

ORDER FOR SICKLES' ARREST IS ISSUED

General Will Be Required to Give Bail in Full Amount of His Shortage.

CAREER NOTEWORTHY ONE

Accusation Involving \$23,476 Comes as Climax of Distinguished Career as Soldier, Diplomat and Legislator.

ALBANY, N. Y., Jan. 25.—Upon application of the state authorities, the Supreme Court today issued an order for the arrest of General Daniel Sickles, of New York, who as chairman of the New York Monuments Commission is alleged to have failed to account for \$23,476 of the commission's funds.

Under the order, General Sickles will be required to give bail equal to the amount of the alleged shortage, with the understanding that the bond will be forfeited to the state if judgment is rendered in favor of the state.

The total amount of the alleged shortage was \$23,476, but on December 10 last Stanton Sickles, a son of the General, paid the state \$5000 and promised to make good the remainder as soon as certain property in Spain, owned by Mrs. Sickles, could be sold.

General's Career Noteworthy.

The order for General Sickles' arrest comes as a climax of a distinguished and picturesque career. Born in New York in 1825, of a wealthy family, General Sickles served as a soldier, legislator and diplomat. The guest of honor for many years at gatherings of Civil War veterans, admission to a local organization of Civil War veterans was refused him recently on the ground "of military unskillfulness and reckless sacrifice of the lives of his men."

Congress, which in 1897 awarded him a medal of honor for bravery, three years ago refused to grant him a lieutenant-generalship. In his old age financial troubles beset him, one after another, and last of all, his daughter became estranged from him.

General Sickles was a member of the House of Representatives just before the outbreak of the war, and it was in Washington that he met and killed Philip Barton Key, a United States District Attorney, for alleged attentions to his first wife, the daughter of an Italian musician.

Five Regiments Raised.

At the outbreak of the Civil War General Sickles raised and equipped at his own expense five regiments of volunteers, and as Colonel of one of them went to the front. He participated in most of the great battles of the war, including Gettysburg, where he lost a leg, and achieved distinction for bravery, being rewarded by promotion to the rank of Major-General.

From 1863 to 1873 he served as Minister to Spain, where he met and married his present wife, the daughter of a Spanish Countess of St. Dorothy after his return to this country with her, the couple separated and Mrs. Sickles went back to Spain, where she remained until 1881. Then she returned to New York. There were frequent reports of their reconciliation, and for a year or more Mrs. Sickles lived in a house adjoining her husband's, but it soon appeared that they were really reconciled.

NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—Unless General Sickles is prepared to furnish at once a \$20,000 bond, Sheriff Harbarger said, he will have to go to London, where he will remain until the money is forthcoming. There was no inkling tonight as to who, if anyone, would go to the veteran's aid.

Mrs. Sickles will not come to his aid in the present crisis, it is believed. She said that she would welcome him with open arms if he should come to live with her, but she did not feel that she could put out all her money in his behalf.

"HUMAN BOMB" CONVICTED

Man Who Menaced Police Station Held Responsible for Act.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 25.—Carl Riedelbach, the "human bomb," who threatened the Central Police Station several months ago, when he entered it carrying an infernal machine, and calmly announced that he intended to blow everything to "kingdom come," was convicted by a jury today of the charge of having deposited dynamite in an inhabited place.

The conviction ended Riedelbach's second trial, the first, a few weeks ago, having ended in a disagreement.

Riedelbach, whose mentality was questioned, but who was pronounced sane by alienists, considered the proceedings something to laugh at. All during his trial he joked policemen and detectives who testified against him, and made fun of three detectives to whom medals were presented by the County Board of Supervisors for saving the Police Station by felling him and reducing his dynamite-filled device to a harmless curiosity.

HORSE EPIDEMIC DENIED

Montana Veterinarian Tells Deputy Who Told Story to Resign.

MISSOULA, Mont., Jan. 25.—The immediate resignation of Dr. J. R. Ward, of Missoula, as Deputy State Veterinarian was demanded in a telegram by his chief, Dr. M. E. Knowles, from Helena today, as the result of a statement made by Ward for publication regarding the alleged prevalence of a disease among horses of this state. Dr. Ward stated that over 1000 horses in Montana had died of the disease which he diagnosed as "pernicious anemia."

State Veterinarian Knowles said today that there was no widespread disease among horses in this state and that few isolated cases of infectious or contagious maladies affecting horses had been reported to the authorities.

MAN LOSES PART OF BRAIN

Soldier Recovers From Injury and Is Retrieving Lost Mentality.

STOCKHOLM, Jan. 25.—(Special.)—The case of the Swedish soldier Blomquist, who about a year ago, through a careless shot of another soldier, had his skull fractured and lost a considerable portion of his brain, attracted at one time universal attention. Contrary to all expectations the man survived, but he lost some mental faculties, notably memory.

During the past year his condition, thanks to careful treatment, has steadily improved. He has again learned to read and write and when he left the hospital he was able to send the doctor

FIBER BOX RATE ASKED

MAKERS OF WOODEN CONTAINERS DEFEND POSITION.

Proponents Contend Freight on Goods Packed in Pasteboard Bars That Material's Use.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 25.—The hearing of the case of R. W. Fridman & Co., of Los Angeles, against 23 transcontinental railroads, asking an equalization of freight rates so that articles packed in pasteboard or fiber boxes may be shipped as cheaply as those packed in wooden containers, was begun here today before Leo J. Flynn, special examiner for the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Many representatives of wooden box manufacturers, who were said to have declared that if the rates were equalized their industry would be ruined in all parts of the country, were present.

They were brought to their feet in protest early in the examination by a statement of Fred P. Gregson, manager of the traffic bureau of the Associated Jobbers of Los Angeles, that he had been told by railroad traffic managers generally, and particularly by Traffic Manager Louis of the Southern Pacific Railroad Company, that the railroads were willing to grant the relief asked by the pasteboard and fiber box manufacturers, but were prevented "by a club held over their heads by the pine box agency."

"We protest against any statement of that kind," interrupted Charles L. Brown, of San Francisco, representing one group of wooden box manufacturers. "That is equivalent to saying that the pine box manufacturers are engaged in a conspiracy."

Gregson declared the rates of the railroads were such in regard to the shipment of fiber boxed goods Eastward that it was practically impossible for Californians to market their products in Utah, Oregon, New Mexico, Arizona or Nevada in the lighter containers.

TAFT APPROVES MEMORIAL Fountain to Commemorate Deaths of Butt and Millet.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—Design for the memorial to Major Archibald Butt, personal aide to President Taft, and Francis D. Millet, the artist, two Washingtonians lost with the Titanic, was approved today by the President.

The memorial, a fountain, with a shaft rising from its center, will be on public grounds near the White House. On one side of the shaft will be a figure in bas relief representing art, and on the opposite side a figure representing an armed knight.
