

GIANTS' MACHINE IS NEW YORK HOPE

Sox Picked as Better—Value of Team Work Is Pointed Out by Expert.

PITCHERS RATED ON PAR

Baseball Expert Fears Marquard and Trosreau May "Blow Up" in Crucial Games—Wood and "Matty" Sure to Be Good.

CHICAGO, Oct. 5.—(Special.)—Individual comparisons of teams pitted for a world's championship struggle mean nothing. The strength of this or that player is shown, but the well-developed machine—the big factor—is overlooked. An individual may be a remarkable hitter, a wonderful thrower, a daring and speedy runner, but, on the whole, his work may count for no more than that of several of his mediocre mates in the actual winning of games.

This holds good with the Giants and Red Sox, the coming contenders for the big prize, as well as before, and when these high-strung fighting machines engage in the first of the championship battles at the polo grounds next Tuesday the individual will be absorbed—to a certain extent.

Sox Individually Better. If the individual does runs to play the Red Sox are apparently due to play the part of major league organization against minor league talent. Man for man the Boston champs are on the long end of about 17 to 1. This means that the Giants excel in one position only. However, even in their own league McGraw's men do not compare favorably individually with one or two other teams, and yet they won a flag again demonstrating the argument that a great team is not necessarily a combination of stars.

In a short series of this kind the eyes are naturally focused on the pitching staff. Stack Wood against Mathewson, Collins against Marquard and O'Brien against Trosreau. Collectively the Giants seem to have the edge, but it means nothing. Wood and Matty may be considered fixtures not to be disturbed by the wild accompanying scenes. Marquard, however, will wither under fire. He lacks the courage when the crisis is reached and in this respect the Red Sox outpace him the call on his \$11,000 rival.

Trosreau May Waver. Trosreau—admittedly a top-liner—may waver under the strain. A "spitball" pitcher, naturally inclined to be wild, he may go to pieces completely. The same holds for O'Brien, only that his major league service covers a longer period and he is not now under the strain of being expected to accomplish wonders for his team. There are a number of second string pitchers, but they will figure only in the rescue of despairing mates.

The catching department goes hand-in-hand with the pitching. Here Boston is again superior, although many are inclined to rank Meyers with the best of them. This Indian is a hitter of the clean-up variety, but so miserably a thrower that invariably he will avoid pegging to second. At tagging a runner coming into the plate he is weak, usually dropping the ball.

McGraw's Terrors May Be Blocked. Carrigan is the reverse. Not so heavy a hitter, but timely and always dangerous and a good thrower, he is capable of dampening the base-running enthusiasm of McGraw's terrors. At blocking men off the plate he is unequalled for daring or cleverness. Cady is the other man who may figure in the series. He will receive Wood. He is a close student of Carrigan and a heavy batter.

At first base there is not a great deal to afford either Stahl or Merkle the call on the position. Both are fair fielders and hard, long hitters, batting from the right of the plate. In the thinking line Stahl is the superior. He is not upset easily and can be depended upon when a defensive slip occurs. On the other hand, Merkle has been known to lapse when the unexpected happened, his own excusable misadventure of a bad throw to first being enough to disconcert him.

Doyle Outshines Rival. Doyle is the one Giant who clearly outshines his Red Sox rival. It is more than an even chance that whatever the Giants do of note in the coming series this fellow will have a hand in. He, of all McGraw's men, was the one who looked good in spite of the decisive beating suffered by his team in the games with the Athletics last fall. Doyle is first of all a fairly steady fielder with few weaknesses, but his strong point is his ability to block runners off second or force them into hitting the bag once they reach that station. As a hitter his record speaks for itself.

Yerkes throughout the season has been considered the weak sister of the Boston infield. As a fielder he is none too consistent. Even as a hitter he is not generally feared, but he is just that type of player who at any moment is liable to upset the dope by some great hitting feat. He could easily be replaced by Neal Ball and the Boston champs would suffer in no way.

Wagner is "Big Unit" of the Red Sox defense. Fletcher, the Giant shortstop, does not begin to compare with the Boston veteran. Gardner at third base ranks as a star third baseman of the league. He is easily superior to Herzog both defensively and offensively. The outfield is where the Giants are completely outclassed, individually and collectively.

Medford Gets Hookworm. Philippine Specimen, Found in Patient, Differs From South Type.

Medford, Or., Oct. 5.—(Special.)—The hookworm has arrived. While its existence in Josephine and Douglas Counties and throughout the Willamette Valley has long been suspected, the first living specimen in Oregon has been secured in this city. It is an imported animal, however, which accounts for its presence here.

Dr. E. H. Porter and Professor P. J. O'Garra are the two who reported and "hog-tied" the terror of the South. Said terror has been properly labeled, bottled, classified, sealed, pickled and placed upon the shelf. The hookworm was discovered a day or two ago when a patient called upon Dr. Porter for treatment. Dr. Porter suspected the hookworm and called upon Professor O'Garra for the proper classification, as the professor previously probed hookworms in the South, where John D. Rockefeller poured out his millions to check its ravages.

The one now in captivity here came from the Philippine Islands, and is of the Asiatic variety, which differs slightly from its Southern friend.

LINES WILL BE LINKED

Orengo-Helvetia to Be Completed This Coming Winter.

Construction of the connecting link between the Oregon Electric and the United Railways from Orengo to Helvetia will be started and pushed to completion before the end of the coming winter.

J. H. Young, president of the Hill Lines, said yesterday that this road has become a necessity, owing to the constantly increasing freight traffic originating in the south end of the Oregon Electric. This line will allow the heavy freight traffic originating at the south end of the Oregon Electric to pass over the Orengo-Helvetia line direct to the North Bank main line without coming through Portland. It will greatly relieve the congestion on Front street in this city, over which the Oregon Electric's freight traffic is handled.

President Young believes, moreover, that the territory adjacent to this new road will in itself produce enough traffic to justify its construction. The territory is productive and lacks only this railroad connection to make it most prosperous.

SOCIETY IS FLOURISHING

Organization Which Conducts Fairs of Clatsop County Meets.

ASTORIA, Oct. 5.—(Special.)—The annual meeting of the Lower Columbia Agricultural Company, the organization of farmers conducting the Clatsop County Fairs, was held this afternoon and a board of directors was elected as follows: Andrew Johnson, F. E. Butler, Fred Pools, G. L. Rees, R. C. Kinney, James Elliott and L. O. Belland. The secretary submitted a report showing that the cash receipts of the association during the first year of its existence were \$407.25, while the indebtedness incurred was \$405.53, leaving a deficit of only \$16.28, notwithstanding three new buildings were erected on the grounds. The directors organized by the election of G. L. Rees, president; R. C. Kinney, vice-president, and C. S. Dow, secretary.

Plans for next year's fair were discussed and committees to handle the various departments will be named at once.

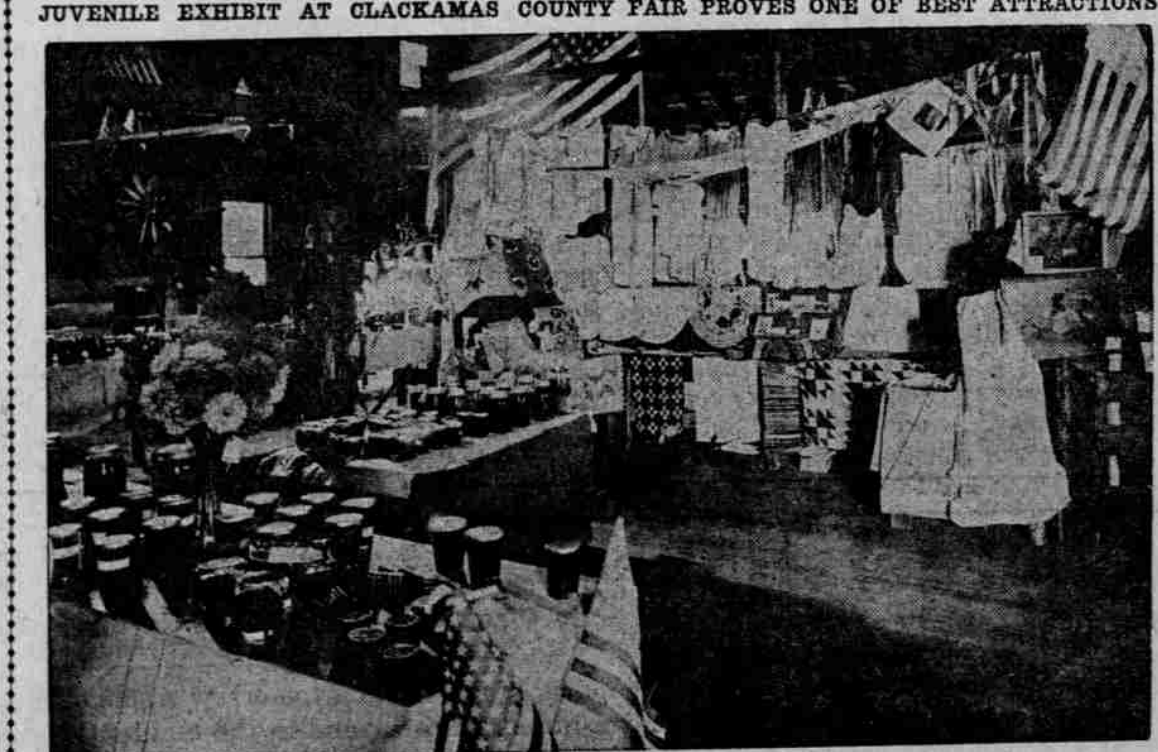
MELONS PROFITABLE CROP

Acre Near Junction City Returns \$300 With Little Cultivation.

JUNCTION CITY, Or., Oct. 5.—(Special.)—Robert Harper, a prosperous farmer who lives near this city, has raised a banner crop of watermelons and cantaloupes this season. On one acre he cleared over \$300, doing little or no cultivation. Last spring he planted a mixture of watermelons and muskmelons. For the past ten days he has been selling these melons. The muskmelons average nearly 25 salable melons to the hill, and a banner hill shows 47 melons.

He raised a total of 1200 watermelons and a total of 6000 muskmelons on this one acre. He sold the watermelons for an average of 15 cents each and the muskmelons at the rate of 25 cents a dozen. The watermelons netted \$130, while the muskmelons netted \$120. This is the best crop of melons that has ever been raised in this section.

JUVENILE EXHIBIT AT CLACKAMAS COUNTY FAIR PROVES ONE OF BEST ATTRACTIONS



OREGON CITY, Or., Oct. 5.—(Special.)—The juvenile exhibit at the Clackamas County Fair, held at Canby last week, were among the main attractions. This is the first time in the history of Clackamas County Fair that the juveniles have had such a display. They occupied most of the upper floor of the big pavilion, and drew large crowds each day of the fair. The exhibit was well arranged by County School Superintendent Gary, of this city, and Miss Mahala Gill, of Logan, Clackamas County, who had charge of the exhibit. This consisted of everything in the domestic science line, all the way from pies and cakes to the most delicious candies, and the needlework department. Next year the exhibit will be still better at the Clackamas County Fair.

8 "JOYRIDERS" DIE WHEN 3 AUTOS HIT

One Speeding Machine Pitches Over Bridge Rail Striking Ground 40 Feet Below.

DEAD ARE PHILADELPHIANS

Car of James Shaw, Contractor, Is Said to Have Been Racing Over Span When It Strikes Machine Approaching It.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 5.—A collision on a bridge in which three automobiles were involved resulted in the death of eight men late tonight at Thirty-third and Thompson streets in this city.

The dead: Edward Shaw, Jr., said to be a son of James Shaw, a Philadelphia contractor who was the owner of the car. David Wilkes. Gordon H. Miller. C. G. Jefferson. R. A. Boyd. William L. Lawrence. R. Gelschal. Unidentified man. All were young men of this city. One of the machines containing nine men came over the bridge at terrific speed. Its rapid approach was seen by John I. Spade, a Philadelphia contractor who was going over the bridge in the opposite direction in a motor. He tried to avoid the car but he was too late in steering out of its way and a collision occurred. A third automobile was directly behind the speeding car and ran into it, with the result that the first machine was catapulted over the bridge and down into a coal yard along the Pennsylvania railroad tracks. The drop was about 40 feet. The other two cars were damaged, but their occupants were uninjured and immediately went to the rescue of the others. Spade said it appeared to him that two cars were racing over the bridge. The Shaw home is closed, the family not having returned from their summer vacation.

REPUBLICAN CLUB FORMED

Organization Starts Work in North Portland District.

At a largely attended meeting of Republicans at Firemen's Hall, Killingsworth and Mississippi avenues, last night, the North Portland Republican Club was organized. Thomas McCusker, independent Republican candidate for Representative in Congress from this district, in an address urged the need of maintaining organizations within the party as the best means of maintaining interest in public questions and insuring the election of good officials. Mr. McCusker gave a detailed account of the work of the Chicago convention and opposed Roosevelt's contention that he was robbed of the Republican nomination by fraudulently seated delegates. W. A. Leet, independent candidate for Circuit Judge, Department No. 4, also addressed the meeting. Next Saturday night, the members of the club will discuss the State Printer's flat salary bill. It is the purpose of the organization to hold frequent meetings before election and discuss all of the pending initiative and referendum measures.

Mr. Schell will retain his interest in the advertising concern. He is an active member of the Commercial Club, Press Club and Ad Club.

GERMAN DAY WILL WITNESS LONG PROGRAMME.

Speeches, Music and Dancing to Be Included in Celebration This Afternoon and Evening.

The annual celebration of German day, established by the German-speaking clubs of America some years ago, will take place this afternoon and night at the Bungalow Theater, Twelfth and Morrison streets, under the auspices of the German-speaking societies of Oregon.

The programme of the afternoon will be in the nature of a review of the leading parts of history in which the Germans, both native and American, are concerned. Music will be furnished by talented well-known Portland singers and Pankopf's orchestra.

In the evening, the five-act play, "Old Heidelberg," will be presented by talent culled from the local societies. Gus C. Moser will be on the afternoon programme and will speak of the German in local politics. Albert Curran, publisher of the Oakland Journal, is another speaker. He is known from coast to coast among the Germans as a speaker and always attracts an audience.

Professor Jenerowski, instructor at the Portland Turn Verein, will have several of his classes on hand at the afternoon show. There will be pyramid building by the young men, wand work by the youngest class and an exhibition of fancy dancing by the young ladies of the society.

Miss Maud Dammasch will sing a number of solos during the afternoon, while the famous mixed choir of 20 voices will come in for a share of the glory.

The evening programme of the famous German play will be well worth seeing even to those who cannot understand the language, for the actors have for years been carrying on this kind of work and some of them have been on the professional stage.

ST. HELENS JOINS LEAGUE

High School Students Vote to Enter Interscholastic Debates.

ST. HELENS, Or., Oct. 5.—(Special.)

St. Helens will participate in the statewide series of interscholastic league debates this year. In response to a letter from Professor A. C. Strange, of The Dalles, secretary of the Columbia River district, to the St. Helens principal, Professor C. C. Thompson, asking the local school to join the league, the students of the High School voted unanimously to accept the invitation. The St. Helens High School was placed on the standard-course basis from 12 students at the close of last school year to 30 at the present time. 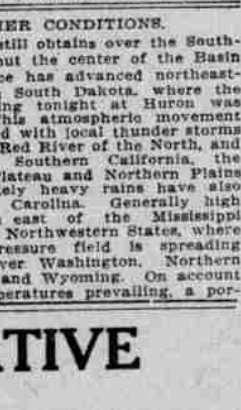
