I. W. W. LEAD MOVE TO DISRUPT ARMY

Rioters Enlist Only to Inflame
Soldiery—Fort Stevens
Reveals Fact.

OFFICIAL SECRETS LEAK

Violent Civilian Socialists Apparently Learn "Inside" Military and Naval Information—Loyal Soldiers in Peril.

FORT STEVENS, Or., July 13.—(By a staff correspondent.)—Not all members of the I. W. W. are soap box ranters, hurling insults at the American

the affairs of the Astoria local of Socialists. He is an ex-soldier well known to have been active in spreading Socialistic doctrine among the enlisted men. Fogel, although under suspicion of having used the post telephone for the purpose of keeping men in Astoria in touch with the investigation going on at the fort, is still in his tailorshop at the Post Exchange. His record is being scrutinized carefully.

The reading public is more or less familiar with what has been going on at Fort Stevens, yet a brief history will not be remiss. It may not be generally known, but the real beginning of the outbreak at the Army post was when Sergeant Leary of the Ninety-third, left at almost every saloon at Hammond a seditious circular, attacking the Government whose Constitution he had taken an oath to uphold. News of Sergeant Leary's activity reached the ears of his commanding officer. Charges were preferred against Sergeant Leary. They were sent to San Francisco for approval. They were approved, but before these papers could reach Fort Stevens, in fact the very day these papers were mailed in San Francisco, Sergeant Leary deserted, and all efforts made to locate him since have been futile.

Underground Methods Learned. Being the beginning of the trouble, the first prying of the lid to the gigantic I. W. W. plot to disorganize and demoralize the Army and Navy, was also the first intimation that the I. W. W. plotters had found a method whereby they were kept in touch with the

flag on the street corners. Some are soldiers wearing Uncle Sam's uniform, giving voice to their seditions mouthings, cursing commanding officers behind their back, assailing those whom they cannot coerce, bribing others into deserting and dishonoring the flag which, upon their oath, they have sworn to respect and uphold. A murder also is to be credited to them or their sympathizers.

All the troubles which have taken place at Fort Stevens for months past are due to the I. W. W. A close analysis of the circulation of seditious literature around Army posts, especially around Fort Stevens, brings into consideration the murder of Private Crawford, the assassin, the series of desertions and the arrests of other soldiers, held under the suspicion that they knew more about the death of Crawford than they have told.

Army Ranks Infected. These circumstances, connected with the evident leak in the handling of official communications, the fact that I. W. W. members living at Astoria are kept fully informed concerning every move made by Lieutenant-Colonel Straub and his officers who are investigating affairs at the fort, and that both the telegraph and telephone wires are being used for the transmission of this information, all go to show that I. W. W. workers, both within and without the military reservation, while they absorbed the attention of the public by their street-corner oratory, are, mole-like, sending their agents and having them enlist in the Army with but one purpose in view—that of disorganization.

Added to this is the recent discovery of a cabin, far back in the woods of the military reservation. This cabin, it has been learned, was the place where I. W. W. and the destructive element of the Socialist party from Hammond and Astoria, met the soldier members of their organization.

Here was read the Appeal to Reason and the weekly Socialist paper published at Astoria and other inflammatory pamphlets inciting riot and sabotage. Near this cabin was found a piece of paper, evidently torn from a newspaper, and evidently sent from the coal fields of West Virginia, November 17, 1912. The scrap reads:

"We mean to save these men, and if we fail, well, our membership is 1,150,000. We shall go after their scalps, destroy the profits, destroy wages, destroy the shareholders, the employers. Our army will gather in the fruits of real victories. So let the employers beware. If they want blood, very well, they shall have it. We are masters of the situation. We are the force, the final argument."

"Let them tremble. We are out for their scalp and mean to bring them home. At last there is a militant labor organization in this country. Civilization is a lie. What is more civilized than to spike the guns when they are trained on our brothers?"

Secret Service Man "Spotted." This is a sample of the literature which is finding its way into the Army posts of the American Army. There has been a secret service operative on the ground at Fort Stevens. He had no more than stepped into the compound than it was tipped off by the post wire that one of Uncle Sam's sleuths was on the job. He was an agent who had been on duty at San Francisco and was recognized on sight. There may have been other secret service operatives on the job, but I know this one was here and that he was recognized. I know first hand from a soldier who knew the man. This is only another proof of how well the underground system is keeping in touch with things that are going on.

There is a civilian tailor named Fogel who is attached to the Post Exchange, whose Socialistic views are well known. He was arrested on the orders of Lieutenant-Colonel Straub, but was subsequently released. Fogel has been and is very active in

secrets transacted by the War Department, especially when it came to Army posts. On the heels of Sergeant Leary's taking "French leave" other soldiers, posing as socialists, but also I. W. W.'s, became bold and began making seditious talk.

Reports of these seditious talks by certain soldiers, who were openly proclaiming themselves socialists, was brought to Lieutenant-Colonel Straub. He was informed on May 4 that Adjutant-General Yaldo Coffman, now under arrest for violating article 62 of the Articles of War and not for being a socialist, had offered an insult to the soldiers, both in the Army, Hammond and Astoria, to set up a cry that Private Coffman was arrested because he was a socialist, and, keeping back the truth, that he was arrested for making a vulgar remark as to what he, Coffman, would not do with the American flag.

After days of close investigation, after heart-to-heart talks with men living both in Hammond and Astoria and with civilians working within the military reservation, socialists and non-socialists, there was but one conclusion to be reached. That was while we have been listening to the mouthings of the I. W. W. soap-box orator, the higher ups have selected a class of men, made dangerous by a little education, and directed against soldiers and sabotage. The truth of this statement is apparent in the series of crimes, robberies, and other acts which have occupied the attention of the officers in command at Fort Stevens since the first arrest was made in man.

Summary of Events Given. Here is a brief summary of events which have taken place at Fort Stevens since the arrest of Sergeant Leary for distributing seditious literature. Sergeant Leary was arrested for this, but on account of certain Government red tape, charges could not be brought against him until they had been forwarded to the Department of the Pacific at the Presidio, to be approved or rejected. In the Leary case these charges were approved. Here is the first evidence that I. W. W. Socialists were on the job. Leary was known among the so-called instructive Socialists as a ranting, violent speech-making Socialist of the I. W. W. type.

Linking the date of the signing of these papers at the headquarters at San Francisco and the date upon which Sergeant Leary deserted or disappeared, is the first evidence of a leak in the transmission of official business in army circles. It is believed by the officers at the fort that Leary was tipped off to the fact that charges were made against him had been approved and that he would be arrested and, having the advanced inside information furnished him by the I. W. W.'s connected with headquarters at the Presidio, he took time by the forelock and fled.

Another connecting link, which goes to show that assaults and coercion were not new methods used against a witness who refused to "listen to reason," is the attempted assault made upon Private Jensen, a week ago last Thursday. Private Jensen, before coming to Fort Stevens, was stationed at the Presidio. While there he was a witness in a case similar to the one going on now at Fort Stevens. He testified after being warned, and several days later he was severely assaulted and was confined in the hospital.

Blood and other evidences of a struggle were found eventually. It is believed that the attempted assault upon Private Jensen, a week ago last Thursday, was a warning to the I. W. W. Socialists, who were then in the process of being organized to work the strike.

WOMEN ARE FACTOR

Seaside Fair Sex Do Much to Improve Community.

CIVIC CLUB HAS SLOGAN

Aim Is to Make Ocean Resort the Atlantic City of the Pacific Coast. Restrooms for Tourists Built and Driveway Is Planned.

SEASIDE, Or., July 11.—(Special.)—Women's influence has figured largely in the work of the Seaside Civic Improvement Club, which has been responsible for many of the recent enterprises for the betterment of Seaside. About half of the members of the club are women and the offices in it are equally divided among men and women. It was organized April 12 and launched into activity in public affairs on May

2, when an annual "clean-up day" was held. Stores and business houses were closed and in a meeting at the close of the day, the Improvement Club was formally substituted in Seaside for the commercial organization, which had gone out of existence with the fire some months before. Since that time the young organization has pursued a most energetic career.

Slogan Is Adopted. "Seaside, the Atlantic City of the Pacific Coast," is the official slogan which has been adopted and the aim of the organization is to raise Seaside to first place among the Summer resorts of the Coast.

The first step in this direction was in the completion of the public restroom for tourists about two weeks ago. Restrooms, reading-rooms, checkrooms, a nursery and everything else that can be of best service to tourists visiting Seaside have been embodied in this new institution.

The committee now plans a motorboat canal to Astoria, so that Seaside may be placed on watergrade communication with the whole Columbia basin and can be readily reached by motorboat run from Portland or other points.

Boulevard Is Planned. A driveway to be known as the "Ocean Boulevard" is planned to run from Tillamook Head to Fort Stevens, a distance of 18 miles. Substantial subscriptions have been raised already for the enterprises which the club has in view.

President of the club is George Shaver; vice-president, Mrs. A. S. Foster; treasurer, V. N. Spurgeon, and secretary, Mrs. C. M. Geisler. The executive board is composed equally of men and women. The club has arranged to affiliate with the Oregon Development League. E. N. Weinbaum, with the commercial bureau of the Portland Commercial Club, while in Seaside on his honeymoon last month, took an active interest in the work of the club and was to a large degree instrumental in bringing about the affiliation with the state organization.

NEZ PERCES INCREASING

GROWTH IN NUMBERS SHOWN FOR FIRST TIME.

Government Official Attributes Gain to Campaign Against Disease and Liquor.

LEWISTON, Idaho, July 12.—(Special.)—For the first time in the recorded history of the Nez Perce Indian tribe, the Government's census this year will show an increase in their numbers, according to O. H. Lipps, who has supervision of all the Indian reservations in Idaho, Oregon, Washington and Montana.

"This is due," says Mr. Lipps, "to the campaign made by the Government agents in home sanitation, suppression of the liquor traffic and the promotion of out-of-door activities and industrial pursuits. We now feel that our efforts to eradicate the white plague and other diseases which have caused a deterioration of the Nez Perces is not without avail. We will continue it in the hope of bringing them up to a high plane."

"I am glad to see that the Government has appropriated for the first time a sum of \$100,000 for the promotion of Indian agriculture. This sum will be utilized to employ farm experts and assist the Indians in tilling their farms and tracts better."
