WASHINGTON, July 19. - Senator Cummins, opening the tariff debate today for the Progressive Republicans, declared that the Republican party lost declared that the Republican party lost the confidence of the people and "was driven from power largely because it insisted on the maintenance of import duties, many of which were unnecessarily and oppressively high."

Superintendent of Bathhouse Responsible for Death of 11 Boys.


