IDAHO LOANS BIG

State Profits Well on Surplus
Land Funds.

YEARLY INTEREST \$97,000

Farm Mortgages Totalling \$1,500,
191 Meet Many Operating Ex-
penses of Government; School
Grant Resourceful Factor.

BOISE, Ida., Oct. 4.—(Special.)—The state of Idaho is doing a phenomenally large and profitable land business and the interest earnings on its loans go a long way towards meeting the expenses of the government, according to a report of that business that has just been made of record. Its farm loans made this year amount to \$1,005,606.33. The interest received from these loans amounts annually to \$97,000.

It has been the policy of the State Board of Land Commissioners in this state to never keep funds on hand that can be loaned and made to pay interest. The result is that the constantly using fund of this state available for loaning purposes is continually turned to bear a reasonable rate of interest.

Interest Income Big.

The total amount of loans now in force and secured by first mortgage in almost every instance, is \$1,509,191.33, and the total interest from this amount is \$163,472.28. The state has purchased \$204,758 worth of school bonds and receives from these interest amounting to \$21,220. It has in force a total of \$2,325,569.46 in bonds which bear a total interest of \$209,423.11.

But Idaho is not deriving all of its working funds from interest on its bonds and money loaned. It is gradually selling off at reasonable rates the vast amount of land in its possession. During the present year the state has sold so far 74,232.10 acres of land, which have brought a total of \$1,126,692.82. The state has also, so far, this year leased 212,252.42 acres of land and the rental from state lands leased has been \$48,925.41.

From all sources the total cash receipts amount today for the past year to \$2,294,337.35. The total Carey act fund receipts are for the year, \$55,686.25. The state lands sold have gone to the highest bidder at public auction, and the prices paid an acre have ranged from \$10 to \$20.

School Lands Extensive.

The school grant consists of sections 15 and 36 in every county, conservatively estimated to aggregate 2,650,000 acres. The state constitution restricts the sale of these lands to 25 sections in any one year. This restriction is considered not applicable to the special grant lands. At this rate it will take 155 2/3 years to dispose of the common school lands.

The beginning of October found a total balance on hand in the State Treasurer's office showing the balance carried by the various funds, of \$1,290,654.50. The interest earnings for

the nine months of the year amounted to \$96,724.16, while for the same nine months of the preceding year, 1911, the interest earnings were but \$78,526.68, showing an increase in interest earnings so far this year of \$18,197.48.

All balances carried in the various funds of the state are in a very flourishing condition.

CONDON FAIR OCTOBER 15

Gilliam, Sherman and Morrow Counties Plan for Big Event.

CONDON, Or., Oct. 5.—(Special.)—Preparations are being made here for the crowds that will attend the first Eastern Oregon Tri-County Fair, organized for the purpose of bringing about better farming conditions in Gilliam, Sherman and Morrow Counties. It will be held October 15 and 17, and will be the greatest representative gathering ever held in the three counties. The fair committee has secured five large tents for the stock and exhibit. There will be horse races, relay races and buccaroo stunts. Already there are numbers of earlies and late crops of wheat, vegetables and fruit having been harvested this year, there will be plenty of all kinds of farm produce to pick from.

The Town of Condon has subscribed over \$2000 to put the fair grounds in order and \$2000 will be given away in prizes, together with a number of silver cups donated by local people and business houses of Portland.

"CLEAN-UP" DAY SET

Governor Names October 19 to
Be Kept in State.

CREDIT MEN START MOVE

Letters Are Sent to 171 Commercial
Clubs Throughout Oregon Urg-
ing Them to Request Ex-
cutive to Act.

At the instance of the Portland Association of Credit Men, Governor West announced yesterday that he would call a general holiday Saturday, October 19, to be observed all over the state as a "clean-up" day.

The purpose of the "clean-up" day is to decrease fire losses by reducing the hazards of fire through the various forms of blaze protection. Several Eastern states have declared a similar holiday, but most of them are observing October 8, the anniversary of the great Chicago fire. The credit men had originally petitioned for the setting apart of October 12 for Oregon, but the Governor felt that it would be better to delay it a week later, inasmuch as October 12 is a legal holiday, Columbus day.

The Portland Association of Credit Men decided some time ago to enter the request with the Governor, but first addressed a letter to each of the 171 commercial clubs about the state urging them to file similar requests with the state executive. A large number of these organizations not only complied with this suggestion, but dispatched letters to the Portland association complimenting it upon its spirit of enterprise and pledging hearty support of the general programme.

The commercial body of the respective towns will be in charge of the ceremonies on the appointed day, although it is probable that some general plan will be outlined by the parent association in Portland. A campaign will be preached from the pulpits before the various civic bodies over the state and thoroughly rehearsed in the papers. The men who have engineered the plan are E. M. Underwood, R. B. Poucher and H. N. Graham, members of the fire insurance committee, and C. R. Miller, secretary of the Portland Association of Credit Men.

PIONEER PASSES 75 MARK

John Hall Celebrates Birthday at
Home Near Myrtle Creek.

ROSEBURG, Or., Oct. 5.—(Special.)—With many members of his family in attendance, John Hall, a pioneer resident of Douglas County and one of the best-known men in Southern Oregon, yesterday celebrated his 75th birthday at his country home near Myrtle Creek. A feature of the day's festivities was

a dinner prepared and served by Mrs. Hall.

John Hall was born in Ohio, and late in the 40's crossed the plains by ox-team and located in California. There he mined for several years, when he moved to Oregon and settled in the vicinity of Canyonville, at that time one of the most important towns between Jacksonville and Portland. After several years spent in the Canyonville vicinity, Mr. Hall moved to Myrtle Creek, where he has since resided. During his residence in the latter city Mr. Hall has been closely identified with the business interests, and from time to time has been active in those matters which served to advance the interests of southern Douglas county.

Of those from out of town who attended the celebration were John Hall, a son of Silverton; Mrs. A. C. Seely, a daughter of Roseburg; and Merle Davis, a grand-daughter, of Salem. Mr. Hall was the recipient of many beautiful tokens at the hands of his many friends and neighbors.

BIG LOGGING ROAD ASSURED

Metcalf Shingle Company to Have
Largest of Pay Rolls.

CENTRALIA, Wash., Oct. 5.—(Special.)—It has been reported in Toledo that the bonds for changing the construction of the Salmon Creek logging road, the gigantic logging enterprise to be launched in southeastern Lewis County by the Metcalf Shingle Company, have been sold and the deal is now a certainty. It is not known when active construction will begin, but it no doubt will be before January 1.

The assurance of the project means much benefit for Toledo and surround-

ing territory, as the money expended for timber alone will run into six figures. With the completion of the road, which includes the opening of six miles of new camps, the Metcalf Shingle Company will have by far the largest payroll of any corporation in Southwest Washington.

DEATH RESULT OF BURNS

Child Attempts to Start Fire With
Fatal Consequence.

WASHOUGAL, Wash., Oct. 5.—(Special.)—Esther Thomson, the 7-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Thomson, of this place, was so severely burned about the body Wednesday afternoon that she died Thursday morning at 5 o'clock.

She was in the house alone, and in attempting to build a fire was using a small can of coal oil when in some way her clothes caught fire. She ran, crying, from the house to the barn, where her mother and the others were. Her mother caught her and rolled her on the ground, but not before the little one was terribly burned. Everything was done for the little sufferer, but it was too late. She died quietly Thursday morning at 5 o'clock.

Funeral services will be held Friday and burial in the I. O. O. F. Cemetery at this place. The parents came from California a year ago. They have five other children.

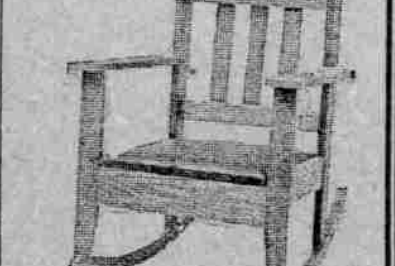
