Bankers and Merchants Predict Increased Prosperity in All Trades.

RELIEF SEEMS GENERAL

The business of the country has become divorced from politics, said W. P. Lippman, Wolf & Co., yesterday, referring to the Presidential election and any effect it might have in commercial circles.

Local Issues Declared Important. F. A. Freeman, cashier of the Lumbermen's National Bank, said yesterday that he regarded the Presidential election as having less vital importance to Oregon than many of the local issues.

Ill Effects Discouraged. "Whatever ill effect the change of administration might have been expected to have had on the business situation," said E. Woodward, of Woodman & Hartman, National Bank, "and business will go on as usual."
