CHURCH REIGN HIT

Judge Richards Scores Mormons' Political Activity.

SLOW JUSTICE DISCUSSED

In Notable Address Republican Leader of Idaho Blames Bar for Agitation on Recall of Judges and Decisions.

BOISE, Idaho, Oct. 5.—(Special.)—Directing his attack against the Church of the Latter Day Saints because of the statement made by President Smith of that religious organization, and at the same time charging that Judges and lawyers must awaken to the serious situation that confronts them, Judge J. H. Richards stood before a large political gathering in this city Wednesday night, delivering one of the most notable addresses in the history of Idaho politics. He is one of the leaders in the Republican party and an attorney of statewide reputation, as well as former Judge, so that his remarks were taken to have more than passing significance.

Church Control Denounced.

The statement that was made by President Joseph Smith in the official publication of the Mormon church, in which he is charged with attempting to influence politics in Utah and Idaho, was the cause of Judge Richards' remarks. Judge Richards had been charged with the defense of Judge Alfred Budge, a prominent Mormon jurist, who made the race at the primaries for Justice of the Supreme Court, through a letter which he generally circulated, asking support in behalf of Chief Justice Stewart, who proved to be the successful nominee. Judge Richards enters a sweeping denial to that charge. In reference to the Mormon issue and the charge Judge Richards said:

"Let me say here and now that no religious body with my permission will lay its hands on or control the politics of this state or Nation. I resent the recent remarks of the head of the Mormon Church, in which he is charged with attempting to influence politics in Utah and Idaho, as a body will have to fight me when it lays its hands on the politics of this country. It makes no difference whether it is my religion or yours that is seeking to control the politics of the state or this Nation. It is wrong."

"I have been charged with the defeat of Judge Budge. I supported Judge Stewart, for I believed then, as I do now, that he had represented us well and ably and I believed when I supported him, as I do now, that he was entitled to re-election. I have known Judge Stewart for a quarter of a century. I felt that I had the right to support him and urge the support of others for him as I did."

Slow Justice Resented.
Calling attention to the storm he sees brewing for attorneys and judges on account of the delay in meeting out justice in this country, and the present conditions that surround prominent attorneys in high place as United States Senators, Judge Richards said:

"What is this we hear about the recall of our judges? It must be that our courts are not meeting with the approval of the people of this country. There must be some good reason for this. What is the reason, I ask you? The people are clamoring for the recall of judges. I do not blame them. The blame is on the bar of this country. Statistics show that from 40 to 70 per cent of the cases decided by our courts are decided upon question of procedure, mere technicalities, which never touch the merits of the case, or the questions involved. The courts must meet the issues. The people want cases decided while they live. They want cases de-

cided upon their merits. There must be equality before the law."

"Do you realize that ours is a Government practically by lawyers? Lawyers have in most cases been our Presidents, our Senators, our Congressmen or Legislators. They have drafted our laws and they are held responsible partly for the conditions now confronting us. The people are now saying, 'You must solve this question or we will take the power out of your hands.'"

Borah's Stand Lauded.
"The people are charging that many of our United States Senators, who are lawyers, who have accepted big fees from corporations while they were representing, or supposed to be representing, the people in the Senate. Some have taken them, it is charged. Some are charged with going to Washington with kind intentions. The people are demanding that this must be stopped or they will never send another lawyer to Washington."

"When Senator Borah went to the United States Senate he announced during an address at New York that henceforth and thereafter he would sever all of his legal connections and devote his time to the duties of United States Senator for the salary that is allowed by the Government. Think of the great moral tone that Senator Borah struck in that speech! I cannot see why there is any question as to his re-election. It will honor the state and Nation to send him back to Washington. His election should be handed to him on a silver platter."

MOTHERS WILL ASSEMBLE

Annual State Congress to Be Held in Portland This Month.

The annual state convention of the Oregon Congress of Mothers will be held in Portland, October 22 and 23. The congress will assemble in the First Presbyterian Church. The afternoon and evening sessions will be devoted to child welfare in the home, the school, church and state. A public reception will be given the evening of October 22, after the address. The morning sessions will be given up to business. A kindergarten will be conducted during the day sessions, for the convenience of mothers who wish to attend and who have small children.

Governor West and other prominent speakers will be on the program, which will be published later. The indications are that a large number of delegates will be present from other towns and cities. The state officers will be present with the exception of one National officer, Mrs. William F. Thatcher, of Florence, N. J., who will be here.

The committee on legislation of the Oregon Congress of Mothers has been active of late, and has drafted a bill entitled the "Dependent Widows' Pension Fund." This proposed measure is about ready for the printer, and copies will be distributed throughout the state. This measure has the endorsement of Governor West, Judge Gatens, and others who have examined it.

Lewis River Ties Are Sold.

WOODLAND, Wash., Oct. 5.—(Special.)—The North Fork Logging & Milling Company at Yale, Wash., on the North Fork of Lewis River, has made a sale of its railway ties, amounting to about 140,000 pieces. A driving crew is getting them out of the storage pond in Speil Creek and will drive them to the boom at the mouth of the Lewis River. On the way down the drivers will pick up about 25,000 ties at the plant of the Lewis River Lumber Company at Ariel. If rain should come, as now indicated, the drive may get down in a short time, but it is expected that it will take 30 days.

Irrigation Project Under Way.

NAMPA, Idaho, Oct. 5.—(Special.)—Chief Engineer Sturdevant has gone into the field on Little Willow Creek in Eastern Oregon, with a crew of six men to begin the final survey for the Little Willow irrigation project, which will require several months. The dam for the project will be located on Little Willow at the mouth of Linsen Creek, and will be 120 feet high. The reservoir, when completed, will furnish water for several thousand acres of fine agricultural land.

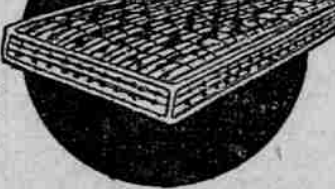

SPOKANE IN DILEMMA

CHARTER FIGHT TANGLE GROWS MORE EMBARRASSING.

Election Designed to Kill Commission Form Will Be Called, but Aftermath Is in Doubt.

SPOKANE, Wash., Oct. 5.—(Special.)—While the petition signed by thousands of citizens asking 18 amendments to the present commission form charter, which virtually destroys commission government, has been declared legal by the Supreme Court, and the city commissioners have agreed to set the election for November 5, Spokane is far from being at a satisfactory conclusion at the anti-commission form fight.

The commissioners who have been in office now two years will call the election, formally tomorrow morning. How to call it is another thing. The petition asks an election on these 18 amendments, but thoughtlessly the legal minds that drew it up forgot to stipulate whether the 18 amendments should be voted on in a unit or as separate amendments to the present charter. The commissioners do not know what stipulation to make for the ballot. If the 18 amendments are not voted on as a unit, which process may be illegal, it is almost certain that an election on the 18 amendments separately would result in such a hodge-podge charter that even the Supreme Court would be unable to say what form of government would be the outcome. There are as many different views on the various objections to the commission form as there are signatures to the petition and then some. Some would vote for one amendment, but not for the other.

It is sure that only a very small proportion of the electorate will vote for the entire 18. Many of the opponents of the commission form do not necessarily oppose clauses in the charter other than the legislative clauses. They want the councilmanic form of government with the modern ideas of the commission form of government injected into it. Several years ago 15 of the leading citizens spent half a year studying and perfecting the new charter in all its phases. In many ways it is considered an excellent document, and it is the commissioners themselves rather than the form of government against which so much of the opposition has grown up.

Should the commissioners decide to unify the amendments and have the voters vote "yes" and "no" and the election carry, the question again arises, when will the change in form of government take place and how will the additional change of officers and election of necessary Councilmen be made? The big question is how shall the change be made, in case it is authorized by the voters?

There is no fund available for calling another election on this matter and it would take extra action on the part of the commissioners. Then it is likely a movement would develop in the ranks of the pro-commissionists, against the change. The city is perfectly at sea. The city asked that the election be delayed till 1913, but the Supreme Court denied this. F. B. Morrill, ex-corporation counsel for the city, heads the movement to change the present form of government and by reason of a conference arranged by City Attorney Stephens with the opponents of the city administration, the city is virtually placed in the position of treating with the voters as to what to do and how to do it. A joint election has been suggested by the councilmanic proponents, at which time the new candidates could be named. The opponents to the present form are practically suggesting every move.

NIGHT SCHOOL OPENS

TERM WILL BE FROM OCTOBER 14 TO APRIL 14.

High, Commercial, Civil Service, Elementary and Foreigners' Courses Are Included.

Arrangements have been completed for night public schools to be conducted by the Board of Education for the benefit of persons who are unable to attend the day sessions of the public schools. The night sessions will be held Monday, Wednesday and Friday nights between 7:15 and 9:15 o'clock during the six months from October 14 to April 14. No charge will be made for tuition.

The school this year will be on a larger scale than heretofore. The work has been subdivided as follows:

1.—A high school course, which secures to graduates a high school diploma. Completion of this course prepares for the study of law, medicine, dentistry and the like, or for admission to college.
2.—A two-year commercial course in bookkeeping and its allied subjects, or in stenography and its allied subjects. Completion of this course prepares for an office position.
3.—A civil service course, which prepares for the Federal or the city civil service examinations.
4.—A course in elementary subjects which prepares boys and girls for high school or other advanced work, and furnishes men and women an opportunity to review foundational studies.
5.—A course for foreigners—in reading, writing, spelling, arithmetic, etc., and in conversation in English. This course is especially valuable to a foreigner who desires to advance in the ways and customs of America.
Students who expect to pursue either a high school or a commercial course have been requested to apply for ad-

vance registration at the new Lincoln High School building, Park and Market streets, for enrollment and information as to the course to be taken, October 8, 9 or 10, between 7:15 and 9:15 P. M. An evening trade school will also be conducted at Eleventh and Davis streets. Instruction will be offered in woodwork of various kinds, in carpentry, cabinetmaking, pattern making, machine shop work, electrical construction, plumbing, gas fitting, mechanical and architectural drawing, cooking, sewing, millinery, dressmaking and the like. These branches will be taught by practical instructors who have served a number of years in their various specialties.

Evening schools will be opened at first in the new Lincoln High, Fallings, Albina Homestead, Thompson and the

School of Trades buildings. Scholars will be maintained at other points in the city if there is need for them.

Many Fish Distributed.

OREGON CITY, Or., Oct. 5.—(Special.)—S. S. Mohler, of this city, who left here in May, and who has been distributing 110,000 fish in 80 different lakes, for the Government, returned to his home in this city Thursday. Mr. Mohler's trip was very successful, only a few of the fish having perished on the trip. One trip covered over 60 miles, and only five of the fish were dead when the destination was reached. The work has been very satisfactory to the Government. Although hardships were encountered, the trip was made without mishap.
