

BURNS' OWN STORY OF PURSUIT TOLD

Detective Says Hockin Quit Conspirators When Murder Plots Developed.

MEN "HIGHER UP" SOUGHT

Mayor Alexander, of Los Angeles, First to Employ Sleuth, Who Subsequently Found Plot Against Him Thickening.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 30.—William J. Burns' story of his pursuit of the McNamara and Galt dynamite explosion was told by him at the dynamite conspiracy trial today.

At the time of the explosion on October 1, 1910, he said, he was on a train from San Francisco to Los Angeles and the next day he, as a detective, was employed by Mayor Alexander, of Los Angeles, to run down the dynamiters. He remained on the Pacific Coast until the latter part of December, when he returned to Chicago. In Chicago, he said, he met Herbert S. Hockin, now secretary of the Iron Workers' Union. Hockin is accused by the Government of having betrayed the dynamiters while he himself was a dynamiter.

Hockin Opposed to Killing.
Mr. Burns, in substance, testified: "Hockin told me he would not have met me if it were not for the fact that the dynamiters were going to do a lot of killing. He said John J. McNamara, then secretary of the union, had employed James B. McNamara and McManigal to kill as many people as possible to bring about the release of the men. I told Hockin he was late with his information, as I knew all the facts already."

"Then I asked him where he got his information that people on the Pacific Coast were going to blow me up. He said Olaf A. Tveitmo, of San Francisco, was looking for the plot. I told him I believed Tveitmo would do it if he had a chance, for I had opposed Tveitmo in the San Francisco graft investigation, and he had sent my son, Raymond, to Minnesota to get a photograph of Tveitmo in the penitentiary uniform and had it published in San Francisco."

Men Higher Up Demanded.
"I asked Hockin if it wasn't true that every member of the Iron Workers' executive board knew about the explosions. He said neither they nor President Frank M. Ryan knew what John J. did except, perhaps, Eugene J. Clancy, of San Francisco. I told him it wasn't possible for money to be appropriated every month for McNamara without others higher up knowing it. I told Hockin I proposed to get the men higher up. I didn't want merely local men. He said John J. was the man I wanted."

"I offered to pay Hockin to come into my employ, but he said he would accept only his expenses. I told him at that time Los Angeles had ceased to pay me and I had not only to fight dynamiters, but also a class of men opposed to civic decency in San Francisco."

Watch Set Cautiously.
"I told him that on the day after the Los Angeles explosion I had informed Mayor Alexander that John J. McNamara and Tveitmo were behind the explosion. I impressed him with the fact that I didn't want to arrest John J. and James B. and depend on their making confessions and I was afraid to watch John J. at Indianapolis too much as they might learn of it and the whole thing would blow up."

Questioned by Senator J. W. Kern for the defense, Hockin said that McNamara's first confession in Chicago shortly after the arrests, Burns was asked:

"Did McNamara implicate anyone besides the McNamaras?"
"He mentioned only Michael J. Young, of Boston, in connection with the explosion at Springfield, Mass., and he implicated Hockin as having procured nitroglycerine and as having employed him to blow up a building in Detroit."

District Attorney Miller said that one more witness for the Government would be called on Monday and then the Government would rest its case.

Hockin Described as "Spy."
Raymond J. Burns, called by William J. Burns, testified to more conversations with Hockin, whom he described as a "spy" within the ranks of the union.

In February, 1911, Hockin again met me in Chicago," said Burns. "I inquired for details about the Los Angeles explosion. Hockin said he had learned that Olaf A. Tveitmo, of San Francisco, was paying money to M. A. Schmidt through Edward Nockels, a union official in Chicago. Tveitmo himself was taking care of David Caplan. Caplan and Schmidt were the ones who, Hawkins said, had helped J. B. McNamara to blow up the Times building."

"Hockin also stated that in the previous November J. J. McNamara had met Tveitmo at St. Louis when it was arranged for three more explosions in Los Angeles. The next month I told Hockin there had been some other explosions about the country and I asked about them. He said he knew nothing of them."

"When Hockin told you Tveitmo and Anton Johannsen were planning to blow up W. J. Burns in San Francisco or Seattle by putting a bomb in his room, did Hockin tell you the source of his information?" asked District Attorney William N. Harding, for the defense.

"Hockin told me he had learned from J. J. McNamara that they were planning to get rid of W. J. Burns on the Pacific Coast by a recent shooting, which was carried into court on a cot."

Mrs. Hawkins testified that a few days before the explosion caused a loss of \$10,000 on the property of Albert von Spreckelsen in Indianapolis, in 1908, she was told by Ernest G. W. Bases, an Iron Workers Union official, that something was going to happen on jobs where non-union workers were employed.

"He told me to look in the newspapers the next day and read about it," said Mrs. Hawkins.

"In the papers I saw nothing. Then he told me it did not come off that night, but to watch the next night. I did, and about midnight heard the explosion. Bases called me up on the telephone and told me I must keep my mouth shut. He said if I didn't I would be killed."

The witness said she was shot several weeks ago while hunting.

TIMBER CHANGE IS DUE

FUTURE PROFITS TO COME FROM SAVING WASTE.

Forest Service Holds Prices Cannot Advance Without Increasing Use of Substitutes.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—(Special.)—"The situation which confronts the wood-using industries embraces conditions which are certain to work against the continuation of the present methods of production and organization. The influence of some of these is already felt to a degree that makes continued profits along present lines extremely uncertain," is the statement made in Bulletin 126, of the Forest Service, soon to be issued. The document deals with tendencies of forest utilization. Continuing the bulletin says: "Production has outrun consumption until a condition of over-supply has been reached. This has prevailed without much change for four years."

"Side by side with the present over-cutting exists an excess capacity of production, amounting in some of the principal timber states to from 50 to 100 per cent. This excess of capacity facilitates overproduction whenever conditions become in any way favorable."

"Efforts to safeguard the timber supply against the ill effects of windfall, insects and wasteful lumbering have been successful to a degree which insures a continuation of the timber supply for many years to come."

"The increased use of substitutes for wood has brought the demand for lumber almost, if not quite, to a standstill and promises still further to decrease the demand in the future."

"Prices for medium and low grades of lumber have remained practically at a standstill and promises still further to decrease the demand in the future."

"It is obvious that future profits must come from increased utilization—more adjustment of total supply to demand will scarcely meet the situation."

"Possible starting points are not lacking. One such point is found in the fact that the minor wood-using industries are going to the forest for their raw material, when in many cases inferior materials from the sawmills would fully meet their needs. Approximately 75 per cent of the 140,000,000 railroad ties used each year are hewed. These could as well be sawed. By making the ties at the sawmill a considerable part of the timber now going into inferior lumber could be turned to that use. Moreover, such material comes from top logs and from hearts of large logs, which are often so knotty as to throw the lumber into the lower grades. Hewed ties now come from the best middle-sized growing trees, which in 25 years would make excellent saw timber."
