LEWIS AND EDITOR DIFFER ON LETTER

Pindell Knows Nothing String on Offer of Diplomatic Appointment.

TWO VERSIONS ARE GIVEN

Illinois Senator Offered Russian Post for One Year Only-Peoria Millionaire Says Option Was With Himself.

CHICAGO, Nov. 8 .- A misunderstandng threatened to develop today between James Hamilton Lewis, senior in the States Senator for Illinois, and Henry M. Pindell, of Peoria, Ill., in connection with the publication of a latter, said to have been from Senator Lewis, offering Mr. Pindell the post of Ambassador to Russia, with the provise that he hold the profession only one year.

Mr. Pindell, who was certified to Washington by Russia teday as persona grata, said at his Peeria office that the published letter had never been received by him. Semator Lewis, while not saying that he had not written the letter to ar. Findell said: "If Mr. Pindell says that he did not receive the letter he must be right. I have with me no copies of my correspondence with him."

Time of Expiration Specified. In the letter which was published, Senator Lewis saluted the prospective Ambassador as "Dear Pindell," and offered him the post, with the provision

offered him the post, with the provision twice referred to, that he relinquish it October 1, 1914. "If you accept this position it must be with the understanding that you resign on October 1, 1914," the letter read. This was the sentence that attracted most attention when it was published.
"It was my understanding when I wrote to Mr. Pindell," Senator Lewis said, "that he should take the Russian post to fill the unexpired term of Curtis Guild, who had resigned. I think that would have been about a year, After the unexpired term of Mr. Guild had been completed by Mr. Pindell, the question of his remaining in St. Peters, burg would have been for the President to decide.
