LOMBARD STREET TO BE PAVED.

The paving of Lombard street from Wash street to Patton avenue, on the Peninsula, is in progress and is made possible by laying of secondary sewers along both sides of the street. It connects with the main conduits when they are laid. Sidewalks are down and the grading is largely done. It is planned to pave Lombard street under the same arrangements by laying the sewers on both sides in advance of the installation of the general sewer system. Several other streets on the Peninsula are to be paved in this way by putting down the secondary sewers. It is hoped to get the sewer system constructed later in the season.

EAST SIXTH STREET TO BE PAVED.

It is planned to pave East Sixth street from East Oak to East Washington. The bids received range from \$48,895 to \$41,230. The contract to pave East Sixth from East Washington to East Oak streets has been let and the work is in progress. The improvement north from East Oak will be a redress improvement by retaining the present macadam surface and putting down a hard-surface dressing. Efforts have been made to pave East Sixth south from East Washington to Hawthorne avenue, but without success so far. A hard-surface street parallel to Grand avenue is wanted.

TWO MARKETS FAVORED

Greater East Side Club Takes Up Matters of Improvement.

The Greater East Side Club, in session Friday night at Hotel Clifford, passed a resolution favoring the installation of two public markets, one on each side of the river. The committee on public markets was instructed to bring the matter to the attention of the Commissioners and urge that steps be taken to establish these two markets.

A resolution was adopted asking the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company to extend the proposed downtown carline from Mason street and Alameda park to a connection with the Alameda line at East Thirtieth street, in order to provide an outlet for the Vernon district.

Resolutions were adopted favoring the erection of Dock No. 3 in Central East Side by the Public Dock Commissioners and also favoring the construction of a carline on East Broadway and East Thirtieth streets to Fremont.

The transportation committee, L. M. Lepper chairman, was instructed to use every effort to facilitate the entrance of the Clackamas Southern into Portland through the East Side, for which a franchise had been asked. It was the sense of the Greater East Side Club that this interurban railway should be given encouragement to build its line from Oregon City to Portland.

Frank Motter, J. Mydell, E. Versteeg, J. C. English and L. M. Lepper were appointed a committee to represent the Greater East Side Club in the preparations for the next Rose Festival.

NORTH BANK RUSHES WORK
 Development of East Side Shipping District Under Way.

The activity displayed by the North Bank road in the East Side district the past week indicates that big developments are under way. Four tracks are being laid from East Main street between East Third street and Union avenue to Belmont street, and the work of removing the old frame building at the southwest corner of East Morrison street and Union avenue, where the freight depot will be erected, has been started.

These are first activities started by the North Bank road in its plans to invade the East Side territory and provide freight facilities. Several tracks have been laid on East Third street from Belmont street to Union avenue, and two for the Southern Pacific. L. M. Lepper, chairman of the transportation committee of the East Side Business Men's Club, announced that the North Bank line will push its developments to completion.

DELEGATES ARE UNSEATED

Federation of Labor Finds Electrical Workers in Wrong.

At the regular meeting of the Central Labor Council in the Labor Temple Friday evening, a telegram was read from Secretary Morrison of the American Federation of Labor, ordering the unseating of delegates from locals Nos. 125 and 317, Electrical Workers.

After some discussion a vote was taken and it was voted unanimously to unseat the delegates. The charge was unseating of the delegates from the Federation of Labor in refusing to abide by a decision rendered some time ago. Members of these locals were called off a building Thursday on request of representatives of the Building Trades Council and it is reported two more new high buildings are being carried on jointly by the State Bureau of Mines and Geology, the Manufacturers' Association and the Stonecutters' Union to secure preference for Oregon stone in the construction of all public buildings, state, municipal and county as well as Federal.

H. N. Lawrie, of Portland, chairman of the state commission, announced yesterday that H. M. Parks, of Oregon Agricultural College, director of the State Bureau of Mines and Geology, will supervise the proposed survey and the testing of the samples at the Agricultural College in Corvallis. The plan is to secure duplicate samples from each quarry in the state, submit one set of samples to the test at Corvallis and determine whether they come up to the Government specifications for building stone. Samples of such as come up to these standards will be sent to Washington, thus avoiding the possibility of transmitting to the Government officials any stone that will not stand the most rigid Government test.

It is the intention to inspect every accessible quarry in the state which is a stone that is believed to be suitable for building purposes. Mr. Parks, director of the survey, has requested that all owners of quarries of building stone in the state be notified with him as soon as possible, giving descriptions of the stone and the location of the quarries, so that there may be no delay. If all reports on quarries and their locations can be sent in to the headquarters in Corvallis before the engineers start out on the survey, it will enable them to make an itinerary and complete their work in a much shorter time.

STONE SURVEY IS AIM

SAMPLES OF OREGON PRODUCT TO GO TO WASHINGTON.

Effort Will Be Made to Get Government Approval for Using Material in New Building.

A complete survey of the quarries in Oregon and collection and testing of samples under the direction of the State Bureau of Mines and Geology, for transmission to the authorities at Washington, D. C., will be started within the next ten days. This is one of the latest and most important steps in the campaign which is being carried on jointly by the State Bureau of Mines and Geology, the Manufacturers' Association and the Stonecutters' Union to secure preference for Oregon stone in the construction of all public buildings, state, municipal and county as well as Federal.
