GOSSIP OF THE ARMY POST

The greatest event of the week and the most elaborate field meet ever held in the post was the affair July 4, given in honor of the Vancouver Commercial Club by Colonel George S. Young, commander of the post. The post athletic field was partly surrounded with grandstands and bleachers and the maneuvers were held inside of the quarter-mile race track, except the Roman hurdles and races, which were on the track itself. It is conservatively estimated that there were 15,000 persons crowded from 10 to 20 deep around the field. Many climbed to the roofs of buildings and into trees which were near enough to afford a view. Many Portland guests of officers were noticeable in the grandstands. The best and most spectacular military events seen in the big tournament in the stadium at Tacoma two years ago were given. Perhaps the most spectacular

was the building of a bridge across the field and its destruction later by dynamite. This was a signal of the post's annual event, to rise in the artillery drill grounds and soar over the parade grounds. The meet was held under the personal direction of Captain Matthew A. Reasoner, Medical Corps, assisted by a score of officers of the post. It is proposed to make this an annual event.
