

BRAGG WINS RACE; DE PALMA INJURED

Autoist Hurlled From Track in
Exciting Finish of Interna-
tional Grand Prix.

TETZLAFF IS ELIMINATED

Wealthy Young Victor of Contest
Makes Average Speed of 69.3
Miles an Hour—De Palma
Hurt Trying to Pass Him.

WAUWATOSA, Wis., Oct. 5.—Caleb Bragg, a wealthy young Cincinnati driver, won today the fourth international grand prix automobile race with a Fiat car after a sensational last lap brush, in which Ralph DePalma's Mercedes car was overturned and DePalma was seriously injured.

Bragg captured the race from a field of 12 starters which included the country's most widely-known drivers of heavy cars. Only six of the 12 starters finished.

Bragg's speed average for the race was 69.3 miles an hour as against the late David Bruce-Brown's average of 74.45 miles an hour in last year's grand prix event at Savannah, Ga. He covered the distance of 409 miles 4615 feet in 5:59:25.

Winner Always Near Front.
The winner drove a heady, consistent race, never being further back than third place at any stage of the long grind. He was in the lead through 30 laps of the 52-lap contest. For the first 80 miles Teddy Tetzlaff led the field, but Bragg and DePalma were almost on top of Tetzlaff all the time. With the elimination of Tetzlaff by a minor accident to his Fiat car at the 244-mile post, the race settled down to a driving duel between Bragg and DePalma.

DePalma Catches Bragg.
DePalma was two minutes, 36 seconds behind Bragg as the two swung into the last 7.88-mile lap. Bragg had slowed down considerably and DePalma set out to catch the driver. He caught him on next to the last leg of the contest. In a desperate effort to pass Bragg on the narrow roadway near where Bruce-Brown was killed Tuesday, DePalma shot his heavy Mercedes into the rear of Bragg's Fiat. In the recoil from this collision DePalma's car was thrown into the ditch and wrecked. DePalma and his mechanic, Tom Alley, were thrown clear of the car.

Bragg, as his part of the \$10,000 purse, received \$5000. Erwin Bergdall, of Philadelphia, who drove a Benz car into second place, after a pretty fight with Gil Anderson for the last 50 miles of the race, received \$2500. Bergdall's average speed for the race was 65.61 miles an hour.

Anderson in American Car.
Gil Anderson, who finished third with a Stutz car, the only American car to remain through the race, gets \$1250 as his end. His average speed was 65.55 miles an hour.

Barney Oldfield, who finished fourth, with a Fiat car at an average speed of 64.75 miles an hour, took \$950 as fourth money.

George Clark, who was still driving his Mercedes with one more lap to go when Oldfield finished, was flagged by Starter Wagner and received \$500 as fifth money.

BIG JACK ZELIG IS SLAIN

Immediately after reaching headquarters he began to interrogate them. On Zelig's body several letters were found, including one signed "Whitey" from the prison where "Whitey" Lewis and other prospective Becker trial witnesses are confined.

Frank, Louie and Gyp Send Regards.
"Frank, Louie and Gyp send regards to you," a postscript to the letter read. "I want you to stop worrying about us," was another clause. "We are only up here on a very short vacation to have a good rest and get our act up."

Another letter was signed "Harry," and still another was from "Louie." The dates were as recent as today. Another letter was signed "Frank Crocetti," the real name of "Dago Frank," and bore no date.

"I know what a true pal you are," Crocetti wrote. "Better days are coming," was a postscript expression. "Be cheerful, Jack, there is not a bit of worrying with the four of us; carrying a bunch of faith in you I am sure the rest of the boys have the same," was another clause in the letter.

Name Mentioned Early in Case.
Zelig's name came into the Rosenthal murder investigation in its early stages. According to testimony, Jack Rose is reported to have given before the grand jury, "Big Jack" was the man who furnished the names of the four gunmen charged with the murder of the gambler. These men, "Gyp the Blood," "Lefty Louie," "Whitey" Lewis and "Dago Frank" Crocetti were all known in the underworld as members of Zelig's gang of gunfighters.

Rose said that, as an emissary of Police Lieutenant Charles Becker, he went to Zelig and told him that the police lieutenant wanted Rosenthal got out of the way. Zelig at that time was out on bail on a charge of carrying a concealed weapon, which two members of "Becker's strong-arm" squad, Detectives White and Steinert, had preferred against him.

In return for supplying the gunmen who would kill Rosenthal, Becker promised, according to Rose, to have the gun-carrying charge against Zelig dropped. Zelig was on \$10,000 bail on this charge.

Frame Denies He Evaded Loan Law.

ly and without protest at the same time expressing great satisfaction that I succeeded in securing the money. Being unable to meet his obligation at maturity, he asked me to procure from the owner and holder thereof an extension of time (two months) for its payment. At the expiration of period of extension the owner and holder of his obligation called for payment of same. Wright was unable to do so and authorized me to negotiate a loan from some other party for that purpose. A new note and mortgage were executed to the party from whom I secured the money. This was on or about August 10th and the time being one month, said note became due September 10, and remains unpaid, notwithstanding it is almost one month overdue. Foreclosure proceedings were not commenced nor threatened as stated in said report. Another false statement, is that I prevailed on myself to extend the time of payment. LYNN TIMBER ALL SAFE

NO FOREST FIRES OCCURRED
THIS SUMMER.

Association Improvements Extensive
at a Cost of Only Three Cents an
Acre to Holders.

ALBANY, Or., Oct. 5.—(Special.)—For the first time in more than a quarter of a century Lynn County has passed through a Summer without a forest fire.

Though this was partially due to heavy rains the system of protection established by the new fire patrol association is credited also for this record. This association was formed last Spring by the owners of timber land in Lynn County and established a complete patrol system.

John Marks, chief fire warden, had 21 patrolmen and lookouts and a system of telephone lines connecting all of the lookout stations with his headquarters at Lacombe. Besides maintaining this system 35 miles of new trails were built this year and 50 miles of telephone lines were established through the timber. They also repaired 100 miles of old telephone lines. All of this work was done in addition to that accomplished by the Government forest service.

This protection cost the timber owners 3 cents an acre. Heretofore each timber company or owners of large holdings has maintained its own rangers and there was no definite system of co-operation. With all united the fire protection has been placed on an efficient system.

Springfield Gets Filter Plant.

SPRINGFIELD, Or., Oct. 5.—(Special.)—Springfield's new filter plant has been installed and now the citizens of this city will have no fear of the use of the water obtained from the mill-race. The Oregon Power Company has finished the work of putting in the filtration plant sent here from Albany when that city installed a larger plant.
