FAIR STOCK IS INCREASED

Klickitat Association Elects and Plans for 1913 Exposition.

GOLDENDALE, Wash., Jan. 18.—(Special.)—The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Klickitat County Fair Association was held at Golden-dale yesterday. Plans were made for 1913 and the work of the organization since the first fair was held in 1909 was reviewed. The 1912 fair was the most successful on an exhibition standpoint, that he ever been held here, but the increased purses for races and the large amount expended in improving the track and buildings proved a heavy drain on the finances of the association.

To keep pace with the growth of the organization and the development of the Klickitat Valley it was decided to increase the capital stock of the association from \$5000 to \$12,000 and a special meeting of the stockholders has been called for that purpose. The secretary now has several applications for stock which he is unable to issue as the present capital stock is fully subscribed. With one exception the new officers are the same as they were last year.

The officials are: President, Ralph W. Fenton; directors, D. W. Norris, Green Bullock, J. M. Mulligan, E. C. Thompson and W. E. Hornbrook; secretary, A. J. Ahola; treasurer, N. B. C. Bunnell.

STREET WILL BE WIDENED

City Engineer Working on Plans for East Side Thoroughfare.

Plans for the widening of Goldsmith street in Lower Albina to connect with and become part of the wide extension of Willamette and Patton avenues are being worked out in the office of the City Engineer. According to the new arrangements 20 feet will be taken from the north side of Goldsmith street. The Hancock Land Company, owner of the Montgomery tract, has offered a 20-foot strip from the west side of the land for a distance of a little more than two blocks, and the owner of the block adjoining on the northwest also will give a 20-foot strip. This leaves two blocks from which to appropriate 20-foot strips in order to reach Delay street, which connects with the Willamette and Patton avenues. The wide street will be extended through the triangular block and through the Fisher brick building.

A wide direct highway will be provided to the Broadway bridge through Lower Albina.

Under the arrangements the Hancock Land Company will get a franchise to lay a spur into the Goldsmith tract from the O.W. & N. line from the foot of Russell and Goldsmith streets in order that the Montgomery tract may be used for manufacturing purposes.

The Lower Albina Improvement Club started agitation for this wide street and circulated petitions for the spur to the Montgomery tract.

R. M. DEMENT'S LIFE SAVED

Ex-Judge, Poor Farm Inmate, Lies on Tracks in Drunken Stupor.

R. M. Dement, twice Municipal Judge, for a time law partner of the late John H. Mitchell, United States Senator from Oregon, but now an inmate of Multnomah Farm, came within an ace of being killed by an incoming car on the Troutdale electric line. He was sitting in the middle of the track, near the farm, so intoxicated that he was absolutely helpless and only the frantic efforts of the motorman saved his life. As it was the car stopped within a foot of the unconscious man.

The incident probably will be made use of by the County Court in urging the passage at Salem of a bill making it illegal to sell or give liquor to an inmate of any county institution. The County Judge and State Senators of Oregon in session here last week, adopted a resolution indorsing such a measure.

Dement secured the liquor from saloons at Troutdale. It is presumed that he had some money left from what he earned washing dishes at the farm. He has paid \$250 a month. It is against the rules for a charge to leave the farm without permission, but Dement sneaked away during the absence of the superintendent.

Dement is about 34 years of age. Addiction to intoxicants caused his downfall. At one time he owned the site of the Wells-Fargo building and had other valuable property.

HIBERNIANS TO CELEBRATE

Arrangements Being Made to Observe St. Patrick's Day.

The Hibernians of Portland already have a committee composed of W. P. Lewis, Frank Richardson, E. Cain, Anthony Campbell, J. P. O'Hara and R. E. Barrett, making arrangements for a St. Patrick's Day celebration under the auspices of the Ancient Order of Hibernians.

Several of Portland's leading singers have agreed to assist in the programme, and a prominent speaker will be engaged to deliver the principal address.

The activity of the Portland Hibernians, especially since the National convention of the Ancient Order of Hibernians held here in July 1910, has attracted widespread attention throughout the East and has been the means of interesting a great number of Eastern people in Oregon, which was described by some of the delegates as the "Ireland of America."

TWO SAWMILLS PROPOSED

Industries to Add to Industrial Progress Around Chehalis.

CHEHALIS, Wash., Jan. 18.—(Special.)—Within the comparatively near future it is expected that Chehalis will have two new mills tributary to this city which will give employment to a large force of men.

The locations have been determined by the formation of the Hill Logging Company, of Adna, a \$100,000 concern. Chester Snow, of Littell, has purchased a site about two miles west of Adna, on which a sawmill of possibly 50,000 feet per ten hours capacity will be erected. The plans for the mill are being prepared now. Mr. Snow has a large mercantile establishment at Littell and is in a position to make a success of the venture.

Also the company of which J. P. Guerrier is the western head is contemplating the construction of one of the largest shingle mills in this part of the state on the Hill Logging Com-
