THE ORDINANCE APPROVED Women and Children See Good in Public Vending Measure.

The ordinance passed by the City Council Wednesday, and now in effect, granting farmers permission to back their wagons up around the Plaza blocks, on Third, Fourth, Main and Salmon streets, will result in a reduction of living expenses, in the opinion of the committee of the Women's Republic, which urged the passage of the public market ordinance. This failed of enactment only because of lack of funds to carry out its provisions to establish a market at the west end of the Hartman bridge. The ordinance granting the use of the curbs around the Plaza was a substitute measure, and has the distinction of having been conceived, drafted, submitted, enacted and put into effect in a single day.

It will be a boon to housewives to be able to buy vegetables and other produce direct from the wagons, said a member of the committee of the Women's Republic yesterday, "for, as the price of meat mounts higher, the more vegetables and fruit must contribute to the table needs, and the women will feel that with a chance to buy direct from the farmers, living expenses will be greatly reduced."

The 8200 children who have entered the school garden contest are also pleased at the passage of the ordinance, which will give them an opportunity to sell their vegetables. Many last year who failed to get prizes were a little discouraged over the result of their Summer's work. Now they feel that even if they fail to get prizes they can realize on their produce.
