

PHOTOGRAPHS GIVE HINTS OF LATEST STYLES IN BATHING SUITS



NEW YORK CITY, July 12.—(Special.)—The latest styles in bathing suits are shown in the accompanying photographs and descriptions: Nos. 1 and 4—American and Persian designers agree that white makes an attractive tone for bathing garments. The two models shown give one an idea of the bathing garments very much in vogue at American and Persian seaside resorts. The American costume (No. 4) is of white silk with sandals to match and headgear of the same color. The Persian garment (No. 1), designed by Helle, is of white taffeta trimmed with broad silk braid of the same color, and cap to match.

No. 2—There is a certain dignity about the new beach suit with a high Medici collar of exquisite hand embroidery and lace and draped skirt that is made attractive against a background of blue skirt and sandy beach. This particular model is developed in striped satin in rich Roman colorings.

No. 3—The latest bathing and beach costumes show novel touches of high colors, Bulgarian and Russian, which add a distinctive note to costumes of dark colors. The bathing wrap shown to the right of the photograph, matching the suit in material and color, is a new idea in America, brought from the fashionable watering places of France.

No. 5—White bathing suits are Dame Fashion's latest dictates. They are fetchingly made of soft tulle and satin, with trimmings of lace, flesh-colored hosiery and white sandals are considered extremely smart with the white suit, as shown in photograph No. 5.

No. 6—The vogue for black and white expresses itself in bathing garments in

all white suits with chic touches of black, and in all black suits with unique white and black trimmings. The contrast of black and white suits is shown in the photograph.

No. 7—Two beautiful beach costumes which will no doubt find favor with both sexes are pictured in No. 7. The

costume of the model on the right is of charmeuse, white ground, polka dots and trimmings of dark blue. Blue silk stockings rolled over, make a striking effect on a background of white silk. The costume of the seated model is of white with broad collar and cuffs, with cap to match.

INFORMAL OUTING GARB CONTRASTS RADICALLY WITH AFTERNOON DRESS

Smart Gowns and Stunning Wraps Worn by Fashionable Folk at Summer Colonies, Country and Yacht Clubs—Dainty Footwear on Piazza Vies With Heelless Shoes of Court and Deck.

NEW YORK, July 12.—(Special.)—The country club is the social center of every Summer community, and at Summer colonies near the shore, the yacht club fills the same need. Racing events at the latter, and tennis, golf and polo matches at the former, call out fashionable folk on Saturday and Sunday afternoons, and these athletic affairs are followed by tea on the wide, awning-shaded verandas of the club.

Smart gowns of a summery nature are worn by the women and stunning wraps cover the gowns of those who arrive in motor cars. In striking contrast to these conventional and effective costumes are the athletic togs of women who take part in tennis and golf matches. Short skirts, turned-in blouse collars, rolled up sleeves and sportswear tied carelessly around the waist by the sleeves—to be out of the way and yet handy for use—are quite "en regie" side by side with ex-

quisite lingerie creations of lace and veranda. Not all the members of country clubs and yacht clubs are millionaires, and not all the charming frocks one sees come from the hands of Paris couturiers. There are dozens of little places where copies of Paris models may be picked up at prices below those charged by big dressmakers for customers who are indifferent to considerations of price. There are also places—not on the select streets off Fifth avenue and known only to a catty few—where chic creations are to be had for next-to-nothing. Such shops procure smart models in various ways. Sometimes a gown, worn once or twice by a wealthy woman and passed on to her maid, finds its way to such an emporium. Sometimes the fetching models have been worn by mannequins at

an exhibition of gowns for the benefit of buyers from Western concerns. One particular city so that the "Paris gown" worn by the Denver or Spokane or San Francisco woman is really exclusive as far as her locality is concerned. The original model gowns, direct copies in each case of authoritative Paris creations of the season, are copied at a very little price. Sometimes a really lovely little frock of silk and lace may be picked up at these places for \$20 or a trifle over.

Yachting Costume Parisian. One such frock, worn by a young woman on the veranda of a fashionable Sound yacht club last Saturday, and recognized by the scribe, who had seen the creation only a week before at an exhibition of model gowns—was eminently and authoritatively Parisian, and was a copy of one of Premet's early Spring models. Dark blue landsdowns

was the material of the skirt, and a jaunty little bolero coat having square fronts on which were set buttonholes and red ball buttons. This bolero coat fell just over a sash of black satin which encircled the waist and was knotted at one side, falling in two straight, weighted ends to the knee. In front, the bolero opened over a waistcoat of cream machine embroidered batiste, and this, in turn, opened over a crossed vest of fine white net.

The navy blue landsdowne skirt was tucked from knee to ankle in four groups of pintucks which pulled it in closely about the feet, and just at the front was a six-inch slash, edged with buttonholes and red ball buttons. Under the slash was a fan pleating of red silk. Very high-heeled boots of patent leather with buttoned tops of dull calf seemed to set off the navy blue and red costume to perfection.

Navy Blue Silk Favorite. One notes that among the caste of Vere de Vere, in other words, among the elite of country clubdom, navy blue is a particular favorite. Many stunning afternoon gowns of navy charmeuse, eponge and landsdowne are noted and there is a plain blue navy foulard without figures of any kind that seems especially cool and pleasing on Summer days. A costume of this kind was worn by a young matron recently returned from Paris at the Piping Rock clubhouse during the polo games. The frock was of navy blue foulard, unfurled, and had a clinging skirt and an equally clinging tunic scalloped and piped at the lower edge—about at the knee. Under the piped scallops was a pleated ruffle of navy blue net and similar net ruffles fell from the elbow sleeves. A soft sash of the blue silk was tied flatly in front and crossed vest of pleated white net filled in the front of the bodice and met the high knot of the sash. A saucer-shaped medium-sized hat of navy blue straw was worn under a black lace veil, one bit of black court-plaster peeping through strictly from the wearer's cheek. Buttoned boots of patent leather with French heels had tops of tawny-colored suede and the long-worned suede gloves matched these boot-tops precisely.

Lingerie Frocks for Ladies' Day. Reception days at the country club and the yacht club bring out very distinguished costumes of the lingerie order, accompanied by picture hats loaded with roses, and parasols selected to match sashes. Such frocks, this year, are almost entirely of fine lace and machine embroidery, with knowing touches in the way of sashes and little tulle bows at the neck and wrists. Airy black tulle bows with sheer white frocks are extremely smart, and with this white and black combination is carried a parasol of decided hue, like mustard yellow. Navy rose or saze blue. Buttoned white frocks of an airy character, though buttoned boots of buckskin are liked best with yachting costumes of a tailored nature.

Dainty wraps are a feature of all country club affairs this season. The comely and faithful linen duster motor coat of a few years ago has been replaced by extravagantly pretty creations of silk and landsdowne, with eccentric cut and trimming of shirring over cords. These coats cover the frock to the knee in the motor car and are graceful and smart on the club veranda when the sea breeze is chill in the late afternoon.

Togs Smart but Comfortable. Side by side with these Paris-built frocks and wraps are tennis, golf and sailing togs built for service, not style. Style aplenty they have, however, because of the good cut and the knowing way they are worn. Tennis devotees the year wear this cool shirt of white silk or batiste, open at the throat and plentifully plintucked across the front so that they give an effect of roomy looseness, blowing about as the wearer moves over the court. The white shirt is accompanied by a narrow, well-cut skirt of pique, linen or serge, white and navy blue, or white canvas or buckskin heeled shoes. After the game, a sweater or white Mackinaw, or a striped blazer coat is donned for tea on the veranda.

Some young women have taken to upholstering the beaches this Summer by adopting the charming tailored costumes of ordinary cretonne, such as is used for window hangings, bedspreads and Summer chair-coverings. The cretonne, in green, white, and a smart little coat of white eponge belted with green suede. Buttoned patent leather oxfords and green silk stockings and a green straw hat with a white veil completed the outfit. Another pretty girl, on the beach at Asbury Park last week, wore a tailor's rose-colored cretonne, with a wide sash of rose-colored silk and a bolero coat of eponge in the same color. Her buttoned boots were of white buckskin, and a black parasol echoed the note of a smart black hat and veil.

Ostrich feather buttons are still an ostrich caprice of the season. These buttons are really big fluffy pompons, which do not button to anything, but add much in effectiveness to the costume. A white gown worn at Belmont races recently was trimmed with these ostrich pompon buttons, and with ostrich ruching, the ruching being of white chiffon tulle. The gown was of white landsdowne, the chiffon tulle falling just below the knees. A velvet straw hat was matched by a violet silk parasol.

Paul Polret has evolved another sensation. It is the oddest negligee. From a back view there is nothing startling about the garment. One sees a drapery of white chiffon cloth, which is draped with crystal buttons, which falls from the shoulders to the ankles, beneath a gray little jacket of lace which reaches just below the armpoles. The negligee becomes strikingly Oriental. The little lace jacket separates over a chiffon chemise and a wide, draped sash of white satin, held by two red roses. The chiffon and bead drapery also separates in cutaway effect to show loose Oriental trousers of soft, white silk, caught around the ankle under bands of swansdowne. An Oriental turban of chiffon and crystal beads matches the negligee.

Health and Beauty Helps

Dolly: I know canthrox shampoo will make your head feel good and restore the former gloss and fluff to your hair and the color will then be rich and even. Dissolve a teaspoonful of canthrox in a cup of hot water and rub briskly as you pour a little at a time on the head. Blanche: Your blood troubles are not necessarily serious and I am sure you will find quick relief in Kardene. This lotion will not blow off nor spot like powder, nor can it be detected when on, as it really seems part of the skin. The regular use of the spumax lotion corrects the shiny, sallow, lifeless or aged condition of the skin and gives to the complexion that youthfulness so much admired. Its use will rid the skin of tan and freckles.

Ethel: No, dear, nothing will change the color of your eyes, but the coloring will stop if you put 2 or 3 drops of a crystal tonic in each eye a few times a day and you will be surprised at how bright and sparkling they will be. This tonic is made by dissolving 1 ounce crystals in a pint cold water, and it can do no possible harm. This crystal tonic quickly relieves the smart and ache of tired muscles and is excellent for granulated lids or to remove foreign particles.

Louise: Some physicians say over-fatness is caused by an unnatural amount of nutrition absorbed by certain tissues. The only safe way by

which this can be overcome is with the air of parrots. You can prepare your own treatment by dissolving 4 ounces parrots in 1 1/2 pints hot water. The dose is a tablespoonful before each meal. This treatment rarely fails and is devoid of danger or inconvenience. When you have taken off enough of the lines of the figure will be greatly improved and your general health will be much better.

Mary B.: Those ugly hairs on your face will quickly vanish after an application of a delatone paste, made by mixing delatone with water. This paste should be on the hairy surface 2 or 3 minutes, then removed and the skin washed. The delatone treatment is simple, effective and quite harmless, but be sure you get delatone.

B. O.: Your eye-lashes will grow beautifully long, silken and curly if a little pyroxin is applied nightly at last-rows with thumb and forefinger. Rubbing pyroxin on eyebrows will induce them to come in thick and glossy. Be cautious and don't get any pyroxin where no hair is wanted.

Lottie: That faded and "stringy" appearance of your hair will soon disappear if you shampoo occasionally with canthrox (see answer to "Dolly"), then rub some quinsol tonic into the scalp and hair-roots two or three times each week. The quinsol tonic corrects all unnatural conditions, such as dandruff, excessive oiliness or extreme dryness, and to faded, brittle, unmanageable hair will give a rich, natural color and soft fluff, so that doing it up will be a delight.

Gracie: I am always glad to repeat a recipe. The wrinkle-repover formula which your friend found absolute in its action is easily and cheaply made at home by mixing 1 ounce of almosol with 1/2 pint cold water and adding 2 teaspoonfuls glycerine. Stir and let stand for one day. To remove or prevent wrinkles, apply this vegetable cream-jelly thickly and leave over night, then wash off and with more of the cream massage thoroughly. I have found nothing to equal almosol jelly-cream to remove wrinkles and keep them away. It contains no fatty substances which might promote growth of hair. You will notice by its use not only your wrinkles disappearing, but the large pores of the entire face getting much smaller and the skin very soft and velvety.

FLESH-TINTED LINGERIE NOW FEMININE FRENZY

Problem Now to Find Flimsy Material, Not Transparent, for Petticoats—Reversible Idea Seems to "Take"—Poiret's Idea Most Oriental.

NEW YORK, July 12.—(Special.)—Flesh-tinted linings in yokes have become such a frenzy with feminine folk that the craze has spread even to lingerie. The latest nightgown is of thin batiste, with a lace yoke lined with flesh-tinted net. This yoke reaches to below the arms, and, instead of being attached to the gown under a ribbon banding, a garland of tiny, pale pink silk roses covers the entire edge of the yoke. The net is also looped up with pink silk roses.

White net petticoats, with ruffles of pleated net at about the flimsiest of this season's flimsy belongings. Such petticoats are designed for wear under evening gowns of thin silk and landsdowne, though fashion has not yet gone so far as to commend their use with transparent costumes. All petticoats, however, are as thin and soft as possible without being actually transparent—unless the wearer stands in a strong sunlight. Then sometimes the effect is rather startling. The petticoat now is exquisitely fitted, and is as narrow as possible, having a flounce of fine machine embroidery at the foot. Unless intended for wear with a sheer frock, the petticoat does not reach below the top of the buttoned bodice.

By this time, one has become accustomed to the idea of reversible shirt bosoms and reversible cuffs—though it is not an idea that appeals to the person of fastidious tastes. But what shall one say to reversible frocks for children? Such frocks are actually being offered in the shops now, and the salesperson will tell you that they are being bought. The notion of turning a dirty frock inside out, so that the accumulated grime does not next the fair skin of the neck and arms and body, is intolerable to most mothers; but that somebody is taken with this unspeakable method of economizing, is undeniable.

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soiled fold it neatly and tack the folds securely with basting thread. Then wash the veil carefully in soapy water and rinse it in salt water to set the color. Press the folded veil between a couple of heavy bath towels to get the water out and do not wring it at all.

When as much water has been pressed out as it is possible to get out cut the bastings and pull them out. Lay one edge of the veil straight on the ironing board and iron it dry with a moderately hot iron. Then iron each of the other sides dry and then iron the middle of the veil until it, too, is dry. By ironing the edges first the veil can be ironed without stretching or pulling out of shape.

Lay the veil flat on a bed for an hour or two after it is ironed. If it is ironed in this way it will keep its shape and will not wrinkle easily.
