SOUTHERN ITALY SHAKEN BY EXTENSIVE EARTHQUAKES,

Professor Mercalli Regards Two Occurrences as Coincidence Only, Though Remarkable One.

NAPLES, June 28 .- For the first time since 1906 flames were observed to day shooting up from Mount Vesuvius Three slight earth shocks occurred prior to this, and the uppermost crater of Vesuvius emitted a dense column of smoke, which frequently showed Long List of Amusing Sports striking reflections of flames lower down, with an occasioned eruption of
