Professor Sharp is the author of "Wild Life Near Home," "Roof and Meadow," "The Lay of the Land," "The Future of the Fields" and "A Watcher in the Woods."

GEARHART IS RENDEZVOUS

Dr. Boyd, of Portland, to speak at Y. W. C. A. Conference.

Under the auspices of the National Board of the Y. W. C. A. of the United States, the Northwest conference will be held at Gearhart Park from June 25 to July 3.

The opening session will be held Tuesday evening, June 25. About 150 delegates will assemble, some 30 or 40 from Portland.

Originally, Miss Elizabeth Boles will assist, and Miss Cutler will also be present to give the benefit of her advice.

Both sessions on Sunday, June 30, will be preached by Rev. W. B. Hanson, pastor First Baptist Church. A series of lectures will be delivered by Rev. John H. Boyd, and also two special lectures. Part of his address will deal with mental deficiency.

Other prominent men and women will deliver lectures and addresses throughout the week, and classes will be held.

Chief among these are the series of lectures to be given by President Penrose of Whitman College, Washington. Dr. Edward Lincoln Smith, of Seattle, will give a course of addresses on "The Decisive Hour of Christian Missions."

Miss Alice Hawthorne, of Tacoma, Wash., well known for her religious instruction, will teach a course in the conservation of National Ideals.

Miss Hawthorne, first of all, instructs a normal class, and then each member of the class gives a circle of her own. Among Portland women who will have classes are Miss Jesse Nottingham and Miss Mary E. Ward.

Rev. Raymond C. Brooks, of Walla Walla, will have a class on the "Book of the Acts," and Mrs. B. A. Thaxter will take up the question of "Comparative Religion," using the book of Robert Speer, "Light of the World."

All arrangements have been completed by the Ancient Order of Hibernians to hold a big picnic July 4 in conjunction with Holy Cross Parish on the beautiful grounds of Columbia University, the proceeds to be donated toward the completion of the Holy Cross Institute.

There will be a baseball game between the Knights of Columbus and Hibernian teams, a tug-of-war between the single and married Hibernians, and something new and novel in the way of amusement will be the tilting canoe contest, of which a splendid view can be had from the grounds. All kinds of games with suitable prizes for the winners have been arranged for, and there will be dancing afternoon and evening. Price of Diamonds Rising.

(Wall Street Journal.)

Leopold Stern, of Stern Brothers & Company, diamond merchants, who have been abroad purchasing rough diamonds in the Amsterdam market, returned Friday on the Lusitania. Mr. Stern said: "Diamonds are constantly advancing in price. Only last week the Beers advanced the price of rough diamonds in the Amsterdam market 5 per cent, coming on the heels of several previous advances of greater or less amount. This makes diamonds at present very dear, compared with a year or two ago. Reason for the continuous advance is that demand far exceeds supply, and the South African merchants seem to be able to get almost any price they ask for good-sized material in the rough."

Stern says that the increased demand comes not only from this country, but from England and France in Europe, and also some Asiatic countries. "The American cut diamonds," he says, "are in demand the world over. Diamonds finished in this country are generally recognized to be the best cut and finished work of the sort obtainable."

PORTLAND CLUB AGENT

COLLECTING EXHIBITS FOR LAND SHOWS BIG TASK.

Commercial Organizations of All Parts of Oregon Asked to Send in Products.

The Portland Commercial Club has undertaken the agency of collecting exhibits of the agricultural resources of the state to be used this year in the exhibits at all of the big land shows in the East. On railroad exhibit cars, at the dry farming exhibit places east of the Rocky Mountains.

A call has been sent to commercial organizations of all parts of Oregon urging them to send in exhibits at once. Otherwise their cities and districts will not receive representation in the great exhibits in the East. Grains, grasses, vegetables and small fruits are wanted for the exhibits immediately.

Following are, in substance, the instructions for preparing the exhibits that have been sent with the requests for assistance in assembling them:

Grain, grasses, clover and alfalfa are to be gathered in uniform lengths and bound in sheaves four inches through. Ten sheaves are asked from each locality contributing to the exhibit, since they are to be distributed at land shows in many different places.

Each sheaf and other entry is to be tagged with the name of the grower and the locality where it was grown.

Wash. medals or other prizes that may be won for them may be sent to the party who is really entitled to them, after having been exhibited in Portland after the land show season has closed.

Threshed grain samples can be assembled later in the season, but the Commercial Club is particularly eager to complete its sheaf exhibits now.

Vegetable and small fruit exhibits are also required at this time.

The Portland Commercial Club will co-operate with the other commercial organizations of the state in every way, in corresponding with farmers in various districts and by taking charge of the exhibits when they have been assembled and sent to Portland. By this extensive method of working, it is hoped that arrangements may be made for advertising more widely than has ever before been done the agricultural possibilities of this state.

FIFIELD WILL SEE PUTER

Minneapolis Man Must Positively Identify Accused, Say Attorneys.

Albert Fifield, of Fifield, Fletcher & Fifield, the Minneapolis law firm which S. A. D. Puter is alleged to have evaded out of \$2300, will arrive in Portland Tuesday to either identify Puter, who is still in the County Jail as the guilty man or admit that a mistake has been made.

Detective Jim Howard, of the Minneapolis police department, and Deputy County Attorney Flynn, of Hennepin County, Minnesota, in which Minneapolis is located, reached here yesterday with an indictment charging "A. L. Meta, whose true name is to be grand jury unknown," with fraudulent obtaining the \$2300. Neither of these two is able to identify Puter, hence the call for Fifield.

It will require a positive identification to overcome the proof which we have that Puter purchased a ticket in Portland for Minneapolis on May 4.

while the fraud is alleged to have occurred May 2," said John H. Stevenson, one of Puter's attorneys. "The picture by which the identification was made looks no more like Puter looks now than I do."

Mr. Stevenson said that his client probably will remain in the County Jail until the question has been decided one way or the other.

"In Municipal Court they have taken to considering that the term bail bond means cash and they are holding Mr. Puter for \$5000," said the attorney. "This is a large sum of money to raise under the circumstances."

KLAMATH DITCH LAID OUT

Bids for Excavation Will Be Asked About July 1

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., June 22.—(Special.)—Formal notification has been received by the local headquarters of the Reclamation Service that specifications for the guidance of bidders on the construction work entailed in the building of the second unit of Poe Valley lateral of the Klamath project will be ready for distribution about July 1.

The contract will be mainly for excavation work, as the Government intends to do all structural work by force account. The excavation work includes the digging of the north and south Poe Valley laterals, which will water that valley; the Nuss Lake lateral, which will irrigate the territory between Olene and Nuss Lake, and the Griffiths lateral, which will have its source at the Lost River diversion dam near Stukal Mountain and carry water to the Merrill country.
