

WITNESS AGAINST BECKER MISSING

Disappearance of Third of
State's Men Causes Fear of
Outside Influence.

OFFER OF BRIBE REPORTED

Vice Trust Said to Have Set Aside
\$50,000 to Give District Attorney
for Privilege of Operation.
Grafters Being Grafted.

NEW YORK, Aug. 31.—Another witness for the state in the Rosenthal murder case has disappeared. The man's identity was not revealed. Detectives were dispatched tonight to Philadelphia on a tip that he had gone there with instructions to bring him back if they located him.

His absence appears to have caused anxiety at the District Attorney's office.

In view of the sudden departure for Europe of Thomas C. Coupe, another witness, and the absence of Frank Walsh, also a witness, the district attorney tonight that influence was being exerted to get as many state witnesses as possible out of the way before September 10, the date fixed for the beginning of the trial of Police Lieutenant Charles Becker, accused of instigating the murder of Herman Rosenthal.

Witness Held as Surety.
The witness reported missing tonight is said to have been one whom the District Attorney has been keeping in the background to spring as a surprise at the trial of Becker, as he has not testified before the grand jury. His testimony would help to establish a motive, it was said, for the killing of Rosenthal in connection with Becker's alleged relations with the gambler.

In connection with the proposed investigation of police alliance with gambling and disorderly resorts it was said today by one of the District Attorney's assistants that the so-called "vice trust" of 32 disorderly houses, that were raided on August 15, had set aside the sum of \$50,000 out of its profits as a corruption fund for the "delivery" of the District Attorney. Although several of these houses were reopened after the raid, which was conducted by Assistant District Attorney Smith and agents of the Society for the Prevention of Crime, they recently closed again in fear of another raid.

SOURCE OF BRIBE TRACED

The \$50,000 raised represented, it was said, one week's receipts of the inmates of the 32 houses operated by the trust, who during that time were compelled to give up the "syndicate" their personal profits. Through subterranean channels word was conveyed to the District Attorney's office that the \$50,000 was forthcoming. District Attorney's office assigned to "negotiate" with the heads of the "trust" have procured evidence of the proffered bribe, it was said, which would be presented during the John Doe proceedings.

The tables have been turned by many gamblers upon whom the police have been wont to levy blackmail. It was said today, taking advantage of the prospect of prosecution which faces some of the grafters in the Police Department, victims of gamblers have been demanding pay from the former grafters as the price of silence, it was said, and have obtained it.

REALTY DEALER CONVICTED

Portland Man Loses \$10,000 When
Broker Sells to Two Persons.

SANTA CRUZ, Cal., Aug. 31.—Cary T. Scott was found guilty by a jury here today of having sold valuable farm property near Watsonville to two different persons. He was arrested in Spokane, Wash., two months ago. Scott was accused of having defrauded V. E. Campbell, of Portland, Or., of \$10,000 worth of property near that city and \$10,000 worth near Boise, Idaho, by having Campbell transfer it to him to expedite realty transactions. Scott traded Campbell's Oregon property to W. R. Humphrey. It was charged, for his Watsonville property, Campbell declared that in the meantime Scott turned over the exchange contract to Campbell, and, without the knowledge of the latter, exchanged the Watsonville property again for property in Oakland.

WILSON CLUB IS FORMED

La Grande Democrats Form Link in
Chain of Organizations.

LA GRANDE, Or., Aug. 31.—(Special.)—Despite heavy rain a good attendance was on hand tonight to perfect the organization of a Woodrow Wilson Club in this city.

Fred J. Holes, a business man, was chosen president; Charles Dunn, vice-president; R. L. Lincoln, secretary, and John S. Hodgins, treasurer.

The local club aims to follow the lead of the Roosevelt Club and is to create similar organization in as many precincts of the county as possible and later to have an organization formed from the various precincts.

Mr. Holmes, the new president, predicted a perfected county chain of clubs within two weeks. The uppermost note of the meeting attended by local people only was speedy preparation for a strenuous campaign.

ARCHBOLD DOES NOT MIND

Standard Oil President Says It Is
Just Like Colonel Roosevelt.

LONDON, Aug. 31.—When John D. Archbold, president of the Standard Oil Company, arrived at Plymouth on the steamer Majestic, he was told that Colonel Roosevelt had denounced him as being a falsifier because of his testimony to the Senate committee investigating campaign contributions. "That is just like him," said Archbold. "I don't mind it. I adhere to every word I said and when I return to New York I will be prepared to substantiate my allegations."

JONES ASKED TO SPEAK

Spokane Republicans Want Senator
There September 5.

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 31.—(Special.)—Wesley L. Jones, United States Senator, now on his way home from

Washington, will be asked to speak in Spokane September 5, or at a later date at his own convenience, under the auspices of the new Republican Club.

Chairman W. W. Zent today announced that the Republican Club Central Committee would be called to meet September 5. The headquarters of the Republican Club will be open Monday, with Mel G. Duncan, one of the secretaries of the reorganized central committee, in charge.

Chairman Zent announced today that September 5 had been decided on as the date for the next meeting of the county central committee. The meeting probably will be held at the new headquarters.

At this time it is presumed that arrangements will be made to have checkers present at the progressive primaries, Saturday, to see that none who vote at that time secure Republican ballots at the regular primaries, September 10.

A new executive committee has been named by Chairman Zent, consisting of Harry J. Hildman, F. P. Allen, W. W. Hindman, George Von Eschen and R. M. Webster.

BRITISH ACTRESS FINDS SHE
CAN'T SEE ALL IN TWO DAYS.

Pretty Girl's Plans to See "Frisco,"
Texas Cowboys and Chicago
Spoiled by Distances.

NEW YORK, Aug. 31.—(Special.)—America was discovered today by one of the prettiest girls who ever brought an accent from the British Isles. She learned that the United States runs a considerable distance due west from Hoboken.

HANGINGS ARE OPPOSED

ANTI-CAPITAL PUNISHMENT
FORCES BUSY IN CALIFORNIA.

Proponents of Measure Obtain
Additional Signatures and Ask
Wallace for Reprieve.

SACRAMENTO, Aug. 31.—That a determined effort is being made by the proponents of the anti-capital punishment movement to prevent any further hangings in California is shown by telegrams received by Lieutenant-Governor Wallace, asking him if he intends to permit any more executions at the prisons.

The telegrams assert that the proponents of the anti-execution measure, which failed to get a place upon the November ballot because there were not sufficient signatures filed in the Secretary of State's office by August 7, have since obtained the needed 31,000 names and assert that they have the right to file these additional signatures before September 17, this gaining place for their measure on the ballot at the general election.

The Lieutenant-Governor would not indicate his action in regard to the six hangings scheduled to take place one each week during September and October at the state prisons. He intimated, however, that the filing of further petitions for the anti-capital punishment measure would carry considerable weight.

DYNAMITE PROBE GROWS

GRAND JURY NOT THROUGH IN
LAWRENCE INQUIRY.

Third Man Indicted Said to Be as
Prominent as President Wood,
of Textile Company.

BOSTON, Aug. 31.—Interest in the investigation of the alleged "planting" of dynamite at Lawrence during the big textile strike was renewed today by the report that the indicting of W. M. Wood, president of the American Woolen Company, Dennis J. Collins and a third man who has not yet been arrested, would not complete the work of the grand jury.

The grand jury will meet again next week for the regular September term, and it was reported that the District Attorney might have still further evidence to present.

Officers who went to the house of the third man found him ill, but it was agreed that if he was able he would give himself up to the police Tuesday morning. He is said to be a man nearly as prominent as Mr. Wood in the social and financial world.

TWO KILLED BY BURGLARS

Constables Surprising Five at Work
Shot Down—Battle Ensues.

HASPE, Westphalia, Germany, Aug. 31. Burglars and policemen fought a battle last night here which lasted several hours and ended with two killed and four wounded. A gang of five housebreakers was surprised by a village constable, whom they fired at and fatally wounded. They then fled, and meeting another constable shot him dead. In the neighboring hamlet of Millepe a force of 70 police overtook them, and after a fierce fusillade, in which they wounded three gendarmes while one of their party was disabled, they were arrested.

Raymond Man Hurt in Runaway

RAYMOND, Wash., Aug. 31.—(Special.)—G. A. Hjort, living on Elk creek, near this city, was dangerously injured yesterday in a runaway accident, suffering a compound fracture of one leg, a number of broken ribs and terrible laceration of the flesh on his chest and side. Mr. Hjort's team became frightened and got beyond his control, and he was thrown from his vehicle. He was removed to the Raymond General Hospital, where his injuries were dressed.

TWO MARINES IN NICARAGUA KILLED

People of Two Beleaguered
Towns Are Believed Near
Point of Starving.

EUROPEANS CALL FOR AID

Critical Situation in Managua Leads
Foreign Residents to Appeal
to Home Governments.
North Is Cut Off.

PANAMA, Aug. 31.—Reliable information from Nicaragua received here today is to the effect that two American marines have been killed there.

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Aug. 30.—(Delayed in Transmission.)—Managua, Granada and Masaya are still beleaguered, and the inhabitants of the two latter towns must be nearing the point of starvation.

In a letter which was smuggled out of Granada, a woman writes to her husband here begging that food be gotten through to the town. All communication between Managua and Leon and Corinto is cut off, and it is not known here what is happening in the north.

In Managua the situation is critical, and if assistance does not come quickly a crisis soon will be reached. Europeans here are making appeals to their home governments for help and protection.

PROTECTORATE IS PREDICTED

French Newspaper Thinks United
States Will Take Control.

PARIS, Aug. 31.—The definite assumption by the United States of full control of the affairs of Nicaragua is expected by the Temps to be the outcome of the present American intervention in that country.

After a long review of the circumstances leading up to the actual situation, the newspaper continues: "The United States today holds the little Central American republic in a vise. We may expect soon to see the armed intervention transformed into a protectorate."

ZELAYA REPORTED ON WAY

Panama Newspapers Say ex-President
Is in Colon.

PANAMA, Aug. 31.—Panama newspapers today published a report that ex-President Zelaya, of Nicaragua, whose government was overthrown in 1909 by the revolution headed by General Estrada, has arrived in Colon on his way to Nicaragua. Inquiries at the Nicaraguan and American legations failed to confirm the report. Owing to the revolution in Nicaragua, it is said, the Pacific Mail Steamship Company's vessels are not receiving cargoes at Nicaraguan ports.

ROME SOCIETY ASTOUNDED

Leaders Arrested for Gigantic Frauds
in Government Certificates.

ROME, Aug. 31.—A profound sensation was caused by the arrest today of two prominent leaders of Roman society with five accomplices on a charge of alleged trafficking in counterfeit banknotes and government stock certificates.

The chief accused are Count Falcinetti and Count Barbellini, who are charged with having issued illicit securities on an extensive scale. The organization with which they are reported to be connected is said to have widespread ramifications.

All the arrested men protested they were innocent, but they are held in prison.

AUTO TAKES FATAL LEAP

One Killed, Five Injured When Car
Speeding on Highway Upsets.

WESTCHESTER, Pa., Aug. 31.—Arthur Wood, president of the Builders' Supply Company, of Brooklyn, N. Y., was instantly killed and five other persons were injured, two dangerously, when an automobile in which they were touring the state turned turtle tonight at Glen Lock, near here. The car was going at high speed when, in attempting to turn out for another machine, it ran into a ditch.

Streetcar Men to Arbitrate

CHICAGO, Aug. 31.—The official figures in the vote of the surface line employees of the proposed agreement for a three-years contract, defeating it by 951 to 866, were announced today by a committee of the union joint committee. Arbitration of the differences between the employees and the streetcar officials is the next step.

CLARK FEELS DEPRIVED

SPEAKER SAYS HE SHOULD
HAVE BEEN NOMINATED.

Nevertheless He Will Never Bolt, and
Hopes Three Branches of Govern-
ment Will Be Democratic.

CANOE LAKE, N. H., Aug. 31.—Champ Clark told Democrats of Massachusetts at their outing here today that he believed now and always would believe that he was entitled to the Democratic nomination for President this year.

"But under the two-thirds rule Wilson and Marshall were nominated and I never bolted a Democratic ticket and never will," he added.

Clark declared the formation of a third party at this time was needless. "If the Republicans believe in 'progressive' ideas, let them come into the Democratic party," he said.

After praising the work of the present House Clark said the cost of living had gone up 60 per cent in the last 15 years, while wages had increased only 21 per cent, and he added:

"There is no hope of remedial legislation as long as the three branches of the Government are not of the same political faith. I hope to see the election of a Democratic House, a Democratic Senate and a Democratic President."

"The tariff ought to be reduced to a revenue or competitive basis and be removed entirely on the most necessary articles of food, while the trusts should be abolished utterly. There are laws

enough to abolish the trusts if they were honestly, conscientiously, vigorously and patriotically enforced, which they are not."

EUGENE PIONEER, 82, DEAD

Mrs. Sarah E. Churchill Crossed
Plains by Ox Team in 1851.

EUGENE, Or., Aug. 31.—(Special.)—Mrs. Sarah E. Churchill, a pioneer of 1851, died last night at her home in Eugene, aged 82 years. Her husband, William Churchill, died a few months ago. Mrs. Churchill leaves five children—J. S. Churchill, of Marcola; Mrs. Sarah Knox, Cottage Grove; H. H. Churchill, Santa Rosa, Cal.; A. P. Churchill, Bohemia; Mrs. Frank Alley, Roseburg.

Mrs. Churchill was born in Sangamon County, Illinois, August 1, 1830, and was married to William Churchill in 1846. She crossed the plains by ox team with her husband in 1851 and settled in Douglas County. In 1856 they moved to Polk County, and ten years later returned to Lane County, spending the rest of their lives near Eugene or Cottage Grove.

The body was taken to Cottage Grove today for interment beside her late husband.

Absorbed Railways Dissolved

SALEM, Or., Aug. 31.—(Special.)—The Herald Publishing Company of Klamath Falls filed articles of incorporation with the Secretary of State today. The articles show a capitalization of \$12,000. Articles of dissolution of the Northwestern Railway Company and the Malheur Valley Railway Company were also filed, these companies being absorbed by the Harriman system.
