TWO CHURCHES TO HEAR BISHOP COOKE TODAY

In Morning Methodist Leader Will Speak at Centenary Methodist, in Evening at Central Methodist, Albina—Church Notes and Gossip.

BISHOP RICHARD J. COOKE, D.D., LL.D., residential bishop of the Methodist Episcopal Church for Oregon, Washington and Idaho, whose residence is in Portland, arrived in the city from the East last week. Bishop Cooke, since the holding of the Oregon conference at Eugene, has been busy at the committee meetings in the East. He has been in attendance at the bishops' meeting, the home missionary committee meeting, the foreign missionary committee meeting in Illinois and also the meeting of Methodist men in Indianapolis. The bishop is rated as one of the foremost platform men in the church. He has a dramatic, picturesque style, which has caused some to term him the Edwin Booth of Methodism. For a number of years previous to his election as bishop he was book editor of the church. This meant that all the publications of the Methodist Book Concern, the largest in the world, were passed upon by him. He is conceded to be a scholar of the first class. Bishop Cooke will speak for the first time since his return at Centenary Methodist Church, East Ninth and Pine streets, at the 11 o'clock service.

The series of two Sunday evening services on "How We Got Our Bible," conducted under the auspices of the Christian Endeavor Society of the Sunnyside Congregational Church, opened last Sunday evening under most auspicious circumstances. A large and appreciative audience gave evidence of deep interest in this important subject and increased enthusiasm for today's service. Dr. Staub will review briefly the salient features of last week's address in addition to the subject, "The Old Testament Canon." The stereopticon slides on this topic include a large number of exceedingly interesting discoveries of antiquity. The five-minute addresses by Endeavorers so enthusiastically received last Sunday will be on "A Live-Wire Look-out Work" and "The Social Features of Our Society."

A. C. Linquist, of Alliance, O., an expert pipe organ builder, is in Portland supervising the erection of the beautiful tubular pneumatic pipe organ in the Universalist Church at Broadway and East Twenty-fourth street. It probably will be another week before the instrument will be ready for use, but the congregation and people of the neighborhood are looking forward to its opening recital after the manner of the Florence Mission Circle, of the Universalist Church, will hold its December meeting of the literary group at the home of Mrs. M. C. Winter, 2406 East Couch street, Montavilla. Visitors will take Montavilla cars to Couch street. The paper for the afternoon will be on "Mission Work in the Philippines," and Mrs. A. Wolf will be the leader for the day. All interested will be welcome.

The "Red" section of the Luther League, of St. James' Lutheran Church, will have charge of the evening services tonight. The league is divided into the "Reds" and the "Blues" in a friendly contest for members and points. The programme Sunday evening is as follows: "The Value of Bible Study to Our Young People," Miss Stafford; "Why I go to Church," Miss Mathisen; "What Is the Luther League Society of St. James' Church," Miss Pageley. There will also be short talks by Professor Frederick and the pastor, Miss Minnie Myers will sing and there will also be special music by the choir.

The superintendent's department of the Portland Grade Union of Sunday School Workers will hold their next meeting on Tuesday at 8 P. M. at the Taylor-street Methodist Episcopal Church. All superintendents and department superintendents are urged to be present.

The Current Events Class, a First Presbyterian men's organization for the discussion of the moral aspects of civic problems, will have an especially attractive meeting this morning in the church following the morning service. John Stevenson, Municipal Judge, will discuss "Municipal Problems as Seen from the Bench."

KANE'S REMOVAL PROVOKES

Governor Lister Says Action Unnecessary as Job Ends Next June.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Dec. 12.—Governor Ernest Lister in a statement issued today disapproved of the action of the board of regents of the University of Washington yesterday when they removed Dr. Thomas F. Kane as president of the State University. Governor Lister said that it had been planned for several months to obtain a new head for the university, but said the change should not have been made until the end of the school year. "I cannot see the necessity of requesting the resignation of Dr. Kane, nor of removing him, inasmuch as the term for which he has been elected will expire at the close of the present school year and especially as a successor has not been decided upon," said Governor Lister. "To secure the proper kind of person for that position might require weeks or months. Such a condition as now exists at the university cannot but disorganize it and result in less efficiency until such time as a successor shall have been installed in office. I do not think it is wise to place anyone temporarily in the position of president."
