GIRLS' BAND BIG SURPRISE

Race Track in Good Condition and
Fast Time Recorded—Pony and
Rider Disagree—Cotton Farm
Praised—Lights Out Now.

No star day could be imagined for a country fair than yesterday, and the great crowd at the Gresham fair-grounds showed that about everybody within reach felt the same way. I do not know how many entered the gate and passed through the stilt at the entrance, but I do know there were over 200 automobiles on the grounds. Taking that as a sort of basis for an estimate I should say there were between 4000 and 5000 people out to see the gates close on the great fair of 1912.

As I passed down the walks from the gate to the track—but stop just a minute. Let me first say that I got off of the train from Portland, a train of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company, which disembarks its passengers at a depot a couple of hundred yards south of the business center of the town.

Passing over that short distance, by the banks and postoffice, by the "Wanamaker" store, then a block further and a block to the west—and you are at the fairgrounds, and yet within a stone's throw of the main business part of the town.

I wanted to make this clear to show that the ease with which the grounds are reached has had much to do with the success of the fair. I have noticed that where the grounds of a show of any sort are far out of town the distance is a great drawback. If the State Fair was a couple of miles nearer the heart of Salem it would make a big difference every year in the gate receipts.

Girls' Band Is a Surprise.
But to get back to the walk between the gate and the race track. As I was passing along I heard one young fellow accost another after this fashion: "Hello, Tom; want to hear the Oak Grove Girls' Band?"

"That 'rot' me to thinking about the girls' band, and I crossed over the track and seated myself in the grandstand that I might hear them play. As I took a seat I looked up and saw about a dozen girls ranging in age from 8 to 15 years. Think of a girls' band tooting a horn in a band! I made up my mind that there would soon be some weird wind-jamming. But I had another thing coming, and I soon "think" it for they started blowing just at that moment, and every ear was intent in listening, every eye fixed on these young ladies.

And so it was through the afternoon—splendid music, good selections well played. Later I went up to the stand and got their names, for it is no more than their just dues to have their names published, making them, thereby, a part of the Gresham fair. Here they are: Misses Hester Armstrong, Ada Starkweather, Edith Griffiths, Ellen Worthington, Lottie Everson, Jean Starkweather, Frances Griffiths, Madge Ellis, Edith Turner, Katie Oetkins and Ruth Worthington. Professor Roy Searies is the teacher and leader and L. E. Armstrong is business manager.

Jim Hill Wins Fast Race.
I think the little town of Oak Grove, which is a small place on the Oregon Water Power Electric road, about half way between Portland and Oregon City, ought to feel mighty proud of this band. And their rendition of such excellent music surely gives great credit to Professor Searies, their instructor.

During the afternoon there were three or four mighty good races, and the time made was creditable. The track was in good order, having been completely dried up since the dampness of Thursday. There was a free-for-all race, in which there were four entries, and the time made was 1:24 1-2, 2:22 and 3:24. This race was taken by Jim Hill in three straight heats.

The free-for-all trot was won in straight heats by Oakland Moore, the time being 2:26, 2:27 and 2:28. Then there was a pony race in which there were four contestants. This was won by Pet. Maude being second—time unknown and uncalled for. I say there were four contestants—there were four or about two-thirds of the way around. Then there was a disagreement between one of the ponies and his rider. The rider wanted to go around and win the race, the pony wanted to go fishing or something like that. Anyhow the rider was thrown and the pony took to the fields.

Cotton Farm Fine.
I passed again through the display of farm products in the agricultural building and it sure was an encouraging sight to see such exhibits. There is no use talking about good yields of such good vegetables, fruits and cereals as are produced anywhere on earth can be grown and are annually grown on the fine farms around Gresham.

And, speaking of these farms, reminds me that one cannot go to Gresham by rail, or motor, or horseback without seeing the splendid farm of W. W. Cotton, which bounds Gresham on the west. 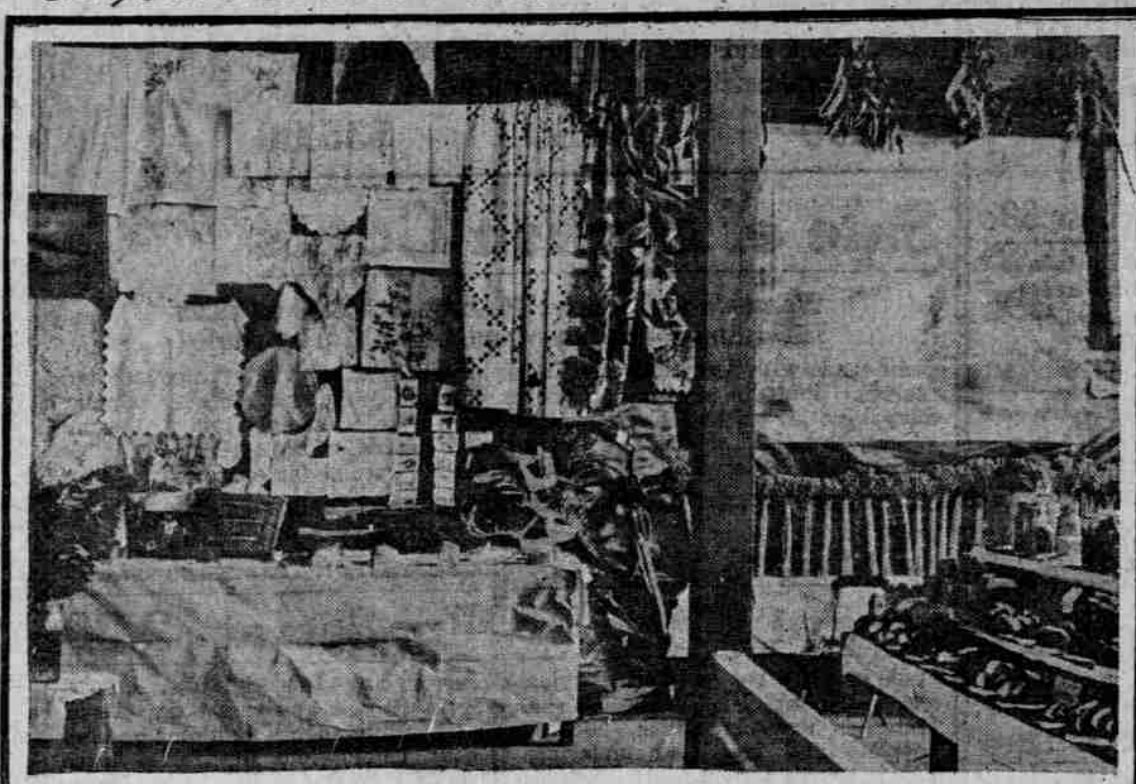
Next Year in Prospect.

SOME EXHIBITS AT COUNTY FAIR AT GRESHAM.

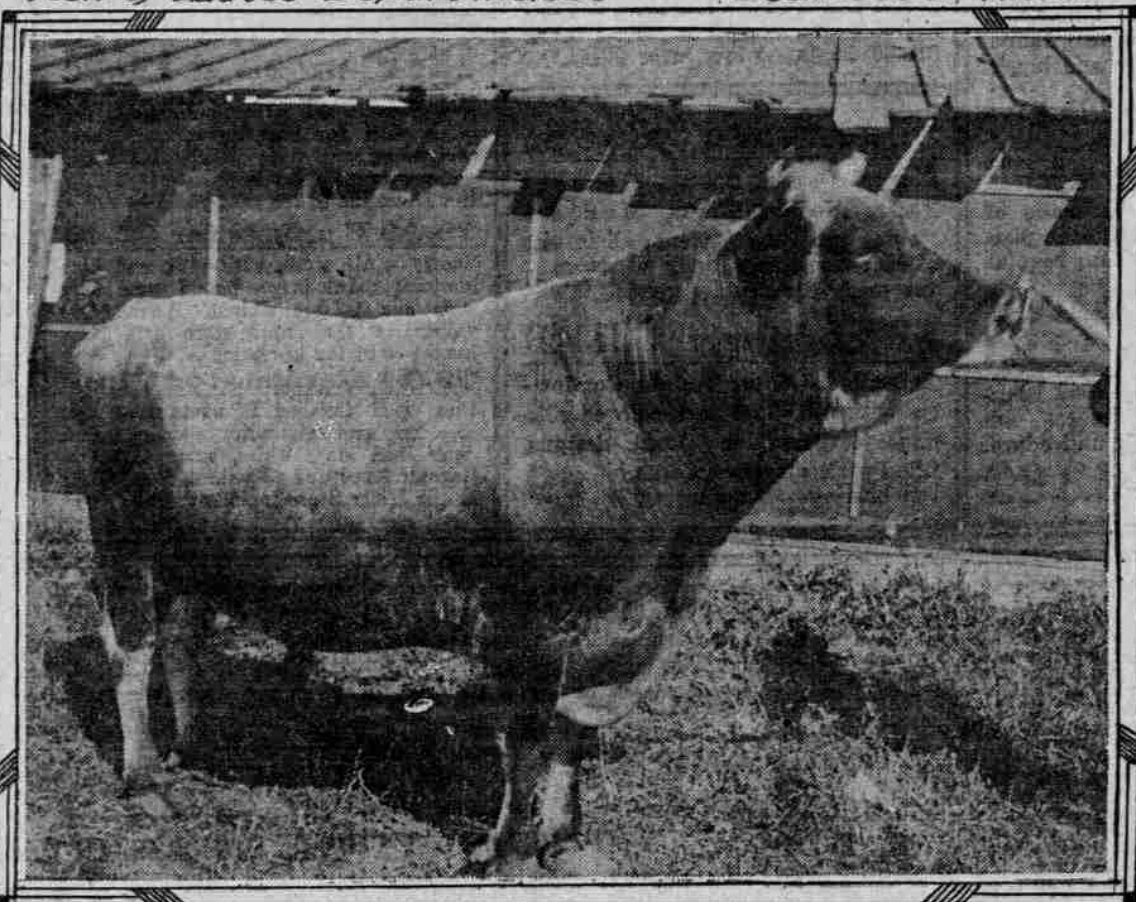


Chrysanthemums and Dahlias

MINISTERS SEEK DIVORCE

Two English Preachers Name German Tutor Co-respondent.

LONDON, Oct. 5.—(Special).—The number of divorce cases entered in the lists for October courts is about as usual, and includes several actions of a sensational nature.

Two well-known clergymen are the petitioners against their wives, the co-respondent in both actions being a German tutor. A claim for substantial damages is made by a popular actor against a man of means who is not unknown in political circles. There are also one or two cases in which the names of persons moving in high society are mentioned.

Last Climb at 82 Years.

GENEVA, Oct. 5.—(Special).—A Swiss hunter found in the Val Bionla, near Lugano, a gray-haired man named Domenico Poli suffering from injuries and exhausted. Poli, who was evidently dying, told the hunter his name, his age (82) and his birthplace, Ferrara, in Italy, and added that while climbing in the mountain above the valley he had fallen, and was trying to crawl to the hospice for help when his strength failed.

"It is my last climb," said the old man, and fainted. The hunter went for assistance, and Poli was taken to the hospice, where his injuries were attended to, but he died two hours later.

GRANGE DEFINES STAND

MAJORITY AMENDMENT IS STRONGLY INDORSED.

Belief Expressed That Excessive Use of Initiative Is Worst Enemy to System.

LA GRANDE, Or., Oct. 5.—(Special).—Indorsement of the so-called majority amendment to the constitution, to be voted on at the November election, was given by Blue Mountain Grange No. 345, at its last meeting. The grange unanimously adopted a resolution, in which it held that the present excessive use of the initiative is its worst enemy and expressed the belief that a remedy lies in the proposed measure, making necessary a majority vote of all electors at any election to change the constitution.

The resolution adopted by the grange follows:

Whereas, Blue Mountain Grange has been and is friendly to the initiative and referendum and since it is the sense of this Grange that the present excessive use of the initiative is its worst enemy—there are now before the people of Oregon certain proposed constitutional amendments that threaten with calamity the business and industrial interests of the state;

Therefore, we believe there is some inherent weakness in the present form of the initiative that must be strengthened.

We believe the most grave weakness is this: It is possible in Oregon, under the initiative in its present form, to amend the constitution of the state by a minority of the electors thereof.

Because of this, that is because of the fact that some of the amendments may be enacted, we are constantly menaced by the proposal and by a strenuous effort on the part of some for the adoption of constitutional amendments that contain in their visionary and ruinous ideas, ideas that in their nature and purpose tend to undermine the principles upon which our laws are based, upon which business rests, and upon which the purpose of our lives and the welfare of our homes has been established, and by which they are maintained. Thus the fundamental laws of business and industry are made unstable and insecure. We regard this chaos and uncertainty as detrimental to progress, both industrially and socially. Therefore, be it

Resolved, by Blue Mountain Grange, No. 345, that we indorse that proposed constitutional amendment to be voted upon November 5 next, that provides that a majority of all the legal electors voting at an election shall be required for the adoption of an amendment to the state constitution.

Resolved, That by what worthy means we can command the support of the electors of Oregon to vote No. 310 Yes.

Unanimously adopted by Blue Mountain Grange, No. 345, at its last regular meeting, October 2, 1912.

She betrayed herself by her walk. Although she stated that she only did it for fun, she was sent to prison for 14 days.

BERLIN HAS NEW "TOY"

"Kolosossal Boarding Palace" Is Slight for German Residents.

BERLIN, Oct. 5.—(Special).—Berlin has a new toy, a truly colossal caravan modeled on the lines of the giant "apartment hotels" of New York. You cannot build "skyscrapers" in Germany, so instead of shooting up 40 or 50 stories in the air, the builders of the "Boarding Palace" in Kurfurstendamm have spread it over an enormous area. Nothing in town is nearly so "kolossal" except the police presidency in Alexander Platz, which is a district by itself. The "Boarding Palace" hopes to end the misery of homeless families and "bachelors" who have hitherto had to content themselves with precarious existence in a German "pensional."

It has 600 rooms, with bath, enormous restaurants, coffee-rooms, grills and "American bars," and includes a full-fledged sanatorium and Turkish bath "parlor" among its other attractions.

In tune with the tastes of the New Berlin, the interior is the last word in overdone ornateness and gaudiness. For the moment the "Boarding Palace" outshines the Royal Castle and the Hohenzollern Museum as a "sight," and all Berlin is flocking to see it.

CLEVER RASCALS CAUGHT

Russian Police Break Up Gigantic Counterfeiting Scheme.

ODESSA, Oct. 5.—(Special).—For some considerable time past the circulation in large quantities of false 100-ruble (\$50) notes, most widely in Northern Russia and Siberia, has baffled the best efforts of the detective police to discover their origin and sources of distribution; but they have recently come upon the track of the clever counterfeitters. The false notes are described as being highly and artistically finished productions, and extremely difficult of detection.

A certain Dunayevski, professionally a commercial traveler, whose frequent journeys between the Riviera and

Blagoveshensk, attracted the observation of the police, was recently arrested on the western frontier when about to enter Russia. He was found to be in possession of counterfeit 100-ruble notes to the amount of 150,000 rubles. Correspondence found upon Dunayevski led to the arrest of a Blagoveshensk merchant of reputable standing named Semenov and two men named Reshlin and Liebenhaft.

About the same time another member of the band, whose name is not given, left behind him in a Nice hotel a valise containing 1,500,000 in false 100-ruble notes. This person has not yet been traced. The correspondence found upon Dunayevski and documents seized at Blagoveshensk indicate that there is somewhere secreted, probably at some place on the Riviera, a store of no fewer than 3,000,000 counterfeit 100-ruble notes ready to be put into circulation in Russia.

Women Physicians Increase.

BERLIN, Oct. 5.—(Special).—It is stated that there are now 175 qualified medical women in Germany. They are distributed in the cities of Germany as follows: Berlin, 50; Munich, 7; Frankfurt-on-the-Main, 5; Hamburg, 3; Düsseldorf, 2; Breslau, 2; Karlsruhe, 2; and Bad Elster, each two, while a number of other places have one each. Constable Catlin went to Lebanon last night to arrest Houser, but before he arrived there Lebanon officers telephoned to Sheriff Smith that Houser had left Lebanon and was being driven to Albany. The sheriff captured him when he reached this city.
