ROYAL ROSARIANS TO TRAVEL TO POTLATCH

Rex Oregonus and Staff Prepare for Trip by Special Train to Puget Sound Country, With Seattle Final Goal.



WHEN the Portland attendants at the Seattle Golden Potlatch last year promised to bring old Rex Oregonus and some real live members with them in July, 1912, they promised only what they fully believed they could make good on. So when the Potlatch is in full swing this week, "we" will be there strong, not only with the King, but with a picked drill team and a full staff of Royal Rosarians and court attendants.

The Rosarians, organized for special occasions such as the Potlatch, will travel to Seattle on a special train, leaving over the Northern Pacific Railway at 1 o'clock Wednesday morning. Not less than 100 will go on this train. Hundreds of other Portland people will visit Seattle during the Golden Potlatch.

Last year this city made a comparatively small showing at Seattle, but this year and each succeeding year it is proposed to have a large representation at the Potlatch, the Tacoma Montanara Feste and other similar festivities. It was for this purpose that the Royal Rosarians were organized.

The drill team of the Rosarians, composed of 24 men is under the supervision of Professor Robert Krohn. He is a pastmaster at the art and drilled several thousand school children so thoroughly that President Taft asked that the drill be repeated.

The drill team will meet at the Armory at 9:30 o'clock this morning and at 5:30 P. M. tomorrow for final work. The members will wear white uniforms and white caps and are certain to make a hit wherever they appear. They will be equipped with various songs and will help pull off the "stunts" that are being prepared by Charles Berg. Frederick Hyskell has been appointed field marshal or business manager for the team. Members of the Rosarians, whether in the drill team or not, will meet at the Commercial Club at noon tomorrow. CAPLES SUIT FOR \$8000

DEATH OF FIANCEE RESULTS IN FAMILY TANGLE

Mother and Sister of Dead Woman Demand Accounting of Executor Who Claims Ownership.

Alleging that C. C. Caples fraudulently led them to believe that Lillie H. Baber, his fiancée, had made him a gift of securities valued at more than \$8000 previous to her death, in March, 1906, Minnie Baber, mother, and Josephine Baber, sister, of the dead woman, have started suit in the Multnomah County Circuit Court for an accounting. They are the legal heirs of Lillie H. Baber. The complaint sets forth that Granville H. Baber died intestate in 1898 leaving an estate in Washington County property valued at \$15,000. C. Caples was named in the will as executor and it was provided that he was to turn over \$5000 to Lillie H. Baber, who afterwards became his fiancée, when she was 23 years of age. According to the complaint, Miss Baber gave him a receipt when the time arrived, but left the property in Caples' hands to manage.

The mother and sister declare that after Lillie Baber's death, Caples induced them to believe that his intended wife had made him a gift of all her property and persuaded them to allow him to be appointed administrator of the estate. They now want the probate proceedings set aside, asserting that their consent to the defendant's appointment as administrator and to his taking Miss Baber's property was secured by misrepresentation.

They assert that Caples has invested the money received from the estate of his intended wife to good advantage, principally in mining property, and they demand that the earnings as well as the original amount be turned over to them.

FREE WORK BOARD NAMED

Mayor Appoints Members to City Employment Bureau.

Thomas F. Mann, representing the Manufacturers' Association; Mrs. Minnie Miller, representing the labor unions, and James Maguire, representing the City Council, were appointed by Mayor Rushlight yesterday as members of the city free employment bureau board. The appointments were made to fill the positions of the former members of the board who resigned at the suggestion of the Civil Service Commission after it was found that there was much friction in the bureau.

The Mayor followed the requirements of the city charter in appointing one member from the Manufacturers' Association, another from the labor unions and the third from the City Council. These bodies recommended the persons named.

It is thought likely that changes will be made in the free employment bureau office on Second street, it being reported that a new man is slated for the position of chief clerk in the place of Clerk Christensen, who occupies the position at present. It is also uncertain whether Mr. Christensen will hold the position of deputy clerk which he occupied prior to the recent resignation of Clerk Schroeder.

Sheep Sale Brings \$50,000. (Special.)—A purchase of sheep has been made at Glenwood which aggregates over \$50,000. Jake Prael, local agent for the Portland Meat Company, contracted for 50,000 lambs from herders on the Columbia Reserve for Fall delivery at Glenwood. The meat company will dress them at Portland and make large shipments to Chicago.
