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IDAHO MAY GET NEW METHODIST COLLEGE

Gooding and Boise Offer Sites for University, With Former Favored. Ex-Governor Makes Attractive Offer—Religious Sessions.

A NEW Methodist University at Gooding, Idaho, may be opened by September, 1914. Plans are now on foot for establishing a new Methodist educational institution either at Gooding or Boise, with Gooding favored.

Frank Gooding, ex-governor of Idaho, has offered the trustees of the \$50,000 if they will establish a school at Gooding. Associated with him in making this offer are the citizens of Gooding. This is most notably the case of Dr. A. W. Barnes, superintendent of the Boise district, who is in charge of the \$50,000 is for the endowment of the institution, and that about \$250,000 additional will be raised by the members of the Methodist Church for the purchase of grounds, and the erection of the university buildings.

At the annual conference a year ago Boise made a bid to have the new institution established there. That city offered the Methodists 40 acres of land, the proceeds of the sale of this property to be used as an endowment. But this would necessitate platting, and the sale of the property, while the Gooding offer is largely in cash. The Boise property probably would have yielded between \$150,000 and \$200,000.

He will then go to Missoula, to attend the Montana Conference. After that he will attend the conferences conducted by Bishop Cooke.
