WEST TAKES STAND ON PUBLIC 'LEVEE'

Southern Pacific Is Licensee
Only, Says Governor in Report to Legislature.

BILL NOW IN PREPARATION

Property at Foot of Jefferson and Used as West Side Station Should Be Turned Over to Portland, Declares Executive.

SALEM, Or., Dec. 28.—(Special.)—Declaring that the so-called "public levee" in Portland, now occupied by the West Side station, should be turned over to the City of Portland; that the Southern Pacific can hold under no other right than as a licensee of the state and that the Legislature has power to regulate the use of the property, but not to permit its being diverted to uses not consistent with the conditions of the dedication, Governor West has prepared a statement which he will forward to the next Legislative Assembly.

His office was given the power to investigate the levee question and its legal status by the last Legislature to report to the coming one.

Jayne's Report Out Soon.
Senator Kellner will probably introduce a bill on the subject.
"The report of Hon. A. A. Jayne, who has been making an investigation for this office as to the ownership of the Jefferson-street levee with other reports having a bearing upon the matter, is now in the hands of the printer and as soon as printed will be sent out to the members of the Legislature for their information," said the Governor today.

"A bill is being prepared by Mr. Jayne and Senator McCulloch for introduction at the coming session.
"Should the property be turned over to the City of Portland, it will then be possible for the city better to conduct its negotiations with the railroad companies as to the use of the lands now occupied by this tract."

Governor Makes Report.
"As to what arrangements should be made by the levee question and its legal status by the last Legislature to report to the coming one."

The report which the Governor will make to the Legislature follows:
"By Senate concurrent resolution No. 19 passed at the last session of the Legislature, this office was authorized and empowered to investigate the facts and examine the law in reference to the claim of the Southern Pacific to the public levee, on the Willamette River, between Jefferson and Clay streets in the City of Portland, and to

take such steps as it might deem advisable to best protect the rights and the interest of the state therein.

Personal Investigation Made.
"I agreeable to these instructions, I beg to report that I have not only made a personal investigation of the matter, but have received able assistance from City Attorney Grant and Deputy City Attorney Latourrette, Hon. A. A. Jayne and State Senator C. C. McCulloch.

"The results of this investigation are embodied in certain reports which are submitted herewith for your consideration.

"I am of the opinion:
"First—That the property was originally dedicated to the use of the public.
"Second—That the Legislature has power to regulate the use, but is without power to permit its being diverted to uses not consistent with the terms of the dedication.

"Third—That the Legislature might have made the railroad company its agent and authorized a use of the premises in keeping with the conditions under which the dedication was made, but could not go farther.

Company Is Licensee Only.
"Fourth—That the Southern Pacific Company can hold under no other right than as licensee of the state and the Legislature may revoke this license at any time.

"Fifth—That the act through which it was attempted to grant this property to the railroad company should be repealed, thus revoking the license.

"Sixth—That the property should be turned over to the City of Portland to be devoted to the uses intended by the donors.

"If these recommendations are followed it will place the authorities of the City of Portland in position to adjust the matter in such a way as will be consistent with the uses to which the property was dedicated and at the same time do justice to the city, the railroad and all others concerned."

BRADY'S LIFE IN DANGER

DERANGED PASTOR THREATENS
FORMER IDAHO GOVERNOR.

Gun Flourished Suddenly in Hotel at Boise but Object of Wrath Is Not Present at Time.

BOISE, Idaho, Dec. 28.—(Special.)—Acting under insane impulses, as his friends believe, Rev. Frederick A. Hamilton, pastor of a church at Pocatello, last night made an effort to get into the room occupied by ex-Governor James H. Brady at the Owyhee Hotel, with a drawn revolver, threatening to take the life of the former Chief Executive of the state. The former Governor was not in his room at the time and a friend, who was with Mr. Hamilton, wrested the weapon from him. The matter was kept secret until today. Several weeks ago Mr. Hamilton came to Boise and his actions at that time convinced his friends that over-

Brady. At the Owyhee Hotel he drew a gun, making threats against the former Governor, with whom he is friendly. He was immediately disarmed and in charge by friends, who sent him back to Pocatello, where it is expected an inquiry will be made as to his sanity.

REV. JOHN R. HALL DIES
Forest Grove Minister Passes Away at Age of 64 Years.

FOREST GROVE, Or., Dec. 28.—(Special.)—Rev. John R. Hall, aged 64 years, died at the home of his daughter yesterday morning, after a short attack of heart failure. Mr. Hall was born in Massachusetts in 1848, and married Miss Mary Livermore in June, 1870. Then removing to Ohio Mr. Hall was pastor of several Methodist Churches for some time, when 14 years ago he came with his family to this state and settled in the eastern part, where he was pastor of a number of churches there, until he again came to Forest Grove six years ago. He is survived by a brother and a sister and the following children: Robert Bryner, of Oswego; Mrs. M. J. Cummins, of Seattle; Professor G. W. Hall, principal of schools of Lostine, Or.; Mrs. O. M. Gardner, instructor of domestic science in the schools of Lakeview, Or., wife of the superintendent of schools of that place; and Mrs. LeRoy Van Kirk, of this city. Mr. Hall's wife died during 1911.

SEATTLE MAKES PROTEST
Parcel Post Rates to Alaska Alleged Discriminatory.

SEATTLE, Wash., Dec. 28.—(Special.)—The Chamber of Commerce in a protest forwarded by Postmaster Russell to Washington today denounces as un-

just discrimination against Seattle and its Alaskan trade, and against Seattle itself, the regulations just issued for the parcel post system.
"As the regulations and announced rates now stand, a parcel can be shipped to any point in Alaska from New York City as cheaply as from Seattle. A similar situation confronts the Alaskans themselves. Under the regulations, to ship a package from August 1st to Juneau will cost no more than to send a like package from Douglas, Alaska, to Juneau, a distance of three-quarters of a mile.

The department parcel post regulations prescribe that Alaska shall not be divided into zones as is the United States proper. A flat rate of 12 cents a pound prevails from any point in "the states" to any point in Alaska or between any two points in Alaska. Parcels weighing four ounces or less are the only exception, the rate on them being 1 cent an ounce or fraction thereof, regardless of distance. The nearest postoffice in Alaska, Ketchikan, falls easily within Seattle's fifth zone, in which the rate is 9 cents a pound and 7 cents for each additional pound. Juneau falls easily within Seattle's sixth zone, in which the rate is 10 cents a pound and 8 cents for each additional pound.

Being on the seaboard, Seattle's zones, with Alaska excluded, can swing out to the east and south, whereas other cities, especially those in the Middle West, can ship both east and west much more cheaply than can this city.

Forest Grove to Nominate Jan. 3.

FOREST GROVE, Or., Dec. 28.—(Special.)—The annual city mass meeting has been called for January 3 by Mayor Thornburg to nominate officers for the ensuing year. The nominations to be made are: Mayor, for one year, and

three Councilmen to serve two years; Treasurer for one year and Recorder for one year. The election is to be held on January 15.

WIFE-BEATER UNDER BAIL
Deer Creek Farmer Must Face Grand Jury on Attempted Murder Charge.

ROSEBURG, Or., Dec. 28.—(Special.)—Edward Lough, recently arrested here on a charge of attempting to kill his wife, was today held to appear before the grand jury during the February term of court with bail fixed at \$1500.

Lough, who is a prominent Deer Creek farmer, recently attacked his wife while intoxicated and was only subdued when his 15-year-old daughter shoved. The preliminary hearing at-

tracted a large crowd of country folk and many witnesses were examined. Lough was represented in court today by three attorneys.

POLL TAX COLLECTION OFF
For Quarter of Century All Men in British Columbia Assessed.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Dec. 28.—(Special.)—Notification has been received at the provincial Assessor's office in New Westminster that all receipt books issued for collection of poll tax are to be returned and that collection of tax is to cease on December 31.

The present action is the outcome of the report of the Tax Commission, which recently toured the province. For a quarter of a century all men in British Columbia between 18 and 60 years have been assessed \$3 yearly.
