SUFFICIENT FUND WANTED
Really Board Urges Good Exhibit for Oregon at 1915 Exposition.

Resolutions were passed by the Portland Really Board at its weekly luncheon Friday, asking the Legislature to grant a sufficient appropriation for an adequate display of Oregon's resources at the San Francisco Exposition and also to duplicate the Forestry building at the San Diego Fair. A committee was appointed to work on the subject and also to get the state to put a permanent exhibit at Ashland during 1915. Ashland being the first town in Oregon after leaving California. It is deemed a desirable place to impress upon visitors the productivity of the state.
