Whether Tariff Shall Be Sole Subject Rests With President-Elect.

HOUSE DESIRES HARMONY

Underwood Wants to Reform Every Schedule, but Says Manner of Doing It Will Depend on Wishes of Executive.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—Senator Simmons of North Carolina, who had charge of the Democratic tariff bills in the Senate last session, and who may be chairman of the finance committee until March...

Whether the tariff question should be considered by schedule or in a general bill, he was not ready to say. He thought, however, that a majority would want to take up the schedules separately...

To President-elect Wilson will be left the task of determining whether the tariff alone is to be considered at the special session of Congress...

Representative Underwood, chairman of the ways and means committee of the House, said today he would make no decision on either of these points until he had talked with President-elect Wilson...

BRYAN TO ACCEPT?

Leaders Sure Nebraskan Will Be Secretary of State.

WILSON'S DESIRES KNOWN

President-elect Wishes to Honor Distinguished Democrat and to Make Him Ally Rather Than Critic of Administration.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Nov. 30.—If the opinion of some of the leading Democratic Senators is to be relied on, William J. Bryan is to accept appointment as secretary of state in the Wilson Cabinet, his personal preferences to the contrary notwithstanding.

The understanding is that Mr. Wilson has been and is desirous of having Bryan in his Cabinet, not only to have his advice and counsel, but to extend to him that honor to which his long party service entitles him.

Limit Placed in Criticism. Aside from the pecuniary loss he would suffer by reason of accepting a Cabinet office, Mr. Bryan, by becoming Secretary of State, would be, in a way, subservient to the will of the President and would be obliged to shape his course according to that of the Executive.

Mr. Bryan still has his eye on the Presidency, and the fact that he has been thrice defeated has not yet convinced him that that office is beyond his reach. Moreover, now that the Democrats are about to come into power, Bryan is very earnest in advocating a constitutional amendment limiting Presidents to one term.
