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Congress Shows Little Resistance to Programme That Wilson Insists On.

SHORT RECESS SUGGESTED

President, However, Has Shown No Inclination to Be Lenient and Outlook Is for Continuation of Work.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, July 6.—It begins to look as though Congress will remain in session indefinitely, to gratify the desire of the President, but there is considerable doubt whether the present session, even though it may run until December, will witness the enactment of a currency bill. For a time it seemed that the Senate would insist on adjourning as soon as the tariff bill became a law, for that is in accordance with the personal desire of three-fourths of the Senators of both parties, but so completely has the Senate agreed to the tariff bill that it is believed that the President will not be so lenient.

Tariff Debaters Many.

It took more than ever as though the tariff debate would be long through July and August and that bill may not get to the President for his approval before September 10. Congress is believed to have passed the tariff earlier in the session, many Democratic Senators are strongly disposed to discuss the tariff at length, and it has been this desire that has been responsible for the long consideration of the bill in caucus and that was partly responsible for the delay in completing the bill in the Senate committee.

As the bill now stands it is unacceptable to many Democratic Senators, though all but Thornton and Randall, of Louisiana, will vote for it. Those Senators who do not like the bill will take occasion, in the course of debate, to express their views on the tariff, and make such explanations or apologies as they care to for their vote, and some of these speeches will be protracted. There is no chance of a considerable Republican debate on the bill is assured, for the Republicans feel they must use the tariff in their next campaign.

Currency Agreement Difficult.

It is the judgment of Senators of long experience that the Senate cannot pass the currency bill with less than two months debate and no one is of the opinion that two months will not afford ample time for all the bills that are to be made. There is a great diversity of opinion on this question and as the subject is studied further differences will develop, making it difficult for the Democratic majority to get together on a satisfactory measure.
