## PUBLIC PLAYGROUNDS AID IN FIGHT AGAINST JUVENILE CRIME IS THEORY

Los Angeles Man Prepares Map and Figures to Show Truth of Deduction—Honey Bees Are Prolific When Shipped Away on Summer Vacations—Debutantes and Schoolteachers Take Part in Quelling Auto Speeders.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 29.—(Special.)—The importance of playgrounds as an auxiliary in combating juvenile crime is shown graphically by a map and accompanying statistics, which Charles Miller, director of boys' and men's work of the Los Angeles playgrounds, is preparing under the direction of Charles B. Ratt, superintendent of that department.

The map shows that although there were 433 cases of juvenile delinquency in Los Angeles from January 1 to the end of April, there were only 15 cases in districts coming within the sphere of playground influence. This is taken by Mr. Miller as proof that the playgrounds are doing their work thoroughly in keeping down juvenile delinquency, and that the palpable lesson to be adduced is more playgrounds are needed.

Playgrounds—Crime Source. "The sphere of influence of a playground is marked on the map as a circle with a radius of three-quarters of a mile, or a mile and a half in diameter. There are six such circles on the map representing the six playgrounds of Los Angeles, leaving a great area without such circles. This outside area represents that part of Los Angeles which is without playgrounds, and its influence on the child-life of the city is shown by a broad path marked out diagonally across the city in red dots, each of which means the home of a boy or girl arrested for some misdemeanor or crime.

English Education Wanted. Without any attempt to conceal their identity or movements, the members of the party left the railroad station for the home of Carlos F. Smuggling Plot Nipped. Forced to unload its contraband cargo of human freight at an isolated spot on the San Mateo County coast, near the town of Pescadero, the gasoline schooner America has taken to the high seas to avoid seizure by the Government. J. W. McGarvin and Gus McGarvin, prominent boatmen of Long Beach, and owners of the America, are prisoners in the County Jail, having been arrested by immigration officers, charged with conspiracy to smuggle Chinese laborers into the United States. Seventeen half-starved Chinese are also in custody of the authorities. They had been abandoned by the fear-stricken officers and crew of the boat and left to their own devices, without food or

shelter, while the little craft put to sea to avoid detection. According to Charles T. Connell, inspector in charge of the local immigration office, the arrest of the McGarvin brothers is one of the most important effected in this district since the enactment of the Chinese exclusion law. The little boat, it is claimed, sailed from Ensenada, Mexico, two weeks ago, with the Chinese. She was closely observed as she made her way northward, and an attempt to land at Long Beach was abandoned because of this surveillance. Debutantes on Duty. Debutantes, high school girls, matrons, business men, mechanics and school boys are declared to be on duty. The sign of authority is a bit of paper and pencil. 5,000,000 Honey Bees Shipped. Five million honey bees, so well trained and industrious they do not think of demanding a rest or vacation, but work uncomplainingly Summer and Winter, have just been shipped from Southern California points, where they have had employment during the cool months, to Utah, where they will range during the warmer months of Summer. The practice has become pronounced among Utah bee owners of shipping their swarms here in the Autumn, and it is claimed they find the investment profitable. In the East and North bees hibernate during the Winter months and feed upon the honey they have accumulated.

The Utah owners who ship back and forth overcome this by giving their swarms a double shift. It is estimated that the 4500 colonies just shipped back to Utah have produced 337,500 pounds of honey during their California sojourn. For one colony of bees shipped from Utah in the Fall three return in the Spring, owing to the natural increase in the Utah province. The swarms are shipped for the honey gatherers.

## WIFE RETURNS FROM DEAD

Quarrel Ensues With "Widower" and Litigation Begins.

PARIS, June 29.—(Special.)—Some three months ago a Mme. Thomas, wife of a porter at the Hotel Dieu, was admitted as a patient to the hospital which she had found empty. The other day Mme. Thomas was discharged from the Hotel Dieu, and naturally went straight back to her room, which she found empty. "Look here, you donkey, there is your wife, who is as alive as you are," were the words addressed to him by the proprietor. A furious quarrel ensued, as madame seemed very vexed at the mistake, and declared that she would no longer be a wife to him, since he had so quietly made up his mind to bury her before she was dead.

## ROSE BEADS POPULAR AND ARE EASILY MADE

Directions for Making Ornaments Must Be Followed Implicitly to Get Satisfactory Results—Various Colors May Be Produced.

BY LILLIAN TINGLE. THE following directions for making rose beads are given in response to numerous requests. Perhaps some reader may volunteer additional information. When the rose bead fever seizes a victim nothing can be done but provide the necessary recipes and materials and wait in patience for the attack to pass. There is an epidemic in this city at present. Sometimes the attack is a slight one and passes over when some of the beads in question have been seen on other people. Some times it is more acute and the victim not only makes and wears beads herself, but insists upon others doing so. Careful housekeepers and busy mothers have been known to neglect every ordinary duty while they made rose beads. Others have been heard of who made them and put them in the fire when made. This is a warning to those not yet infected. It is chiefly sentiment (anything made from roses must be beautiful) and an exultant sense of making something for nothing that spreads the fever. In the past the beads have sold for a fair price and there are legends of very large prices paid for chains of them. Now they are had from 50 cents up. There is a demand for colored rose beads. Some one asked the other day how to make violet rose beads. How do you make lavender beads?

Some of the commercial colored perfume beads are made from different compositions scented with artificial perfume of the flower from which they are supposed to be made, and colored with aniline or other dyes. Some are painted. For some of the compositions a mould is used, but the ordinary domestic method is to mould the beads quickly in the sun, so as to preserve the color. Rub between the hands to a fine powder. To one-half pound of this powder, add from two to eight ounces of powderedorris root, the maximum quantity being, of course, used for violet beads, and the minimum for rose beads. Take care that the scent of the verbenas or clover is not overpowered by too much orris. Soak about 5 cents worth of gum tragacanth in a little warm water to make a thin jelly, then knead it into the

the pulp, use an enameled pan if dark red or brown beads are preferred and add coloring paste if the tint is not satisfactory. Light shades cannot be obtained by this method.

No. 2—Grind the rose petals, as above, but do not let the pulp stand. Cook at once to a thick mass, stirring constantly. Citric acid (say a tablespoonful, powdered, to a quart of pulp) helps to keep a red or pink tint. If black is wanted, cook in an iron kettle and omit the acid. When nearly cool, add a few drops of oil of rose. When quite cold, turn out the mass and roll into beads, drying on pins, as above. For violet beads, use violet petals and a little acid, but if green, fragrant leaves are used, omit the acid and use a very little baking soda to preserve the color. Some makers of beads by this method add gum tragacanth or gum arabic to give "body" to the pulp, and starch might be used similarly.
