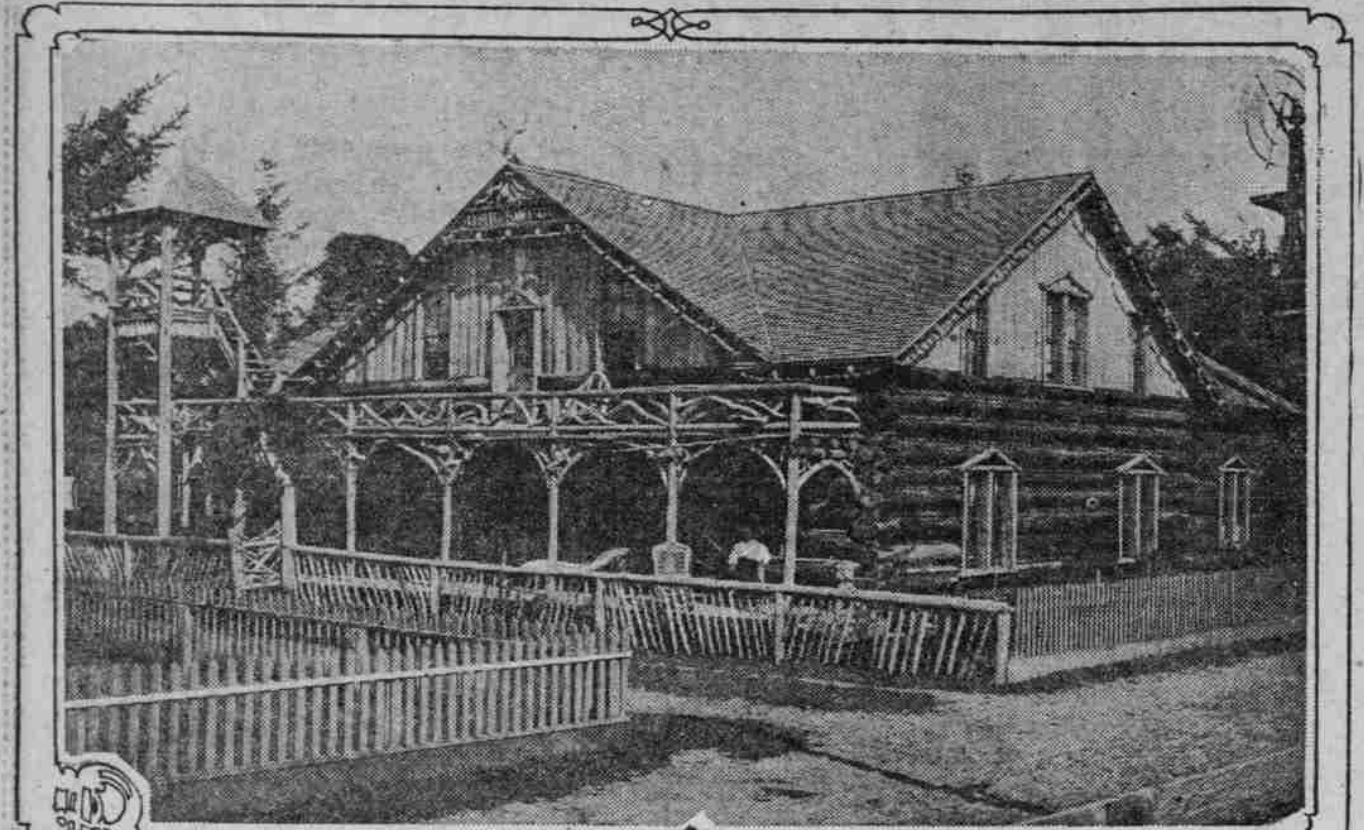


FACILITIES FOR REAL VACATION IN OREGON NOT SURPASSED ANYWHERE

THIS, now is the vacation season—the gladdest of all the year. It is the annual season of fun and frolic in the open, the period of temporary suspension from toil and strife, and the time for seeking recreation and the return of health and strength.

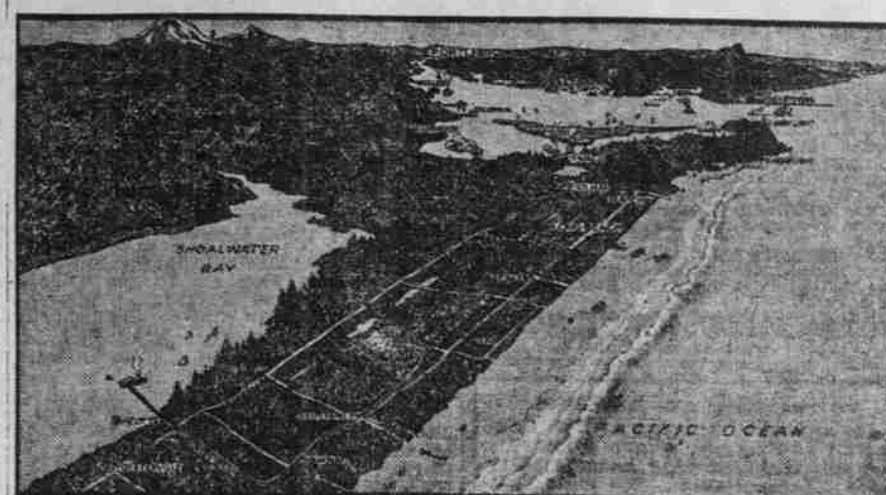

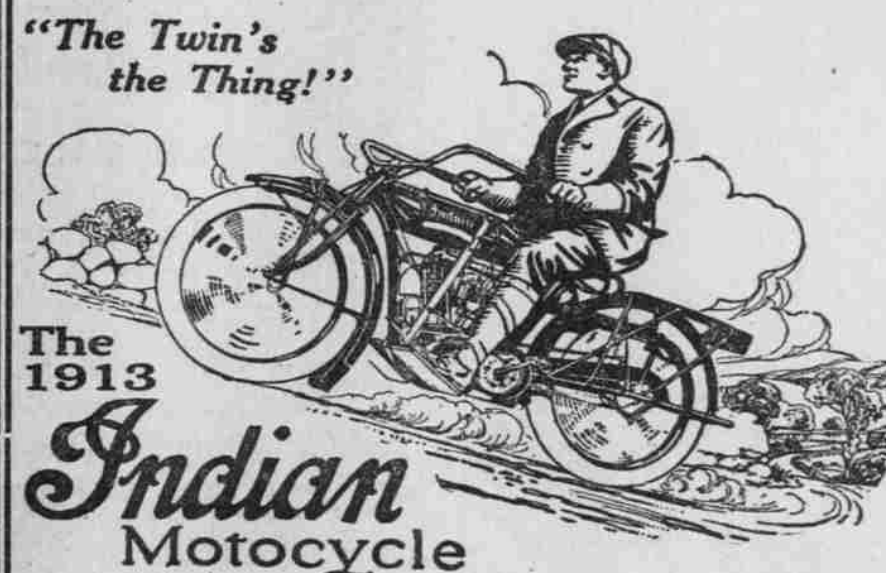
