GOLD HILL, Or., June 28.—(Special.)—The Rogue River run of Chinook salmon is at its height. Fighting upward from the ocean to reach the spawning beds, thousands of fish are reported blocked below the Ament dam.

The fly rod now temporarily gives place to the cane pole and the big spinner baits, which lure 30 pounds or more of fighting fish to battle and occasional capture.

HINDU SEEKS CITIZENSHIP. Applicant Has Master's Degree and Is Scientist of Note.

MARSHFIELD, Or., June 29.—(Special.)—Taraknath Das, who claims to be the first Hindu to seek citizenship in the United States, is still prosecuting his case to secure the coveted honor. The man lives at Bandon and when his application came up Deputy United States District Attorney Johnson came here from Portland to oppose it, stating that the Department of Commerce and Labor was averse to granting citizenship to Hindus. Das says he will persevere. He holds a master of arts degree, was professor in political science and economics at the University of Washington, is a member of the National Geographical Society of Washington, D. C., and claims to be a representative of the Lake Mohonk conference of International Arbitration.
