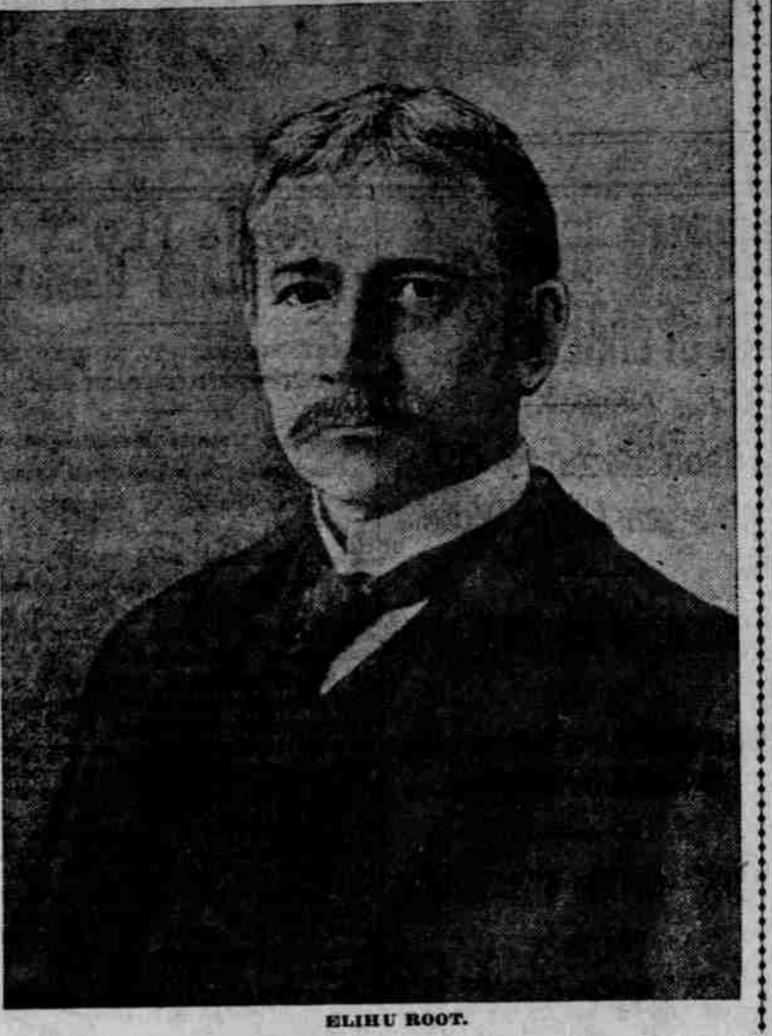
Chairman of Republican Convention Looms as Leading Figure.

RULINGS CHECK PROTESTS

Subduing of "Bill" Flinn One of Features of Sessions—Fairness of Rulings Wins Friends Despite Bitter Fight.

"Boss" Flinn Soon Subdued. The first feat accomplished by Chairman Root was to take the ginger out of "Bill" Flinn, leader of the Pennsylvania delegation.

While Roosevelt was handling the gavel Flinn had mounted his chair three times, and had made a number of roars and protests that sounded like a steam callope playing in a boiler factory.

Soon after the election of Root Flinn unleashed another wild yell that brought Root to the front of the platform, gavel in hand, with the declaration that unless Flinn ceased his disturbance he would be removed from the hall.

From that moment Senator Root was master of all situations. He sat in his chair, a monument of quiet dignity, in announcing his decision to order Flinn to be silent.

Ordinarily that was enough, but in case it failed, Chairman Root demonstrated that he was not to be trifled with by fixing his eye coldly on an obstreperous delegate and warning him specifically.

line where he should be called to order. "I ruled Senator Root, with significant emphasis on the word 'yet,' which brought a round of cheering from delegates and galleries.

At this the Pennsylvania contingents became frenzied and, jumping to their chairs, they waved their fists and shrieked epithets at the speaker.

The galleries were still applauding when Flinn leaped upon the chair again and shouted that he had a point of order to make.

While, strictly speaking, there can be no such thing as a minority report, he began when he was interrupted by an outbreak of jibes, jeers and groans from the Roosevelt delegates and the Roosevelt adherents in the galleries.

When the California case was up and Flinn was making one of his characteristic speeches, dragging in Abe Ruef and insisting that Ruef was a sweet scented geranium compared with some of the politicians in Pennsylvania.

Emphasis Makes Word Significant. A delegate from Pennsylvania, he shouted, "and I make the point of order that the speaker should confine himself to the issue."

ALL MAIL SERVICE MAY HALT MONDAY

Hitchcock Says Congress Must Provide Money or Work Will Stop.

NAVY FORCES TO CONTINUE

Unless Appropriation Bill or Relief Resolution Passes Tomorrow All Other Departments Will Cease at Midnight.

WASHINGTON, June 29.—(Special.)—Thousands of mechanics in the Navy yards throughout the United States will go to work Monday morning as usual.

Postmaster-General Hitchcock said this afternoon that he would close his department and the entire mail service of the United States at 12 o'clock Monday night unless an appropriation is made available before that time.

Other Departments to Close. All of the other department heads have said that they will close Tuesday unless money is available.

This gives Congress but one day to pass a joint resolution giving relief under existing laws are made available for the situation which has been brought about by the non-passage of the executive, legislative and judicial appropriation bill.

Relief for July Only. It provides that "all appropriations for the necessary operation of the Government and for the payment of pensions under existing laws are made available for the month of July, unless the regular appropriation provided therefor in bills now pending in Congress shall have been previously made for the coming fiscal year."

It also provides that no Government employ shall receive more money during the coming month of July than he has in the present fiscal year, even though the appropriation bills now pending recommend an increase of salary.

Costello, near St. Johns, owned the hill on his farm. The variety was the Beauty of Hebron. The seed was planted March 4, and the potatoes dug June 29. One hill in the same patch yielded 40 potatoes.
