

TERM OF OLCOTT'S ELECTION IN DOUBT

Because of Appointive Period
Served, Two or Four Years
Is Question Now.

STATE ROUTINE DISTURBED

Probability Is That Secretary Will
Stay for Longer Incumbency, as
Precedent of Other Offices
Indicates That Right.

SALEM, Or., Nov. 30.—(Special.)—Whether Governor West shall make out the certificate of the election of Secretary Olcott showing that Olcott was elected for a two-year term or a four-year term is a question which will come up to the executive during the next week or two. With the official canvass of the votes completed it falls on the Governor to issue the certificate of election. In such certificate it states the number of years for which the respective candidates are elected.

Secretary Olcott was originally appointed Secretary of State during the Spring of 1911 by Governor West, following the death of Frank W. Benson, then Secretary of State. Mr. Benson had been re-elected to the office of Secretary of State in 1910, his second term starting with the first of 1911.

Appointive Power Set Forth.
The appointive power can fill a vacancy only until the next general election and not for the unexpired term. Consequently, for the first time, a Secretary of State was elected in a different year than a Governor.

The constitutional provision which gives the appointive power to the Governor, article V, section 16, provides as follows:
"When, during a recess of the Legislative Assembly, a vacancy shall happen in any office, the appointment of which is vested in the Legislative Assembly, or when at any time a vacancy shall have occurred in any other state office, or in the office of judge of any court, the Governor shall fill such vacancy by appointment, which shall expire when his successor shall have been elected and qualified."

In article VI, section 1, of the constitution provision is made as follows:
"There shall be elected by the qualified electors of the state, at the time and places of choosing members of the Legislative Assembly, a Secretary of State and Treasurer of State, who shall severally hold their offices for a term of four years; but no person shall be eligible to either of said offices more than eight in any period of 12 years."

Four Years Right Contended.
It is contended by attorneys that this section makes the constitutional term of office for the Secretary of State four years and that when the Secretary of State is elected that his term shall be for that length of time and not for two years, or to fill the unexpired term of his predecessor.

In support of this contention the case of the State vs. Johns, 2 Or. 536, is cited, this being the only adjudication of the question in point. This case covered a similar question in the appointment of a County Judge. As the appointment of a County Judge comes under the same constitutional provision as the appointment of "any other state officer," it is stated in the case covers the question which is now before the executive.

In this case the court held that "the appointment of a County Judge by the Governor, where a vacancy exists in the office, under this section is not for the unexpired term, but until a successor is elected and qualified at the next general election and such successor is entitled to hold for a term of four years."

Case Said to Apply.
This case is said to apply equally to the office of Secretary of State, to any other state office, to the judge of any court or to a vacancy occurring in any office the appointment of which is vested in the Legislative Assembly, as set out in section 16 of article V of the constitution as quoted.

There has been some contention that Olcott will be able to hold the office for a term of two years only. It is probable that the Governor will issue a certificate for a four-year term, following the decision of the Supreme Court in State vs. Johns, and if exception is ever taken to the decision it will be left with the courts finally to decide the question again.

RIDGEFIELD RESIDENT DIES

Death Claims Augustus Bouge, Sr.,
at Age of Nearly 82.

RIDGEFIELD, Wash., Nov. 30.—(Special.)—Augustus Bouge, Sr., died at his home here Tuesday. Mr. Bouge was born in Plessa, Germany, January 29, 1831. He came to the United States in early life. From 1852 to 1856 he served in the United States Navy. He settled in Illinois and later moved to Nebraska, locating on a claim near York. In August, 1879, he came to Washington via California and settled in Clark County, where he had been a resident since.

Mr. Bouge was married in 1875 to Mrs. Harriet Feder and five girls and four boys were born. They are: Mrs. W. N. Rowell, Molalla, Or.; Mrs. J. M. Churchley, Redview, Or.; Mrs. W. Rowell, Molalla, Wash.; Mrs. W. Gobel, Monahan, Wash.; Mrs. Rebecca Hicks, Ridgefield, Wash.; Charles Bouge, Portland; Fred Bouge, Corvallis, Or.; Augustus Bouge, Ridgefield, Wash., and Louis Bouge, who died here in 1905. He also leaves two daughters by a former marriage, Mrs. R. A. Neff, of Portland, and Miss Cora, of Chicago, Ill. The funeral services were held from the Methodist Episcopal Church.
