

SINALOA IS UNDER MILITARY RULE

Retreating Rebels Declared to Have Left Dead and Hanged Prisoners.

MANY ACCEPTING AMNESTY

Burning of Bridges Makes It Impossible to Send Aid to Federals in South—Mines Are Forced to Suspend.

MAZATLAN, Mexico, June 15.—The entire State of Sinaloa virtually has been placed under military rule. Congress Thursday proclaimed General Jose Delgado governor, and his chief of staff, Colonel Alberto Gotari, was made prefect of Mazatlan.

General Ojedas has returned from a campaign in the south and reports that Panuco was taken on June 8 after two hours of brick fighting. About 300 men composed General Ojedas' command. He said the rebels in retreating from Panuco left many dead in the streets and that the prisoners were hanged.

According to General Ojedas, the mines at Panuco have been forced to suspend operation and hundreds have been thrown out of employment. Not more than half a dozen persons remain in town, 1500 having followed the federal column toward Concordia. General Ojedas said along the roads were hundreds of men walking to Mazatlan to find work. This, it is expected, will aid seriously to the gravity of the situation here.

It was impossible to send out a train to aid the refugees and federals in the south, as bridges have been burned to within eight miles of Mazatlan.

Many rebels are accepting General Delgado's offer of amnesty to all who surrender within 15 days.

REBELS WILL SEIZE CATTLE

Terrazas Family to Lose Property Worth \$1,000,000.

CHIHUAHUA, Mexico, June 15.—The rebels decided yesterday to confiscate all the cattle of the famous Terrazas family. This will add \$1,000,000 to their depleted treasury.

Generals Del Toro and Rojas, of the rebel vanguard, camped today a short distance north of La Cruz.

SHASTA KILLS WOMAN, 64

Mrs. Mary Shepherd, Formerly of Canby, Instantly Killed.

OREGON CITY, Or., June 15.—(Special.)—Struck by the Shasta Limited traveling at 30 miles an hour early today afternoon, Mrs. Mary Shepherd, 64, wife of John Shepherd, 74, an employee of the Willamette Pulp & Paper Company, was thrown 46 feet and instantly killed.

Mrs. and Mr. Shepherd have been residents for a year of Pulp Sliding, three miles from here, coming here from Canby. Mrs. Shepherd today started to walk to Oregon City to see a Canby friend on the train. She walked on the new close to the tracks, it was raining, and, as she was carrying an umbrella, her view of the approaching Shasta Limited was cut off and she apparently did not hear it, or the yells of several workmen who saw her and called out a warning. A beam on the front of the engine struck the woman, and the train was stopped immediately. An inquest will be held tomorrow morning.

5 DEATHS LAID TO WOMAN

Two Husbands and Three Children May Have Been Poisoned.

CHICAGO, June 15.—Mrs. Louise Lindorf, 46 years old, was arrested yesterday pending investigation of the deaths of her two husbands and three children, one of whom, a son, died yesterday. The five are said to have carried insurance amounting to \$10,000.

Henry Kuby, a roomer at the Lindorf home, also was taken into custody. The police said it was improbable that a charge would be placed against him.

The arrests are a result of a chemical examination of the viscera of Arthur Lindorf, 46 years old. Symptoms of arsenical poisoning were observed in all the cases.

2000 HARVARD MEN DINE

A. L. Mills, of Portland, Is Speaker at New York Banquet.

NEW YORK, June 15.—Two thousand sons of John Harvard, members of 57 Harvard clubs throughout the world, dined last night amid a wealth of crimson decorations in the ballroom of the Hotel Astor.

Joseph H. Choate, of the class of '52, presided. Theodore Roosevelt, '80, was to have been one of the speakers, but he had hurried away to Chicago. The speakers included President Abbott Lawrence Lowell, of Harvard; A. L. Mills, a Portland, Or., banker, who is an over-seer of the university, and General Leonard Wood.

FLOOD RUINS CROPS

Colorado River Gives Rise to Disturbing Rumors.

PRIVATE DIKES CRUMBLE

Alarming Report That New Channel Is Being Cut That Will Carry Stream Into Salton Sea Gains Circulation.

NEEDLES, Cal., June 15.—Alarming reports that the Colorado River had begun to cut a new channel that would carry it into the Salton Sea sink were brought to Parker last night by river men. The river continued to rise all night and although it was believed that the high-water mark had been reached, there was no prospect for a subsidence of the flood for at least two weeks.

The report brought to Parker was that private dikes and in some places great portions of the Government work had begun to crumble and that thousands of acres of rich land were already under water. In the Mojave Valley valuable alfalfa crops and other farm products were reported totally ruined.

On the Arizona side of the river the town of Lincolnville has been entirely abandoned.

In Needles the Santa Fe Railroad launched more power boats today to strengthen the brush and rock dam in an effort to protect the city.

IMPERIAL VALLEY AID ASKED

Taft Asks Congress to Appropriately \$1,250,000 to Protect.

WASHINGTON, June 14.—In a special message President Taft today asked Congress to appropriate \$1,250,000 to protect the Imperial Valley of California against emergencies of floods from the Colorado River while negotiations for the protection of that territory are pending with Mexico.

One million dollars was given by Congress in 1910 for the protection of the Imperial Valley and a special board in 1911 reported that about \$1,000,000 more was needed to complete it. In his message President Taft pointed out that questions regarding the Colorado River concern Mexico as well as the United States, but adds that there are no prospects that negotiations with Mexico can be concluded before the adjournment of Congress.

He urged the immediate appropriation, to be used principally in the construction of levees and revetments along the Colorado River and to be expended under his direction.

WOMAN ATTACKS ASQUITH

Suffragette Tries to Tear Epaulettes From His Coat.

LONDON, June 15.—While Premier Asquith was holding an official reception last night in honor of the king's birthday, a well-dressed suffragette tried to tear the epaulettes off the Premier's coat. Mrs. Asquith tried to rescue her husband from the unruly woman, but the woman dragged the suffragette away from the Premier and ejected her from the building.

Two minutes later a pale-faced youth was introduced to the Premier. He took hold of Mr. Asquith's arms roughly and shouted something. He also was immediately thrown out of the room.

According to some reports of the occurrence, the woman beat Premier Asquith over the head with her fan.

MRS. ISMAY AIDS NEEDY

Titanic Disaster Reveals Character of American Woman.

LONDON, June 15.—(Special.)—The tragedy of the Titanic has turned the limelight on an American society woman whom the gossips had hitherto left in peace. Outside her immediate circle of friends, Mrs. Ismay, the daughter of George Schieffelin, of New York, has always managed to escape the wide publicity that is extended to many of her countrywomen in England.

This is not because she holds herself unbecomingly aloof or in any way poses as a superior person, but because she dislikes display and has always condemned what Marie Corelli calls the "vulgarity of wealth."

While she possesses every facility for coming into the spotlight, she prefers to remain absorbed in her domestic responsibilities. But the poor record of the Titanic disaster has placed her in the limelight.

Although she spends part of the "season" in London, she prefers the quiet seclusion of her home on the banks of the Dee near Birkenhead. While her husband is devoted to all sports of automobile, golf, shooting and racing, she prefers a quiet day's fishing on the well-stocked waters near her residence. She dislikes the racetrack, and is an ardent crusader against gambling.

AMERICAN PEER TO JOUST

Knight in English Tournament Is Great Grandson of Maryland.

LONDON, June 15.—(Special.)—The knights who are to joust in shining armor when the Eglinton tournament takes place this season at Earl's court have had more than one practice bout in the difficult feat of knocking one another off their horses without injury to themselves.

Lord Brooke, who will be one of the contestants for the smile of the Queen of Beauty, is remotely connected by marriage with the United States. Brooke is the only daughter of Sir William Eden, Charles I granted a patent of the whole of the colony of Maryland to George Calvert, first Lord Baltimore.

The sister of the last Lord Baltimore, who died in 1771, married Sir Robert Eden, who was Governor of Maryland. The present Sir William Eden is his great grandson, and is still described as of Maryland, North America, as well as West Auckland, Durham, the actual home of the family.

Remarkably Strange Coincidence Reported From Dublin.

Mysteriously Disappeared in Ireland.

The Irish relic was the property of the late Dr. John MacHale, the famous Archbishop of Tuam, to whom it came direct from St. Peter's, Rome. Subsequently it was in the possession of his sister until her death, and then passed on to a nephew, who resides in County Mayo.

The brick was regarded with such reverence by the MacHale family that only last year they refused a considerable sum of money from an agent, acting on behalf of J. Pierpont Morgan, for its possession. It was carefully stored in a wooden box, and is known to have been secure in its place last February, when it was on view for the benefit of a relative who was on a visit from Los Angeles.

The report of the disappearance at the Chicago Coliseum treasure aroused the interest of MacHale, and on looking into his box a few days ago he was astounded to find his brick gone. It would not be a difficult matter to commit a robbery of this kind in an isolated village in Mayo, because in the early Spring the members of the family are away from the house most of the day, and it is a common practice to leave the doors unlocked—a proof of the local honesty that is seldom unjustified.

FLAG DAY IS OBSERVED

PATRIOTS HONOR BIRTH OF STARS AND STRIPES.

Children and Grizzled Veterans Join in Celebration—Tactics of I. W. W. Are Denounced.

In honor of the American flag, which was formally adopted by Congress just 135 years ago, patriotic organizations of Portland held flag day meetings and demonstrations in various parts of the city Friday, in which veterans of three wars and hundreds of children took part.

The main programme was at the Knights of Pythias Hall, at 8 P. M., when Spanish War veterans, members of the Grand Army of the Republic, Mexican War Veterans, Company B, of the Oregon National Guard, and many others took part. Patriotic music and addresses formed the main part of the entertainment.

The meeting voiced a strong protest against the practices of the I. W. W., and others of like caliber who oppose and denounce the flag. J. J. Kennedy, chairman of the Spanish War Veterans committee, spoke against this form of anarchy, and urged those present to join in a general protest against the meetings.

Steps were taken to organize a flag association. Donald MacGillivray, a member of the Oregon National Guard, gave an address on the subject of flag associations in the East, and what they are doing, and urged such an organization in the West.

PRIESTS GOING TO PEOPLE

French Cures Breaking Away From Isolated Lines.

PARIS, June 15.—A series of interesting articles has recently appeared in a French paper on the thoughts and ideas of the young generation in France. The last article deals with the young priest, and he, too, is a new product. The Separation Act, which deprived the Church of nearly all her property, has given her new energy and a new determination to adapt herself to the world. The seminarist of today is resolved no longer to lead the isolated life of his predecessor. If the people will not come to him he will go to the people.

M. Jampy, the young curé of the Basile, in the Pyrenees, whose experiences are recounted in the article, is said to be the type of the young cleric of today. M. Jampy lives in a district composed of peasants and miners, and in order to understand their lives he studies mining and agriculture, and having also studied medicine, he has become, in a few degrees, the parish doctor. In the towns the young curés interest themselves in all that concerns the life of the working people, and being obliged to add to their slender resources they have in many cases become working men themselves.

IVEAGH HELPS UNIVERSITY

Trinity College, Dublin, Gets \$50,000 for Geology and Mineralogy.

DUBLIN, June 15.—(Special.)—Lord Iveagh's munificence has laid yet another obligation on the University of Dublin. Ten years ago the deficiency of the scientific equipment of Trinity College was brought before the public and an appeal for funds was issued.

Lord Iveagh, who has been a member of the University Council since 1902, has now given the university a further gift of \$50,000. This is to be devoted to the benefit of the department of geology and mineralogy, and is to be devoted partly to the payment of research assistance and partly to the cost of apparatus.
