Private Funeral Service Read by New York Mayor's Former Pastor. BODY NOW LIES IN STATE

Fifty Thousand Stand Uncovered as Procession Passes From Home in Brooklyn to City Hall—Monument is Suggested.

NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—In the rotunda of the City Hall, the scene of his years of labor for the municipality, whose executive he was, the body of William J. Gaynor lies in state tonight, his coffin draped in the white silken folds of the Mayor's official flag and watched over by a guard of honor from the city's police and firemen.

The Mayor's body landed here yesterday from the liner Lusitania and taken to his late home in Brooklyn, where private funeral services were held today, was brought tonight through a drizzling rain to the City Hall, from the steps where, less than three weeks ago, he accepted a people's nomination for re-election as mayor.

Tens of thousands crowded about the edifice and its approaches tonight and stood mute, heads bared and bowed, paying silent tribute as his body was borne into the building.

City Hall to Be Open.

The doors of the City Hall will be opened tomorrow at 8 o'clock and from that hour until sunset, or later, two separate lines of citizens will have opportunity to pass from the plaza in front of the building past the coffin on its bier in the somberly-draped rotunda, and on out through the north entrance, after gazing on the dead Mayor's features. On Monday the public funeral will be held in Old Trinity Church.

The private services in the Gaynor home were held two hours before the body was brought to the City Hall, the little gathering there including only immediate members of the family and a few close friends. The service, brief and simple, was read by Rev. Frank W. Page, of Culpepper, Va., formerly pastor of St. John's Protestant Episcopal Church in Brooklyn, of which Mayor Gaynor was a communicant.

Tribute Personal and Sincere.

The clergyman's tribute was personal and intimate. No one knew the man Gaynor better than the speaker himself, Rev. Mr. Page said, and his eulogy of the late Mayor's character and good deeds was a beautiful message of consolation to the mourning family and friends. The city had lost its best servant when Mayor Gaynor died, Rev. Mr. Page concluded, and later its people probably would realize this and do in this memory what the people of Cleveland had done in Tom Johnson's erect a monument to him. Promptly at 2:40 o'clock, two policemen stood at attention outside as the coffin containing the body of the Mayor was carried from the house by men and women, while departmental heads and members of the Board of Estimate, acting as escort, stood with bared heads. The funeral will proceed by way to New York across the Brooklyn bridge.

Loyal Tributes Overwhelming.

At least 50,000 persons stood uncovered in the drizzling rain as the procession marched to the City Hall. Eight automobiles following the hearse carried members of the Board of Estimate, Mayor Kline, Robert Adamson, the late Mayor's secretary, E. A. C. Smith, Commissioner of Docks and Ferries, and Police Commissioner Waldo. No members of the Mayor's family accompanied the body.

JAIL NOT FINE IS CHOICE

Judge Shows No Mercy to Men Who Insulted Woman.

Five days in jail, with no alternative of paying the proportionate fine was handed to John Madden and W. V. Lewis, youths who were charged yesterday of insulting a woman, beating up a conductor, and being generally disorderly on a Mount Tabor car early Sunday morning. Judge Stevenson fixed their bail on an appeal bond at \$250 each, Attorney Reeves, for the defense, having expressed a wish to appeal.

According to the testimony of Conductor Clarke and Motorman Powell, of the car, the boys made remarks at a woman who was alighting near the end of the line, and when the carman protested a general fight, in which Powell's nose was broken, ensued.

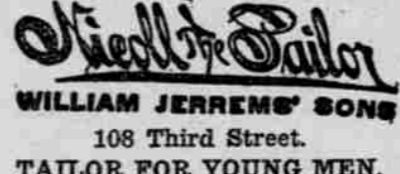

WOMAN FIGHTS FOR FARM

PAYMENT OF LOAN OBTAINED BY HUSBAND RESISTED.

Spouse Had Spent Money Given Him to Buy Seed and Borrowed to "Make Good" at Home.

OAKLAND, Cal., Sept. 19.—(Special.)—After fighting off three Deputy Sheriffs in a hand-to-hand battle in the barn of her farm at Hayward, scratching and kicking them after they had disarmed her of a shotgun and club, Mrs. Josephine Piet, who had successfully defended her property for three days, was taken to the county jail today and locked up on a charge of resisting an officer. Her bail was fixed at \$1000, which she was unable to furnish.

The deputies were seeking to place a \$500 attachment on three hayricks, when they were halted by a shotgun. They used strategy to induce Mrs. Piet to enter the barn, where they cornered and disarmed her. Then she fought them off with a club, which was taken from her only after she had felled two of them to the ground.

Mrs. Piet gave her husband \$500 a few months ago to go to Oakland and buy seed and farm implements. Instead, it is said, he spent the money in a good time, and came to San Francisco with an offer of \$500 to "make good" with his wife.

The money lender appeared at the Piet farm several days ago with a Constable and a party of catchmen on the hayricks, saying that Piet had not paid the loan.

BIG CHIMNEY COLLAPSES

One Killed and Great Loss of Life Saved by Holiday.

CHICAGO, Sept. 20.—A 100-foot brick chimney collapsed and fell through the roof of a foundry today at the Deering plant of the International Harvester company in this city. One man was killed and five were injured, while many others had narrow escapes. Hundreds of tons of bricks plunged down.

The injured men were working in the machine room, and one man was repairing the base of the chimney when the crash came. A heavy loss of life was averted by the absence of the great majority of the workers on account of the Saturday half holiday.

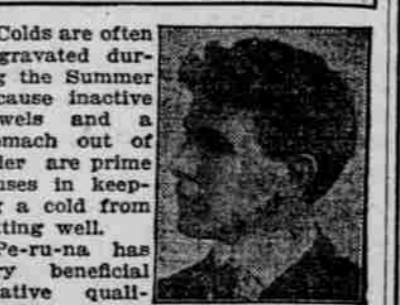

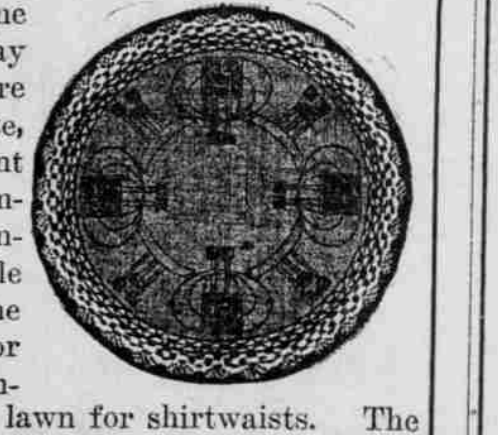
