

TILLAMOOK BEACHES ATTRACTING THOUSANDS SINCE ROAD OPENED

Scores of Cottages Have Been Built in Past Two Years—Good Hotels Are Numerous—Fishing and Life in Open Add to Charms of Popular Summer Resort on Shores of Pacific Ocean.

TILLAMOOK, Or., July 12.—(Special.)—This will be a big year for Tillamook beaches. The enterprising city of Tillamook already is becoming a typical summer resort. Although the beaches of Tillamook Bay have been accessible by rail less than two years, their popularity became established last year, when thousands of people came from Portland and other parts of the state to pass their vacations here.

The new line of the Southern Pacific skirts the shore of the bay for many miles, and makes every established resort on these waters accessible by both rail and water.

On account of the heavy traffic of the summer vacation period, two trains now operate between Portland and Tillamook every day. Motorcar service also is available between Tillamook and Mohler.

Scores of cottages have been built along the Tillamook beaches in the past two years. Many persons, visiting the entrance of the railroad, purchased their beach property and erected their summer homes even before the line was built.

There are a number of good hotels along the bay. They are well patronized. In addition to the surf bathing, Tillamook resorts also offer to the visitor the unusual charms of hunting, fishing and life in the open. People who come to the Tillamook resorts come to rest and to enjoy themselves. They don't come to attend social functions or to parade the latest fashions in dress. That's the reason Tillamook has become so popular.

Travel between Portland and these beaches is divided between the rail and water lines. Extension of the United Railways to Tillamook Bay is a probability of the near future. This will add substantially to the annual attendance here of pleasure seekers and vacationists.

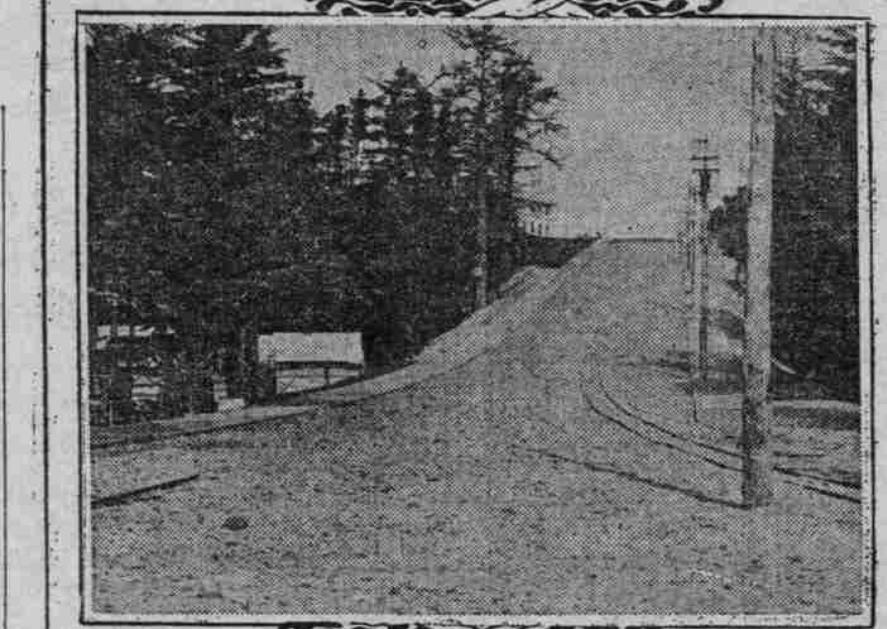
WEATHER GOOD AT NEWPORT

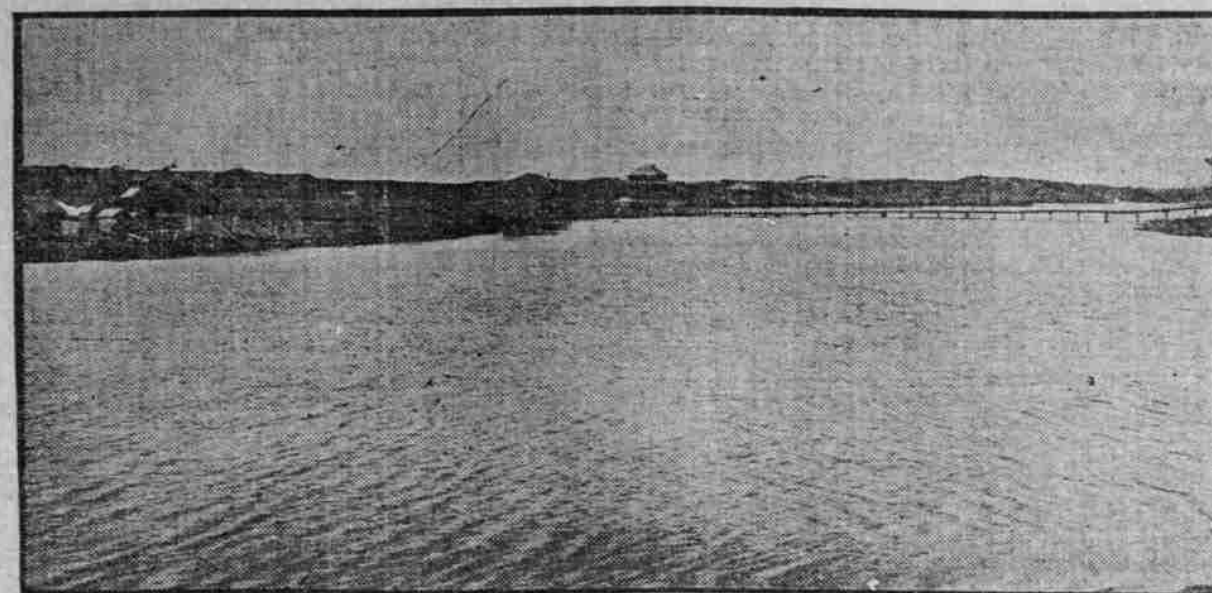

COUNTY GAME MEN NAMED

Cathlamet Sportsmen Get Out License, but All Will Be Watched.

CATHLAMET, Wash., July 12.—(Special.)—J. C. McFadden, Lou Fitcha and Alex Campbell were appointed County Game Commissioners by Leslie M. Darwin, State Fish Commissioner, who was here yesterday. The new commissioners have not yet held a meeting, but it is believed that D. H. Prescott, one of the best known timber cruisers in the southwest part of the state, will be asked by the commissioners to act as game warden for Wahkiakum county.

The members of the commission have signified their intention thoroughly to watch and patrol all streams and game sections of the county and vigorously to enforce the provisions of the new game law. Nearly all the local sportsmen have secured the necessary licenses for hunting and fishing from County Auditor Hughes, the office authorized under the new law to issue hunting and fishing licenses.
