Gummy declares that when she gets her divorce from James McFarland Gummy she will be happier than she has been in all the two years of uncertainty she has suffered since her husband left her and his creditors. Gummy was a financier and "high roller." He owed \$100,000, nearly all to personal friends, when he disappeared. Mrs. Gummy refused for a long time to believe that he had left her, though she admitted he might have planned to desert those who had money coming to them. But now that the die has been cast and she has decided to get a legal separation, her mind is at rest.

Gummy, who was the head of J. H. Gummy & Co., real estate operators, with offices at Broad and Walnut streets, disappeared during the night preceding Thanksgiving, 1910. He left his wife with numerous creditors to face. She faced them by disposing of her jewelry and paying as many of his debts as she was able.

Jewels Sold to Pay Debts.
Until a year ago Mrs. Gummy refused to believe that she had been deserted. She declared that even though her husband had run away from his financial obligations she did not think he had run away from her.

After she had sold her jewelry to pay some of her husband's debts, incurred on her account, one of her family friends informed Mrs. Gummy that if she would learn stenography she would get her position. She took a course in stenography and typewriting and he kept his word. Daily for the last year she has reported at a large office here, taken dictation and done her work well. Last week Mrs. Gummy decided that her husband was gone for good and that she wanted her freedom. She said today that when the decree was granted she would have the first peace of mind she has known in two full years.

Since Gummy disappeared on Thanksgiving nearly two years ago his wife has not heard a word from him. Following Gummy's disappearance the crash came, and it was found that he owed more than \$100,000 to his personal friends.

First Wife Obtains Divorce, Too.
Gummy's first wife, Jennie Carrick Gummy, obtained a divorce from him in 1905. Almost immediately he remarried by marrying Mrs. Sophia D. Robertson, the widow of one of his close friends.

The second Mrs. Gummy immediately took her place as a social leader, especially among the "horsey" set here and in Atlantic City, where she made her home in the Fall for nearly three years following her marriage.

Mrs. Gummy persuaded her husband to buy some splendid stone and rubies in the New York and Philadelphia shows and swept the boards at Atlantic City.

CHURCH WOULD COLONIZE

Members Desire to Deflect Immigration to This Section.

SALEM, Or., June 3.—(Special.)—To direct emigration from the Middle West and East to this section of the United States, instead of allowing it to go across the Canadian border, is one of the plans suggested by individual members of the 33rd annual Portland classis of the Reformed Church of the United States, which is in session here.

Delegates are present from Oregon, Washington and California. While the classis, as a whole, has not placed its stamp of approval on this plan, it is bringing religion to bear on the colonization question, the majority of the individual members has evolved a plan which will mean the securing of large tracts for this purpose. One of these tracts will be in Southwest Washington, another west of Portland, on the Pacific Railway & Navigation lines and a third on the Oregon Electric between Albany and Eugene.

The classis selected as officers for the year: Rev. William G. Lienkemper, Salem, president; Rev. E. W. Wyse, Portland, vice-president; G. Ulrich, Wilsonville, clerk; P. Schild, Quincy, Wash., corresponding secretary.

Reports received indicate a healthy growth in the churches along the Pacific Coast. Four new churches and five parsonages were constructed during the past year.

Only one change in pastorate has so far been recorded, that being the removal of Rev. F. C. Schueller from Lodi, Cal., to Tillamook, this state.

The classis will close tomorrow with a business session.

WHITE SALMON DRIES BUSY

Ranchers Almost a Unit Against Sale of Liquors.

WHITE SALMON, Wash., June 3.—(Special.)—So deeply concerned is the country tributary to White Salmon in the pending election on license, that 98 per cent of the ranchers have petitioned the town to vote against saloons, believing a saloon system detrimental to the best interests of the town and country, especially tending to discourage outsiders from coming here to make homes.

Twice the ranchers petitioned against saloons in Underwood, at the mouth of the White Salmon and won out, and they are using all their influence to prevent the granting of licenses in White Salmon at the election June 11. Indications are that the town will vote dry. Should it vote for licenses it will be the only wet town in Kittitas County.

Washington Pioneer Passes.

ASTORIA, Or., June 3.—(Special.)—Mrs. Theresa Schwegler, wife of Christian Schwegler and one of the pioneer residents of the Deep River, Washington, district, died here Monday, after an extended illness. Mrs. Schwegler was a native of Switzerland, 49 years of age, and left a widower and four children, all of whom reside in this city.

NEW MAYOR TAKES PLACE

CHRIS KNOELL IN OFFICE
AND FERGUSON OUT.

Houquiam's Position Changed as to
Plans of I. W. W. When Administration Is Altered.

HOQUIAM, Wash., June 3.—(Special.)—This city Wednesday saw a new Mayor inaugurated, the second since it adopted a commission form of government.

Chris Knoell, elected at the recall election Monday, took his seat and the official career of the Rev. Harry Ferguson, former Baptist preacher, came to an end.

Mr. Ferguson held office slightly less than 10 months, and his recall was the direct outgrowth of his outspoken sympathy with the I. W. W. and his activity in support of that organization during the recent troubles in this city, when, during a strike at local mills, the citizens took matters into their hands and organized a special police which assured protection to men who wished to go to work and who had been threatened by the I. W. W. leaders.

One of the first official acts of the City Commission, after the new Mayor had taken office, was to remove C. J. Cogan as Police Judge, and to appoint in his place Justice of the Peace Lamb. Cogan was particularly active in the interests of Ferguson during the campaign and also was held to be a sympathizer with the I. W. W.

The results of the removal of Ferguson from office have become apparent in the changed plans of the I. W. W. as concerned Houquiam and the entire Northwest. Plans had already been made by the leaders to make this the Northwest headquarters for the trouble-planned for this summer.

A general strike in the mills and logging camps of the Northwest in August is the hope of the agitator chiefs, and they are now at work to that end. They had planned to carry on the operations and direction of the plan from this city, but the change in Mayor has caused a change in their plans and they are now preparing to work from Seattle and Centralia, the latter place to have the headquarters intended for Houquiam.

AUTOISTS HURT IN SLIDE

Bruises and Broken Bones Suffered
on Trip to Mount Rainier.

TACOMA, June 3.—(Special.)—J. Lund, proprietor of the West End Hotel, suffered a broken rib and a bruised hip; Fred Smith, 1107 South D street, sustained cuts about the head, and an injured foot; August Cuitum, a real estate dealer, bruised about the body, and J. Johnson, of Minneapolis, escaped with minor bruises when an automobile in which they were riding was hurled 50 feet into a gully on Mountain Rainier road Thursday.

Cuitum was driving the car near Longmire Springs, where there was a fresh landslide. The edge of the bank gave way as the machine reached it. The injured were taken to Longmire and reached Tacoma today.

The auto was wrecked.

\$3 SCALE IS HOPELESS

SPOKANE WAGES ON CITY
WORK DUE TO DROP TO \$2.50.

Commissioner Coates Proposes to
Take Matter to Courts Again.

Property Owners File Claims.

SPOKANE, Wash., June 3.—(Special.)—While still withholding his written opinion on the subject, Corporation Counsel H. C. Stephens has informed the city commissioners that there was practically no hope of the city being able to enforce the \$3 wage scale even on work done under general taxation.

This means that the city probably will have to reduce the wages to the "going price," about \$2.50 on all municipal work where common labor is employed.

In spite of this the city has signed a contract with M. C. Murphy for building a new city hall after Murphy signed an affidavit to the effect that the wage ordinance, although a part of his contract, will not apply, as he will use no common labor.

Commissioner Coates proposes a scheme to avoid the court's decision and will enforce the \$3 scale with the idea of getting the matter before the court again for another decision based on different grounds.

Numerous property owners filed claims yesterday for rebate on past city work done, on the ground that they should benefit by the court's decision in validating the ordinance as applying to assessment work.
