

SULZER ADMIRERS GIVE LONG CUP

Enthusiast Cries "Hurrah for Next President" and There Is Much Cheering.

WIFE RECEIVES BOUQUET

Many Lecture Dates Are Offered ex-Governor, Chicago Man Heading List With Proposal of \$100,000 for Season.

ALBANY, N. Y., Oct. 18.—There was red-fire oratory and music by a brass band at the executive session tonight when several hundred admirers of William Sulzer called to present him with a loving cup.

A driving rain fell while the marchers were en route to the mansion. Sulzer started to shake hands with all of his callers, but did not complete the task.

The crowd pressed around him and refused to move. Someone said a few words of consolation to him, only to be interrupted by Mrs. Sulzer.

Mrs. Sulzer Not Troubled. "The action of the court is the least of our troubles," she said. "The crowd began to cheer. "We'll have you back next year, Bill," on man yelled.

Another enthusiast cried: "Hurrah for the next President of the United States!" Thereupon there was more cheering. Cheers for Mrs. Sulzer followed.

Chester C. Platt, Sulzer's secretary, read a speech assuring Sulzer that he had been removed from office if they do not obey the bosses. Mention of the name of Charles F. Murphy brought hisses. "Lynch him," shouted one man, at the mention of the name of an assemblyman.

The cup presented to Sulzer was inscribed: "To William Sulzer, a victim of corrupt bossism, October 17, 1913." Mrs. Sulzer was presented with a bouquet.

Tammany Charges Retaliated. Sulzer, in a speech, reiterated his assertion that his removal was due to his displeasing Tammany Hall.

"Had I obeyed the boss, instead of my oath of office, I would still be the Governor, and the 'organization' would be patting me on the back and telling the people that I was a second Andrew Jackson," he said.

"My condemnation by the bosses is intended to serve as a warning and a precedent to all who may follow me of what will happen to them if they do not obey orders but I believe my fate will have a good effect in the end and do more than any single thing I could do to destroy the terrors of corrupt bossism in the State of New York."

Roosevelt Letter Given Out. A letter which Roosevelt wrote Sulzer on October 3 last was given out by Platt. It was in response to one from Sulzer telling Roosevelt that on advice of counsel Sulzer could not permit a letter he wrote the ex-President regarding the case to be made public.

The letter follows: "I thank you for your letter, and I am sorry that I have to leave before your defense is made public. I wish it had been possible for you to write to me the letter of which you wrote, giving me the definite facts as to the effort of Mr. Murphy and his assistants to bend you to their interests against the cause of honesty and decency in popular government, and their promise of immunity to you from impeachment if you would cease your attacks on the men who have been guilty of misconduct and theft in connection with public offices, and if you would cease your demand for direct primary. Such a letter, giving me in detail the facts, would, of course, have enabled me to speak more strongly than I have spoken."

Lecture Dates Offered. Platt also gave out copies of several telegrams Sulzer had received offering him lecture dates. A Kansas City man bid \$10,000 for one lecture, a New Yorker \$30,000 for ten lectures and another New Yorker \$50,000 for 10, and a Chicago promoter topped the list with \$100,000 for a season. As yet the ex-Governor has closed no contracts for public addresses.

This was the last night Sulzer occupied the executive mansion. He will leave tomorrow morning for Cooperstown, where he will spend three or four days in a summer hotel owned by a friend. He will be accompanied only by Mrs. Sulzer. From Cooperstown Sulzer will go to the mountains for a few days, probably, and then return to New York.

CANDIDATES ARE NAMED

M'INNIVILLE PREPARES FOR CITY ELECTION.

Paving Question Chief Issue Before Voters in Metropolis of Yamhill County.

M'INNIVILLE, Or., Oct. 18.—(Special.)—At the city caucus last night for the nomination of municipal candidates the following nominations were made: For Mayor, C. Tibbitts; Recorder, A. C. Chandler; Incumbent, Marshal, Peter Peterson; Incumbent, Councilman, Ward 1, E. M. Briedwell, Incumbent; Ward 2, J. D. Mardis, Incumbent; Ward 3, D. H. Turner.

Of the 374 votes cast a third were by women. The ticket nominated last night will be known as the "citizens' ticket." The nominees favor more paved streets.

Mayor Vinton was placed in nomination, but he withdrew, and C. Tibbitts was nominated. This year the city opened its first set of registration books under the new law and of the 805 voters who have registered 448 were men and 357 women voters.

Another ticket is expected to be put in the field by petition. This, however, may only affect the offices of Councilman and Marshal. There are no political parties in city affairs, the line-up being more along the line of paving and anti-paving.

Nathan P. Spencer's Injury Fatal.

PLANS ARE GIVEN

Glynn Says He Will Play No Favorites as Governor.

CANDIDACY NOT IN MIND

New York's New Governor Profoundly Emphatic in Asserting He Will Not Act With View to Running Again.

substantial financial reform more than we need new sensations." Mr. Glynn would not discuss his appointments in detail. He said he had two or three men in mind for important positions, but he had not consulted with those men and had no idea whether they could accept or not.

"I may have something ready when the Legislature meets on Wednesday. I cannot say at this time." It is probable that the session of the Legislature may be continued through until the first of the new year without any interruption. Mr. Glynn said there were several questions requiring legislation and if the assembly and Legislature are ready to act he may call on those bodies for new laws. He was not prepared to say what the questions are.

Many Changes May Be Made. "Do you expect to reorganize any of the departments?" Mr. Glynn answered that in all probability many changes would be made. He was asked if the hospital and highway departments were the ones to which he would first direct attention, and he answered, "Possibly."

"The state has been agitated ever since the Roosevelt Administration with the so-called moral issues. Those are great issues with which to appeal for votes, but they should not be allowed to overshadow the matter of business."

"It is a great temptation to keep all these so-called issues, but I shall try to give more attention to business just at present."

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ROAD GRADE TO START

CONTRACT IS LET FOR BRANCH TO WILLAPA HARBOR.

Chicago Company to Build 42 Miles of Milwaukee Line—Work Is on Near Chehalis.

OREGON MEMBERS URGED TO UNITE

Concerted Action by Delegation in Congress Would Economize Effort.

MUCH TIME NOW WASTED

Chamberlain Suggests Weekly Conferences on Legislation and Department Matters Would Improve Results.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Oct. 18.—Weekly conferences of the members of the Oregon delegation in Congress are advocated by Senator Chamberlain, who maintains that the interests of the state, both in legislation and on matters pending before the departments, would best be served if the two Senators and three House members would act in concert instead of independently, as has been the rule for some time. When the regular session opens, if not before, Senator Chamberlain will bring forward his proposal of regular delegation meetings, hopeful that his suggestion will be adopted.

It may not be known in Oregon, but it is well known in Washington City that the Oregon delegation is not acting as a unit and has not so acted for several years past. Instead, each member of the delegation has gone ahead on his own responsibility. Duplication of work has resulted and much labor has been wasted.

It is well known around the Capitol that there has been little harmony in the Oregon delegation in late years. For a time, Senator Bourne and Senator Chamberlain worked well together, but they seldom, if ever, saw the House members, and the House members rarely, if ever, called on them, though Mr. Hawley and Mr. Ellis, in the lower House, always worked together.

Delegation Lacking in Harmony. The present delegation is no more harmonious in its action than was the delegation in the preceding two or three Congresses. The Oregon members of the House rarely go to the Senate for conference with Senators, and the Senators do not go to the House and of the Capitol to confer with Messrs. Hawley, Lafferty and Sinnott. Senator Chamberlain and Senator Lane, while working together in a way, often duplicate each other's work, and the same is true of the three Representatives. On state-wide matters Mr. Hawley and Mr. Sinnott work together, but Mr. Lafferty is almost a stranger to his colleagues and confers with nobody.

Senator Chamberlain believes that if the delegation would get together once a week or even twice a month, and discuss pending Oregon matters that are before Congress or before the Departments, better results could be obtained. The Senator is right. These Congressional delegations that are most effective are those that work in harmony. Even such big delegations as that from Pennsylvania have their conferences at stated intervals and by reason of this concert of action better results are obtained.

Effort Is Duplicated. As an illustration of how the present system in the Oregon delegation works, it may be cited that the Portland Chamber of Commerce, wanting Portland to receive a larger share of War Department business, will write to each member of the delegation, not mentioning the fact to any member that it has written to all the others. Senator Chamberlain will see the Secretary of War and find that Senator Lane was in an hour before him on the same mission. The Senator is right. These Congressional delegations that are most effective are those that work in harmony. 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Chicago Company to Build 42 Miles of Milwaukee Line—Work Is on Near Chehalis.

CHEHALIS, Wash., Oct. 18.—(Special.)—George W. Osgood, engineer in this city for the Milwaukee Railroad, stated tonight that the Guthrie-McDugall Company, to whom the contract was awarded at Chicago Wednesday to build 42 miles of the Puget Sound & Willapa Harbor Railroad, will begin construction just as soon as men and equipment can be obtained. Grading will be under way within a week near Independence, toward Chehalis.

The 42 miles the Guthrie-McDugall Company is to build extends from Maytown through Centralia and Chehalis to west of Doty, where it will connect with the work eastward from Raymond now under way by the Keasler Construction Company. Much of the work from Maytown to Chehalis will be track-laying, as the old Union Pacific grade will be utilized most of the way, and the only new grade shaping up, west of Chehalis several miles of difficult grade will have to be built. But this part of the road will go over as soon as the weather improves.

Construction from Maytown to Chehalis will be rushed as rapidly as possible.

SHIFT TAX BURDEN IS AIM

School Teachers Believe State Should Raise All Funds.

MEDFORD, Or., Oct. 18.—(Special.)—At the convention of the Jackson County school officers today, a resolution was unanimously adopted for the abolishment for the present of school district taxation, and favoring a form of taxation by the state, which would, in the opinion of the convention, secure a more equitable tax and allow districts which are now handicapped by insufficient funds to secure without embarrassment sufficient funds to carry on their educational work in an efficient and satisfactory manner.

Mrs. J. C. Pendleton, of Table Rock, read a paper on the school to a social center, E. F. Carlton, of Salem, assistant state school superintendent, gave a talk on school affairs. A general discussion followed concerning manual training and domestic science. Webster Beeson, of Talent, gave an interesting talk on school finances and methods of taxation which recommended changes along the lines embodied in the resolution.

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DOG MUZZLING ORDERED

PARK RECOMMENDATION MADE TO ST. JOHNS COUNCIL.

University Appropriation Indorsed, New Routing of Streets to Commence on Schedule.

ST. JOHNS, Or., Oct. 18.—(Special.)—In view of the appearance of a dog in the park, which has bit several children in this place, the Chief of Police has issued an order to dog owners requiring them to muzzle their dogs, or hold them on a chain or leash. At the last meeting of the Council the City Attorney was instructed to prepare an ordinance requiring the muzzling of dogs at all times. Mayor Bredeson, D. C. Lewis and O. J. Gatzmeyer, committee, have reported four selections for parks.

The committee points out the need of parks to provide for the future. The committee recommends that a special election be called to vote on the issuing of \$35,000 in bonds in payment for these parks at a time when no other issue is pending before the people.

At the last meeting of the St. Johns Commercial Club a resolution was adopted unanimously indorsing appropriations for the University of Oregon and opposing the referendum that has been invoked. It was voted to send a large delegation to the interstate bridge banquet which will be held in North Portland November 1, by the North Portland Commercial Club.

The Portland Railway, Light & Power Company is about to inaugurate the new routing of St. Johns cars around the loop, by making alternate trips, at the request of the St. Johns Commercial Club. For the present the same schedule will be maintained.

PAY FOR PAVING TIED UP

COURT RESTRAINS THE DALLIES FROM SETTLING BILL.

Linden-Kibbe Construction Company Involved in Litigation That May Last for Months.

THE DALLIES, Or., Oct. 18.—(Special.)—Circuit Judge Bradshaw granted a temporary injunction to Victor Marden restraining the city from paying a bill presented by the Linden-Kibbe Construction Company, of Portland, and enjoining the city from selling or issuing bonds for the purpose of paying the paving concern until further order of the court.

In his complaint Mr. Marden alleges that the contract for the bitumastic pavement, which was laid by the Linden-Kibbe people here this summer, was not awarded to the "lowest responsible bidder," as demanded by the city charter. Arguments to decide whether the restraining order shall assume the form of a permanent injunction or be dissolved probably will be heard within the next two weeks.

Judge Bradshaw has announced that he will call in an outside judge to hear the proceedings, contending he is not qualified to sit in the case, as he owns property abutting on the pavement which resulted in the controversy.

If the injunction should not be made permanent other suits will be instituted against the city and the Portland paving concern on various grounds, one being that the Linden-Kibbe Company failed to lay the pavement according to specifications and that it is defective.

Indications are that the city and the company will be tied up with litigation for several months. There are several dissatisfied property owners. An application will be made Monday to the Circuit Court to make several of the property holders plaintiffs to the complaint with Marden. The contract which was awarded to Linden-Kibbe totaled \$55,062.18. The balance due under the contract is \$36,883.35, according to the company, which also asks interest.
