The yacht passed close to the famous Government reserve near Seal Rocks and gave the guests an opportunity to see the interesting birds and animal life which is a feature of the place.

The concerts given in the hotel parlors during the evening and later in the evening, traveling along the beach, and passing Cape Meares by way of the trail and then crossing the narrow entrance to Tillamook Bay in a small boat, has also appealed to the attention of guests here and the horses on the point have been in constant demand for the trip over a portion of the point.

The Cannon Beach building up to Seaside Great Improvements.

ELK CREEK, Or., July 6.—(Special.)—The name "Cannon Beach" was formerly used to designate a short strip of beach south of Hug Point, where an old cannon was found buried under the sand, and was dug out and mounted on a crude framework. But now it is generally applied to the whole beach, from Elk Creek to Arch Cape, a distance of eight miles. This beach is building up rapidly and will soon be one of the foremost pleasure resorts in the Coast.

The new telephone line, running the entire length of the beach, is a great comfort to those who wish to keep in touch with the city, while the many autos and teams which come from the city daily give the beach a busy appearance.

The road from Seaside through the mountains is being improved, a plan road is being built over the soft sand at Elk Creek, and the road around Hug Point which was blasted out of the solid rock is being made level and cemented. All this will make it much easier for autos to run from Seaside.

Several cottages have been built and the others will start at once. The most pretentious home will be that of Governor West, who has 20 lots near Haystack Rock, on which a landscape gardener and a force of men worked last winter transforming the rough hillside into beautiful terraced lawns with winding driveways and stone steps. The house, which is to be built of logs, is now completed, but when it is it will be one of the show places of the beach.
