

BRITAIN HONORS WHITELAY REID

Memorial Service in Westminster Abbey Is Impressive Ceremony.

ROYALTY PAYS TRIBUTE

Great Congregation Made Up of Americans and Europeans With Every Class of Public Life Represented.

LONDON, Dec. 21.—The memorial service for the late Ambassador Reid, held Friday in Westminster Abbey, was an impressive ceremony.

The honor of such a service in Great Britain's most historic cathedral has been accorded to no other subject of great distinction.

In the congregation of 2500 which assembled, nearly half were American residents in England, including the staff of the American Embassy and Consulate-General.

The royally, the Government and every class of public life, together with the artistic and literary worlds, were represented.

Day Gray and Gloomy.

The day was a gray and gloomy one, typical of London winter. All the congregation were dressed in the deepest black. The robes of the clergy and the choir and the flames from the clusters of candles before the altar were the only spots of color against the dark stone walls lined with tablets and busts of hundreds of noted dead.

Funeral marches were played while the great congregation assembled.

Prince Arthur of Connaught, as representative of King George and Queen Mary; Lord Howe, representing Queen Mother Alexandra; the representatives of other royal personages; the Duke of Argyll, Prince Louis of Battenberg, the Grand Duke Michael of Russia, the Vice-Chancellor of Oxford and Cambridge Universities, Premier Asquith, Foreign Secretary Sir Edward Grey, Home Secretary Reginald McKenna, Colonial Secretary Lewis Harcourt, Lord President of the Council Viscount Morley, Indian Secretary the Marquis of Crewe and President of the Board of Trade, Sydney Buxton, were seated in the front pews of the church.

Noted Personages Present.

Others present included Attorney-General Sir Rufus Isaacs, the Duke and Duchess of Roxburghe, the Duchess of Marlborough, the Duchess of Wellington, Princess Halstead, Lady Pauncefoot, Lady Strathcona and Mount Royal, the American Cavalry Commission, headed by Brigadier-General Edward J. McCann, and Craig W. Wade, American Secretary of Legation at Tehran.

Musical Programme Important.

The 90th Psalm was sung to Purcell's music. The lesson was from the 15th chapter of the First Epistle to the Corinthians.

Afterward Wesley's anthem, "He will swallow up death in victory," was sung and then Dean Reid read part of the burial service.

The music was sung by the Abbey choir, reinforced by the choir of the Chapel Royal, and the great organ was played by Sir Frederick Bridge, who had a band of drums and trumpets to assist. The sonorous roll of the drums and bursts of the trumpets in the "Dead March in F major" and in Chopin's "March Funebre," and their accompaniment of the many boys' voices in the hymn, "Let Saints on Earth in Concert Sing," were unsurpassable in solemnity and beauty.

Wreaths from President Taft and Secretary of State Knox were displayed in the Abbey.

The mourners were John Hubbert Ward, son-in-law of the late Ambassador; the Earl and Countess of Grand; Miss Breckenridge, of San Francisco; and the staffs of the United States Embassy and Consulate-General. Many members of the diplomatic corps, with their families, attended the service.

Besides the wreaths from President Taft and Secretary Knox, the only other wreaths in the Abbey were those from King George, Queen Mary and Queen Mother Alexandra.

BATTLESHIP BUILDER DIES

Man Who Supervised Construction of Oregon Long Resident of Coast.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 21.—Robert Forsyth, engineer-in-chief of the Union Iron Works at the time when the battleship Oregon was built there, died at his home here last Wednesday. He was 65 years old.

Born in Scotland, Mr. Forsyth came to the Pacific Coast in 1870. He was a member of the Society of Mechanical Engineers, the American Society of Naval Engineers and of the Pacific Club. The funeral was held this afternoon.

P. LAZINSK LOSES BRIDE

Marriage Not Reported, but the License Is Still Out.

To Pines Lazinsk, of 283 Thirteenth street, was put up the question of choosing between his 24-year-old baby

and Anna Soliman, of 566 Second street, to marry whom he secured a license on June 1 last. He decided in favor of the child, and the wedding was to be at County Clerk Fields yesterday, threw the license in the fire and the nuptials were off.

No return having been received showing the marriage consummated, Mr. Fields sent a letter to Mr. Lazinsk asking why, and the bridegroom-to-be came in yesterday morning to explain. He said that there had been a contract of marriage between Miss Soliman and him by which she agreed to take care of his three minor children. The children were brought here from California, arriving about the time set for the marriage.

"She was willing to care for the two older ones, but insisted that she would have nothing to do with the baby," said Lazinsk, producing a picture of the child. "I wouldn't give up that little fellow for anything in the world. I chose the child and she burned the license."

"Marriage not consummated; license destroyed," wrote Deputy County Clerk Noonan at the bottom of the space in the book containing a copy of the license. This completed the record.

PUBLISHERS ARE HELD

IDAHO SUPREME COURT SETS TRIAL FOR MONDAY.

Boise News' Representatives Contend Free-Speech Right Allowed Criticisms.

BOISE, Idaho, Dec. 21.—(Special.)—The Idaho Supreme Court Friday overruled the answer of the Capital News Publishing Company to the charge of contempt, brought because of the newspaper's criticism of the Idaho Supreme Court's decision, which prevented the printing of the names of Roosevelt Progressive Presidential electors on the ballots. The publishers are held to trial, which is set to start next Monday.

In its answer the publishers declare the articles were published because they believed that under the right of free speech, it was their privilege.

"There was no intention to impede the administration of justice," says the answer, "nor could this have been accomplished for the reason that the decision had already been rendered by the court, and for the further reason that, had the decision been in favor of the Progressive party, no injustice would have been done by any voter. Defendants believed they had a right to express their honest criticism and in said belief they had a wide precedent by reason of the decisions of a large number of the learned courts of the United States, the precedent of the great newspapers of the country and the comments of the highest in the political history of these United States."

The answer says that the articles were written with the sole intention of arousing the voters to elect the Progressive party to what the decision would mean in event they did not fully comprehend its significance, and to urge the voters to write to the members of the Progressive party on the blanks left on the ballots.

"It was not a matter primarily of the rights of the parties litigant, but was a proceeding which affected the public as a whole," the defendant avers. A demurrer to the answer was filed by Attorney-General McDougall. The defendant representatives of the publishing company were cited for the publication of the message of Colonel Theodore Roosevelt to the people of Idaho, relating to the decision of the Supreme Court barking the Progressive candidates for Presidential Electors from the Idaho ballot, together with editorial criticism of that decision.

SEALS MAY BE HUNTED

GOVERNMENT URGED TO AMEND EXISTING ACT.

Herd Almost Doubled and Belief Is That Quality Will Be Bettered by Thinning Out Males.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—Unless the agreement reached with Japan and Great Britain for the protection of the seal herds in the North Pacific is to fail, the realization of the seal treaty, perhaps itself lost, it will be necessary for Congress during the present session to amend the seal act so as to remove the five-year restriction upon the killing of male seals on the Pribilof Islands.

This is the view of the Administration based on several urgent communications to the United States, the latest received yesterday from Japan. This communication pointed out that the existing legislation amounts to a practical prohibition of that part of the treaty which guaranteed to the Japanese and the British government a fair return on the seals that might be safely killed on the American seal islands in lieu of those taken by pelagic sealers.

The seal herd has almost doubled in number under one year of suspension of killing, and it is the opinion of the State Department experts that, so far from this being necessary to prevent the further taking of a due proportion of skins, some thinning out of males of the herds is absolutely necessary to prevent its deterioration. Therefore, it is expected the President will make another effort to induce Congress to amend the existing seal act so as to insure fair treatment for the Japanese and British governments.

BIG DRYDOCK ASKED FOR

Navy Wants to Begin Work Early at San Francisco.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—(Special.)—Drydock in San Francisco Bay will be asked of Congress by Secretary of the Navy Meyer in a recommendation he will soon send to the House appropriation committee. The Secretary yesterday definitely decided to ask Congress for the \$1,000,000 dock at this session. The appropriation will be included in the naval appropriation bill. If the sum is granted work on the dock will be begun within the year.

The Bureau of Construction and Repair of the Navy Department already has prepared tentative plans for the structure, which will be capable of housing the largest battleships afloat. The Navy Department is now considering the location of the dock in the bay.

\$1,000,000 FUND WANTED

National Educational Association to Further Expert Studies.

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Dec. 21.—The trustees, doctors and executive committee of the National Educational Association have inaugurated a campaign to secure a million dollar fund for the proper maintenance of its work for the prosecution of expert educational studies and investigations. Announcement to this effect was made tonight.

TAFT SEEKS LIGHT

Purpose of Canal Visit Revealed in Florida.

NEW ORDER WILL FOLLOW

President Says He Wants to Ascertain Whether Zone Is Ripe for Civil Government — Party Leaves for Key West.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Dec. 21.—To determine if the time is opportune for establishing civil government in the Panama Canal Zone was the purpose of President Taft's trip to the isthmus. The President made this announcement in a speech here tonight, which was included in the hour he and his party stopped en route to Key West.

"You may think I could ascertain this as well in Washington, but I don't know," said the President. "At any rate, I am going, and I expect to issue the order creating the new government in the zone if I find conditions warrant it."

Today was the first visit the President has made to Florida since he became the Nation's Chief Executive. He now has visited every State in the Union since he became President, with the exception of North Dakota and Oklahoma.

The President and his party left tonight for Key West, whence they will sail tomorrow for Panama in the battleship Arkansas.

TAFT CONGRATULATES SOUTH

President Predicts Nation-Wide Prosperity Under New Regime.

ST. AUGUSTINE, Fla., Dec. 21.—President Taft in a speech here last night congratulated the South upon the election of a Democratic President, predicted Nation-wide prosperity under the new Administration and spoke of the way this Nation takes the quadrennial verdict of its people at the polls. "Your chairman, Senator Fletcher, has said something about the relations of the North to the South and has read from one of my addresses with reference to the recent election," said the President. "I meant every word I said, and I am not taking back a word, only I want you to understand that I was playing the part of a philosopher and was attempting to find good out of something which might have been different. I had occasion to say when I visited the South in a previous election campaign that I ventured to think a great many of my audience would vote one way and pray another."

"I did not think that was the case in the last campaign, at least there was nothing to indicate it. The morning after election everything was settled; everybody acquiesced and there was not what in colloquial terms would be called a 'kick' anywhere."

PERFECT WOMAN IS FOUND

Co-Ed at Cornell Fills All Physical Requirements.

ITHACA, N. Y., Dec. 21.—(Special.)—"The perfect woman" at Cornell has at last been found. She is Miss Elsie Sheel, of Brooklyn, special student in State College of Agriculture, who is taking a course in horticulture so that she may grow vegetables on her father's farm on Long Island. According to Dr. Esther Parker, medical examiner here, Miss Sheel is strongest of all 400 or more co-eds at Cornell and in her physical make-up there is absolutely no defect.

'SALES' METHODS DEVELOP

Witnesses Tell How National Cash Register Made Competitors.

CINCINNATI, Dec. 21.—After hearing the testimony of three witnesses for the Government, Judge Howard Holt later adjourned today the trial of President Patterson and other officials of the National Cash Register Company until January 6.

F. H. Wreckach, former National agent in Denver, testified that he had received notification from the National Company that Hallwood machine salesmen were preparing to invade Colorado Springs, and to be in readiness to go there and see how many Nationals he could sell.

W. A. Herzog, a second-hand dealer in New York, said he left the employ of the Hallwood Company when the National Company offered him a better salary and that his instructions from the National were to "knock out all of the Hallwood machines he came across."

Judge Holt ruled today that only acts committed in the three years prior to the finding of the indictment could be used to convict the defendants, although testimony relating to acts committed previous to this would be admitted as evidence.

MEXICO TO REVISE TARIFF

State Department Learns of Plan to Change Law When America Acts.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—Reports have reached the State Department to the effect that the Mexican government is about to undertake a revision of its customs tariff about the same time that the American Congress will turn its attention to that subject. Little information as to the actual proposed changes has developed, though it is gathered there will be several increases on various items of imports.

The Mexican Congress adjourned last Sunday, however, without touching the tariff, and it is not known whether it will be reconvened for that purpose.

LUDWIG TO BE MADE KING

Mecklenburg Dukes to Supply Feudal Form of Government.

MUNICH, Bavaria, Dec. 20.—Prince Ludwig, the new Prince Regent of Bavaria, will become King and the mad

King Otto, who has never known that he was a royal personage, will be de-throned in all probability next year. The Bavarian Premier today informed the Speaker of the Bavarian Diet and the leaders of the various parties in that assembly that an amendment to the constitution will be submitted by the government to a special session of the diet in January by the terms of which the regency would be abolished and Ludwig would receive the title of King.

NEUSTREITZ, Mecklenburg-Strelitz, Germany, Dec. 20.—The Grand Duke Adolf Friedrich today issued a rescript announcing that the estates would be convoked in extraordinary sessions in 1913 to enact a constitution for the two grand duchies of Mecklenburg-Schwerin and Mecklenburg-Strelitz, which are now the sole states in Europe not possessing a constitution.

Previous steps have been made for many years to modernize the existing feudal form of government, but these have always failed owing to the attitude of the privileged classes.

CHARITY HURTS PRIDE

JAPANESE WOMAN OF NOBLE ANCESTRY ATTEMPTS DEATH.

Descendant of Samurai Kills Child and Plunges Inscrutable Dagger in Her Own Throat.

OAKLAND, Cal., Dec. 20.—Hot pride of noble ancestry wounded because she had become an object of charity, Mrs. Kuke Kitakami, a young Japanese woman, whose husband died two months ago, killed her year-old son and then attempted her own life at an early hour this morning. The woman was found by H. Matsuniguchi, a friend of her late husband, bowed low before the images of her ancestors, with the dead infant lashed to her body.

With a dagger inscribed with Japanese symbols bearing a message of courage and honor, the descendant of the Samurai stood in a little room a strange land and sent the knife blade deep into her throat.

Her moans were heard by the man, who with his wife, had befriended her, he rushed to her assistance. Matsuniguchi found the woman bowed on the floor before the little images of her ancestors.

"Help me to die," she pleaded in Japanese. "I cannot endure to accept charity for me and Shizuko, my son. I have killed my baby and I have no desire to live. Help me to die. It is believed the wound will not prove fatal."

TOBACCO COMPANY WINS

Verdict in Suit Brought by Jobbers Is for Defendants.

NEW YORK, Dec. 21.—The American Tobacco Company won a verdict tonight by decision of Judge Mayer in the United States District Court in the \$200,000 damage suit brought by E. Lockyer & Company, Brooklyn tobacco jobbers. The Metropolitan Tobacco Company, co-defendant, received a similar verdict. The plaintiff's sought treble damages under the Sherman anti-trust law, alleging they incurred losses through violation of the law by the defendant companies.

Judge Mayer told the jury that the questions involved were of law, not of fact, hence it was for the court to decide the case. John E. Lockyer, of the plaintiff company said he would take the case to the Supreme Court of the United States if necessary.

MOORS SURROUND FRENCH

Zouaves Not Strong Enough to Penetrate Rebel Lines.

RABAT, Morocco, Dec. 21.—Moroccan rebels in the Mogador district have surrounded the detachment of French troops, consisting of two companies of Zouaves, according to native advices received here.

The troops are commanded by Captain Marcel Massoutier, a cavalry officer attached to the Moroccan police. They are not in sufficient strength to break through the rebels. Reinforcements are being sent to relieve them.

FOOD WASTE INVESTIGATED

High Cost of Living Traced to Goods Rotting in Produce Yards.

PITTSBURGH, Dec. 21.—The committee on food supply of the Pittsburgh Chamber of Commerce has started an investigation of the high cost of living as a result of information that a trainload of vegetables have rotted in local produce yards while high prices have been maintained in the retail markets.

Delegates and pastors from the churches of the Grande Ronde Association will be in attendance and several others from Portland, Dr. C. A. Woody, superintendent of the home missions of the Pacific Coast, and Rev. O. C. Wright, corresponding secretary of the Oregon Baptist state convention, will also be in attendance.

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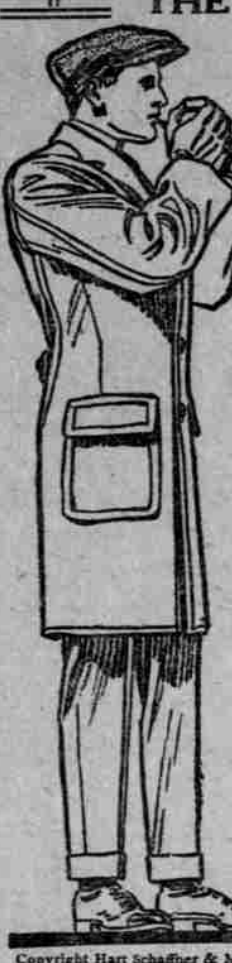
