Referendum Not Expected. These were the views which the Legislature took of the road question and the two big road laws, which have been passed and sent to the Secretary of State's office.

THREE NEW ARMORIES AIDED Eugene, Medford and Roseburg Provided for by Legislature.

MUCH MONEY SAVED TO STATE Incinerator at Asylum Will Dispose of Pauper Dead.

STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Or., March 1.—(Special.)—With the final approval of the Governor to a bill providing for a crematory at the Oregon State Asylum, it is estimated that thousands of dollars will be saved to the state annually through disposal of pauper corpses which are now buried in the plots in the vicinity of the various institutions.
