### FEW ELK NOW LEFT

#### General Maus Is Advocate of Protection Measures.

### BUFFALO ARE GUARDED

Area of Sufficient Extent for Good Pasturage Is Recommended by United States Officer for Big Game.

### VANCOUVER, BARRACKS, Wash., Oct. 11.—(Special.)

That the game in the West is fast disappearing and that in a comparatively few years there will be no elk, unless something is done soon to protect them, is the belief of Brigadier-General Marion P. Maus, commanding officer of the Department of the Columbia, who has just returned from an official inspection of the posts in the Yellowstone National Park, and other sections of this Department. A plea is made to the B. F. O. E. to assist.

Tonight General Maus said: "It is observed that the game in every section of the Northwest is fast disappearing—buffalo, elk, the great mule deer and, in fact, all varieties of both four-legged and feathered game are rapidly diminishing. It is noticeable that in remote districts, practically no attention whatever is paid to the violation of the game laws out of season. It is the outsider who is killed without regard to season. There is more game in some of the old states of the East than in some of our own sparsely settled regions of the Northwest."

"Buffalo are guarded within the park and those, even, are subject to attack under favorable conditions, as a few years ago these were almost exterminated."

"That the park is a boon to the adjacent states of Wyoming, Montana and Idaho, to some extent, is well known, as it is the breeding grounds for elk, deer and other game which drifts outside and forms a supply and this is a great benefit to those states as an attraction to the settler and to the man of means."

"Fish and game form an asset to a country and if not for any other reason, this should not be lost sight of by those who wish to settle up this great region."

"It can be candidly stated that the violations of the game laws are by the people who live in the country and not the man who has money and can afford to travel to seek favorable places in which to hunt during an outing. What he kills may be practically disregarded."

"Heavy license safeguarded. Wyoming has so safeguarded herself by exorbitant charges for licenses and requirements for guides for each person hunting that only a man of considerable means can afford to shoot in that state, while it can easily be shown that the bars are let down and the laws are violated openly in some sections with little attention paid thereto. But the saddest point of view is that regarding the elk, which formerly could leave the mountain region in winter and work their way down the mountain as the snows increased in depth and grazing became impossible on the mountain, lower ground could be secured where they wintered."

"As this country has become settled and the valleys where elk once grazed have been taken up and enclosed by wire fences, these poor animals come down and starve to death. It is estimated that from 5000 to 7000 elk die in Jackson's Hole every year from absolute starvation. "It is believed that the general government has made some attempts to appropriate funds to relieve these animals and that the state has also appro-

prated an inefficient sum in the same manner.

**Winter Pasture Needed.** "What is needed is that an area of sufficient extent should be purchased where the elk may go and live during the severe winters and at the same time be supplied with a reasonable amount of hay."

"Would it not seem that the great Benevolent Protective Order of Elks, whose object, it is said, is to promote the welfare of humanity and whose name is taken from this noble animal, whose teeth are bought by the thousands, would do something towards the aid of these poor suffering creatures? How easy it would be for them to raise a sum of money to procure a place and food to save so many thousands of elk annually. Then the state of Wyoming could be more liberal in the laws, and while enforcing them more uniformly to all, extend to thousands the recreation and enjoyment in the field of sport which would add greatly to the happiness of thousands of people."

### PROSPEROUS AND KINDLY CITIZEN OF MEHAMA ANSWERS DEATH'S CALL.



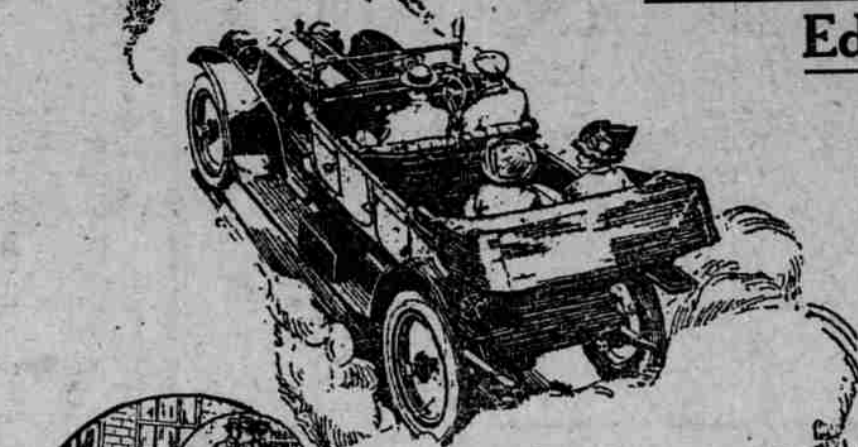

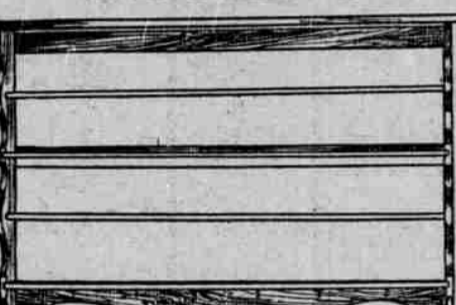

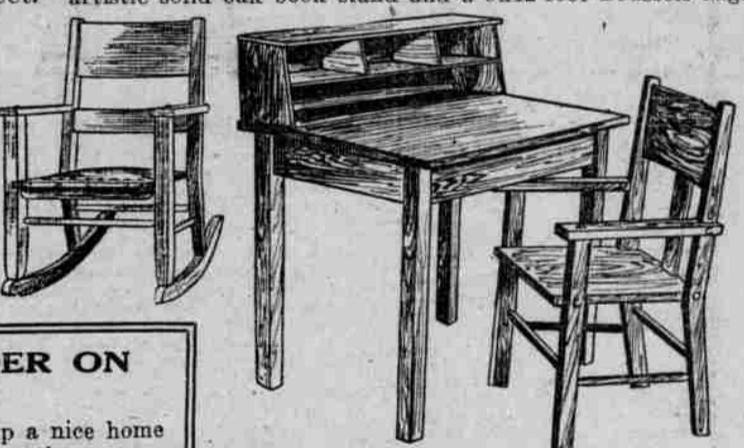

### DAILY BATH IS URGED

STUDENTS ADVISED CONCERNING HEALTH TOPICS.

Instructors in Physical Education and Bacteriology Address Oregon "Aggies."

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Or., Oct. 12.—(Special.)—The second convocation of the year at Oregon Agricultural College was in charge of the department of physical education and bacteriology. The heads of these departments impressed upon the students the importance of observing strictly all laws of hygiene and sanitation in order to preserve their health and be in a position to receive the greatest possible benefit from their college work. "Baths" was the subject discussed by Dr. E. J. Stewart, director of physical education. In explaining that the bath must be adjusted to the needs of the individual instead of vice versa, the speaker said: "Sometimes they do more harm than good. 'After violent exercise on the field, in the gymnasium, or even after a brisk walk a student may have so stimulated his physique as to have brought it to the point of exhaustion. If he takes a hot bath after it, the effect is further exhausting, as it stimulates him still more. The proper temperature for a bath after such exercise is merely tepid, about the same as the blood in the body, 98 degrees. Such a bath has the effect of soothing and reducing pressure on the spinal column and the brain, acting as a generally restful agent. "Shower and plunge baths should be taken with care. A plunge in water 70 to 75 degrees acts as a bracing tonic to a robust person. The action of water under 70 degrees is to stimulate heart action. If taken suddenly it has a tendency to shock the nervous system, and therefore a person who is not robust should never take a cold bath unless under doctor's advice. A tepid bath, which is soothing rather than stimulating, is good for all sexes and ages. The athletes who have become bruised and sore take a warm bath,
