

CHILD'S VICTIM OF "UNLOADED" GUN

Three-Year-Old Viola Luretta
Second to Perish by Care-
less Handling of Rifle.

CAMAS TO HAVE ORDINANCE

Two Tragedies in One Week Deter-
mine People of District to Provide
Against Promiscuous Use of
Deadly Weapons.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Oct. 5.—(Special.)—Little Viola Luretta, 3 years old, was shot in the head at noon today at her home in Camas, and died an hour afterward. The gun was the same one that had killed Howard Marshbank, 12 years old, just a week ago today, and was in the hands of Gerald Huycke, a brother of the lad who shot Marshbank. Both shootings were accidental.

Gerald Huycke, 18-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Huycke, about noon took the rifle from his home to the Van Buskirk's and endeavored to get the boy, about his own age, to go hunting with him. Several children were playing on the front porch, Mrs. Van Buskirk being in the kitchen. Gerald said he had unloaded the gun, but some one else loaded it again.

As the Van Buskirk boy had to work he was unable to go hunting, so while Gerald was sitting on the porch, with the cocked gun on his shoulder, it was discharged. He said that some of the playful manner, but they said, at the coroner's inquest, that they did not.

Death Soon Followed.

The bullet struck Viola between the eyes, above the brow, but did not penetrate the skull. Death resulted in an hour. When Gerald realized what he had done he was prostrated and suffered nervous convulsions and was put to bed by a doctor called.

W. J. Knapp, County Coroner, from this city, held an inquest and the jury returned a verdict of accidental shooting.

An older brother of Viola—there are seven brothers and sisters left in the family—took the ill-fated gun and chopped off the breech and another ran away with the barrel.

Howard Marshbank, with Cecil Huycke, went out hunting last Saturday. When the Marshbank boy was a short distance in the brush, the bullet passing through Marshbank's left shoulder. It is thought that he will recover, as no vital organs were pierced.

Will Have Ordinance.

There is no ordinance against firearms in Camas, but the residents there now say that they soon will have one. The boys had a hunting license, so far as can be learned. Marshbank and Huycke are draymen and teamsters.

SALIVA ANALYSIS IS TEST

Doping of Horses Is Effectually
Prevented in Paris.

PARIS, Oct. 5.—(Special.)—The practice of "doping" race horses, introduced from America, has lately been occupying the attention of the authorities, as in spite of the rule forbidding it there is a suspicion that it is still frequently resorted to. In practice much difficulty is experienced in discovering fraud. It has often been remarked that runners have passed the post in an unnatural state of foam and sweat, and close observation has detected an exaggerated dilation of the pupil and a superabundant flow of saliva. Such symptoms have naturally aroused the suspicion that the animal has been given strychnine, caffeine, sparteine, or some similar alkaloid compound used in "doping," but proof is difficult to obtain.

During the last two years, however, Professor Fraenkel of Vienna, has been experimenting with a view to finding a scientific infallible test, and has succeeded finally by analyzing the saliva. His method of testing the saliva in a racetrack and led to frequent fines and punishments, and the French Racing Society commissioned Professor Kauffmann to study the method on the spot and report. The result having been favorable the society decided to enforce the above quoted rule, according to the Austrian method, and recently at Longchamp four winners were subjected to the test. Some of the saliva was caught on a wad of sterilized cotton wool by a veterinary surgeon, who immediately placed it in a bottle. The bottles were then sealed and handed to M. Caillou, who sent them to Professor Kauffmann for analysis, without giving the names of the horses. It has been resolved to continue the test at the next few Longchamp meetings, and other societies are already following the lead given by the French Racing Society.

EMPEROR IS NOT WELL YET

German Ruler Still Shows Ravages
of Recent Illness.

BERLIN, Oct. 5.—(Special.)—Despite the statements that have appeared regarding the health of the German Emperor, it is said on good authority that His Majesty is very far from well, and a further breakdown is feared unless he is very careful.

The Emperor's recent attack has left him with a cough which, if not necessarily severe, is very irritating and when mounting his horse the sprightliness and ease with which His Imperial Majesty has formerly got into the saddle are missing. Clearly the limbs are still somewhat stiff and the Emperor's face is somewhat drawn, as if he was subject to occasional twinges of pain.

GIRL ANXIOUS TO FIGHT

Russian Beauty Asks Permission to
Serve as Soldier.

ODESSA, Oct. 5.—(Special.)—Yevdokia Poletayeva, 18 years of age, described as the beauty of the Ladozhskaya district on the Kuban, tall, lithe, and supple of muscle, a daring rider, a crack shot, and an accomplished equestrian, recently petitioned the Hetman of the Kuban Cossacks at Ekaterinodar to be rated as an ordinary trooper in the First Ekaterinodar Cossacks, who are under orders to proceed to Persia.

The militant girl's petition puzzled the Hetman's staff, some of whom were for and others against the vouchsafing of the unusual request. Finally the

Hetman very politely and considerably declined to accede to the petition, but complimented Yevdokia on her patriotic spirit.

Yevdokia is displeased with the decision, and to her intimate friends decries the chief's lamentable ignorance of the inspiring power of a woman trooper at the head of a Cossack sotnia. She does not understand why her tribesman, the Azerbaijan, have not already wiped out the troublesome Shah-sevans. Her relatives are now keeping the girl under close surveillance lest she should leave for the Persian frontier in male attire, to join her people as a volunteer trooper.

The murderer, a sickly and undergrown youth of 20, Pittsburgher by name, being unable to deny his guilt, endeavored to extenuate it with the object of saving his head. He pretended that his fatal blow had been preceded by a quarrel and a struggle, and if he can persuade the jury to believe this he cannot be condemned to death.

LEWISTON TO HAVE CANAL CELEBRATION

Waterways Association Is Now
Upon Firm Working Basis
and Permanent.

WORK TO BE ON OLD LINES

Co-operation to Be Solicited From
Commercial Clubs and Those In-
terested in Development of
Inland Empire.

LEWISTON, Idaho, Oct. 5.—(Special.)—The Columbia-Snake Rivers Waterways Association has been placed on a firm working basis, based on the organization of the National Rivers and Harbors Congress, and will solicit co-operation of all the commercial clubs in its embrace and individuals who feel interest in the improvement of the waterways of the country. A permanent organization was effected today.

Topics which were scheduled to deal with the obtaining of an adequate appropriation for the completion of The Dalles-Celilo Canal by 1915, opening of the Upper Columbia and Snake Rivers, the improvement of the river bottoms to permit navigation the year around and solicitation of co-operation of all the towns of the Columbia and Snake Rivers Basins with the companies engaged in the operation of open river steamers on these rivers were minutely and comprehensively discussed.

\$1,250,000 Asked for Canal.

Resolutions which now place before Congress the appropriation of \$1,250,000 for the Celilo Canal and the improvement of the river were drafted and adopted by the association. Copies of these resolutions will be sent to every member of the House of Representatives.

In appreciation of the sacrifice and efforts of Joseph N. Teal, of Portland, and Captain W. S. Buchanan, deceased, who have given much of their time and financial support to the open river movement, resolutions were adopted.

The convention today pledged itself to support and co-operate with open river transportation companies and particularly the company of Portland, if it will maintain a regular schedule on the rivers to serve this territory. Lewiston was indorsed as the city in which the celebration of the opening of the Celilo Canal should be held, and interest was quickened in it by all the commercial clubs of the Inland Empire.

Improvements Not Costly.

In the opinion of steamboat captains who have piled on these rivers for the past 30 years, United States engineers who have been engaged in investigating the conditions and improvement of the rivers, and steamboat owners, the Snake and Columbia Rivers can, with the expenditure of a small amount of money by the Government, be subject to all-year navigation.

It is believed by many delegates that the action of the Lewiston convention will have a far-reaching effect on Congress as to the needs of the towns of the Inland Empire, Columbia and Snake River Basins, which would be served by an open river from Lewiston to the Pacific Ocean.

MORMON LANDS STOLEN

SETTLERS IN MEXICO ILL-
TREATED BY REBELS.

Bishop Says Property Was Wantonly
Destroyed and Church Desecrated
in Colonia Morelos.

DOUGLAS, Ariz., Oct. 5.—Mexicans living in the vicinity of the Colonia Morelos Mormon colony have confiscated lands belonging to the American settlers, stolen from homes and desecrated the church, according to Bishop C. W. Lillwhite, who, with a small party, arrived here today after a precarious overland journey. The Mormon Church dignitary tells of a critical condition in the almost deserted American settlement.

"Live the Liberator" death to the Mormons, read one of the placards posted in the neighborhood," said Bishop Lillwhite. "Local Mexicans" he related, have banded together to hold the Mormon property and have agreed to resist by force of arms if necessary. Nearly every home in the colony has a parlor organ. All these are ruined, the ivory keys broken into splinters. Pictures are smashed and clocks gutted of their works and thrown into the streets. The church was entered, the organ was mutilated and the sacramental seats were stolen. Even the sewing machines in the homes were broken with hammers."

A report of the Mormon bishop's investigation has been made to the State Department at Washington through consular sources.

Invaders Are Repulsed
Fort Worden Maneuvers Show That
Puget Sound Is Safe.

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., Oct. 5.—The maneuvers just held in Chinacum Valley by 12 companies of Coast Artillery demonstrated that Fort Worden, the key to Puget Sound, could not be taken by a rear attack of a hostile army.

The companies were formed into three battalions of four companies each. Two battalions made up an attacking force, which was supposed to have effected a landing on the Strait of Fuca in the neighborhood of Dungeness and, after making a detour march, to have arrived in Chinacum Valley in the rear of the fort. The third battalion was in the field to meet the attacking force and was driven from its post after a battle, but, retreating to a second position, blocked the invaders thoroughly.

Hangings Are Opposed
Wallace Says Capital Punishment Is
for Poor Only.

LONG BEACH, Cal., Oct. 5.—"Capital punishment is for the poor and not for the rich," declared Acting Governor Wallace today, addressing the South California Methodist Episcopal Conference. He added that he was opposed to capital punishment, even if it were right in principle, because it worked out unevenly and said he expected to reprieve several prisoners.
