

## GIFTED SPEAKERS TO PLEAD SUFFRAGE

Rev. C. F. Aked, ex-Pastor of  
Rockefeller's Church, to  
Speak in Portland.

DR. ANNA SHAW SCHEDULED

Charlotte Perkins Gilman, Author and  
Lecturer, Arrives Tomorrow.  
Professor Zuehlke on  
Programme.

As the time of the elections draws near the suffragists in Oregon, who have up to now contented themselves with working quietly in the counties and towns, are planning a series of lectures by men and women with world-wide reputation. Among those who have been secured at present are such well-known people as Dr. Anna Shaw, Rev. C. F. Aked, one time pastor of Rockefeller's Baptist Church, on Fifth avenue, New York, and now pastor of the First Congregational Church in San Francisco; Charlotte Perkins Gilman and others.

Dr. Aked will deliver four addresses here, three in the evening and one in the afternoon, September 24, finishing up with a lecture on the night of September 26. Prior to his arrival in America, Dr. Aked won considerable notoriety as founder of the passive resistance movement of the nonconformists, and by his support of the Boers during their struggle with Great Britain.

Dr. Anna Shaw coming. In 1907 she accepted the position of pastor in the Baptist Church on Fifth avenue, New York, which he left recently to become pastor of the First Congregational Church in San Francisco. As a lecturer he has achieved great distinction on social topics.

Dr. Anna Shaw hardly needs any introduction, for in conjunction with Jane Addams she has accomplished more for woman suffrage in America than any woman living. After resigning from the pulpit, she was chosen lecturer for the Massachusetts Woman's Suffrage Association in 1885. Since then she has not only written extensively on the subject, but has lectured and traveled in almost every state for the benefit of the cause. Since 1904 she has been president of the National American Woman's Suffrage Association. Dr. Shaw will speak here September 25.

From October 22-25, Professor Charles Zuehlke, noted publicist and lecturer on social and civic questions, will speak in Portland, and shortly after his departure Charlotte Perkins Gilman, author, editor, and lecturer, will arrive and will remain here from October 28 to November 2, or till within two days of the elections.

**Gifted Speaker Coming.** Miss Perkins is said to be one of the most gifted and entertaining speakers at present lecturing in America. She has been identified especially with the labor question and the advance of women, editing the "Forerunner" since November, 1908. She has visited Europe as a public speaker on three occasions and is the author of many books on questions of the day, at home and the child labor question as well as suffrage.

Tomorrow Mrs. Florence Ewell Atkins, of Nashville, Tenn., will make a tour of Oregon under the auspices of the Women's Christian Temperance Union and the Women's Club campaign committee. Her lecture will be devoted to suffrage entirely.

An informal reception at the headquarters of the local branch of the Women's Christian Temperance Union will be tendered to her between 6:30 and 8 P. M., to which representatives from all the suffrage associations have been invited.

**DAHLIA SHOW IS PLANNED**  
Asters Will Be Seen Next Month and Chrysanthemums Soon.

At its regular monthly meeting last week, the Portland Floral Society, which was organized last May, outlined the details for a chrysanthemum show to be held in the early fall. It will also give an aster and dahlia exhibition next month, which will be open to the public, provided a proper place to house the exhibition can be secured.

The society will enjoy its first picnic August 27, when members will be the guests of the Oregon Nursery Company at Oregano.

In addition to being of help to members, the society has for its object the education of the public in matters floral. It will give all assistance to such good institutions as the school garden contest, the sweet pea show and the Rose Festival.

Members include florists, seedmen, nurserymen, landscape architects and gardeners and manufacturers of floral supplies. The society meets on the second Monday of each month in Architectural Hall, E. T. Mische in president, James Forbes, vice-president; R. M. Bodley, secretary, and A. G. Clark, treasurer.

**BATTERY A WILL ENCAP**  
March to Rifle Range Near St. Helens Starts Today.

In heavy marching order, members of Battery A, of the Oregon National Guard, will leave this morning at 8 o'clock for the rifle range near St. Helens, where they are to take part in the annual battery encampment and rifle competition. It is thought there will be about 90 members of the battery on hand for the ten days' outing.

Orders have been issued for all who are going on the trip to report at the Armory at 7:30 o'clock this morning. At that time they will be fitted with equipment and supplies, after which they will proceed in heavy marching order toward St. Helens. The long march is expected to require two days.

At the rifle range a general line of maneuvers will be carried out in addition to rifle competition, which is to be the main feature of the outing. After six days at the camp, the battery will march back to Portland, taking two days' time.

**MEDICAL SCHOOL HONORED**  
University of Oregon Department Attracts National Notice.

At the present time the council of medical education in American Medical Association is busy rating schools throughout the states in three classes, A, B and C. As a result of the advanced standard that the medical school of the University of Oregon has taken in line with this progressive movement, it has been placed in the first class.

"In preparation for the opening of

the school year on October 7, we are making extensive alterations," said Dr. Kenneth A. J. Mackenzie yesterday. "In addition to the renovation of the building itself we are putting in an entirely new laboratory equipment. The greater portion of this has been bought from the large Eastern concerns, which make a specialty of this work, though on the other hand, a large sum has been expended in procuring from Europe, especially from Berlin and Hamburg, apparatus of the most advanced nature.

"Facilities for so doing have been greatly increased by the removal of tariff charges on goods brought in for educational purposes.

"For instance, some wax models have been acquired from Berlin. These are the very latest of their kind and I have seen nothing finer. For the physiological and chemical laboratory instruments have been secured from Hamburg.

NOTED PSYCHIATRIST OF INDIANA PRISON VISITS IN PORTLAND.

Professor Rufus Bernhard von Kleinsmid.

Professor and Mrs. Rufus Bernhard von Kleinsmid, of Greencastle, Ind., are now visiting Mrs. von Kleinsmid's relatives, Mr. and Mrs. Fletcher Linn, 574 Laurel street.

Mrs. von Kleinsmid was formerly Miss Elizabeth Patterson Sawyer, and is a sister of Mrs. Linn. Professor von Kleinsmid was the first psychiatrist in the world to take charge of a prison for the purpose of reorganizing it upon the basis of work in the psychological laboratory. He was inaugurated August 12 as associate superintendent, Jeffersonville, Ind.

He was fitted up for the teaching of laboratory diagnosis, for which two special teachers have been appointed this year.

Two new laboratories are also being installed under two full-time professors, thereby making the complete set of full-time professors in this school six in number. By full-time we mean men who devote their whole time to the teaching in the school.

"During the current two years there will have been spent on equipment \$10,000 and also \$20,000 for maintenance and operation. These sums, granted as they are by the state, are proof of the substantial recognition now being given to the medical department as one of the most important integral parts of the State University."

**CROPS STAY SENTENCES**  
Indian Prisoners, Free, Plead for More Time to Harvest Products.

George Gray, another Klamath Indian who was found guilty of introducing liquor on the reservation and paroled so he could get in his crops, is evidently jealous that Ab Captain has had his parole extended. He has written the United States District Court that his crops are just as backward as those of Captain, and that he would not be able to begin the service of his sentence before September 1. An order to this effect was entered in the case Friday, and it is fully believed that both of the Indians will show up at the County Jail on the 1st of the coming month to start serving a term of 30 days each.

Both of these Indians own in several large tracts of tillable lands and are comparatively wealthy, and, while not hard drinkers, will keep some around for an emergency, which is contrary to the Federal laws.

**MRS. W. R. ELLIS PASSES**  
Well-Known Oregon City Woman Dies at Hospital—Funeral Today.

OREGON CITY, Or., Aug. 17.—(Special.)—Mrs. Ella Elgin Ellis, wife of W. R. Ellis, of Oregon City, died at the Oregon City Hospital today, after a brief illness.

Mrs. Ellis was one of the prominent and well-known women in Oregon City.

MAN WHO CROSSED PLAINS AS BARE, DIES IN VICTORIA.

Oregon Columbus Hastings, who died in Victoria, B. C., aged 64, was one of the first white children to cross the prairies in an ox wagon, as he came to Portland when only a year old, with his people from Pontoon, Ill., in 1847.

Soon afterward his father moved to California, attracted by the gold rush, but he left his people from Pontoon, Ill., in 1847.

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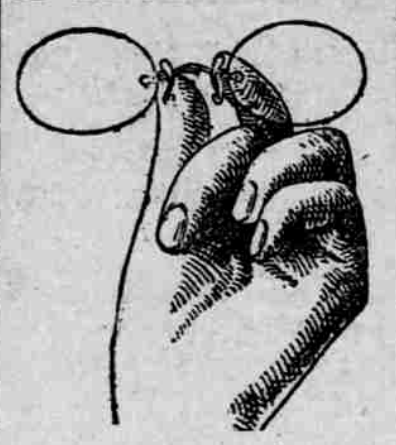

**NEW TARGET RANGE IDEAL**  
Day's Hike From Vancouver Site Favored by Army Officers.

VANCOUVER, BARRACKS, Wash., Aug. 17.—(Special.)—The target range provided for in the appropriation bill that passed the Senate yesterday, is at Proebest, 16 miles from this post. It is peculiarly adapted for the target range and several Army officers, experts in this line, were detailed to make a report on its suitability. Two reports of that it was the second best, if not the best, they had ever seen in the United States and the third said it was the best he had visited. 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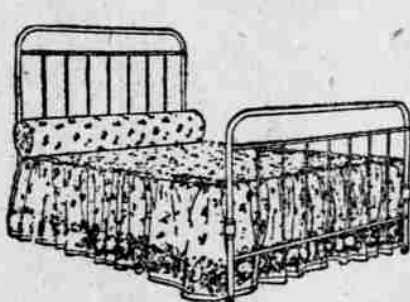
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
