REED PRESIDENT RETURNS. Announcement of New Faculty Appointments Expected.

President Foster, of Reed College, is to return to Portland today, after a six weeks' absence in the East, visiting various colleges and universities in search for men for Reed faculty. MINISTER REVIEWS WORK. Rev. Henry Marcotte Completes 10th Year at Westminster Church.

SUNDAY MAILS FAVORED. Roper Holds Non-Delivery Adds to Cost of Service.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—The law prohibiting the opening of postoffices and the delivery of mail on Sunday has added largely to the cost of the postal service and "materially lessens its efficiency," according to the annual report of Daniel C. Roper, First Assistant Postmaster-General, made public here today.

Mr. Roper suggested it would be in the interest of both the service and the employes to amend the law so as to authorize Sunday work and grant compensatory time off to employes assigned to Sunday duty.

The experimental delivery of mail in villages has been a failure, Mr. Roper reports, and he recommends that the service be discontinued on June 30, 1914. He recommends the compensation of rural mail carriers be changed from a mileage to an eight-hour basis, although approval to the operation of the eight-hour law is given by Mr. Roper.

The schedules of 60,000 employes have been adjusted to the law. It is suggested that the eight hours of employment within 12 consecutive hours might be better than with ten.

The report estimates that 300,000,000 parcel post packages were handled in the first six months of the system's operation.

HISTORIC GATES BOUGHT. Iron Work 200 Years Old to Be Replaced by Duplicates.

LONDON, Dec. 15.—A pair of early 18th century iron gates have been sold to an American purchaser for \$3500. The gates have stood for nearly 200 years at the entrance of the Royal Female Asylum, Beddington, Surrey. They were sold under the stress of financial needs on the condition that duplicate gates be supplied.

The identity of the purchaser is undisclosed.

SANDY MEN WANT RAILWAY. Commercial Club Delegation Urges Granting of Charter.

SANDY, Or., Dec. 20.—(Special.)—Casper Junker, Albion Meinig and Paul Dann, representing the Sandy Commercial Club, met the Clackamas Commissioners last week and presented resolutions adopted at the mass meeting favoring the granting of a fran-

chise to the Clackamas Development Company for a railway on the county road from Sandy to Boring. The Commissioners will decide the matter December 24.

The company wants to build and operate a gasoline railway. E. T. Ellison, president, and F. M. McKecknie, manager of the company, addressed the club at its last meeting and outlined the plans for the construction of the railway from Boring to Sandy. Besides Sandy, the people at Kelso and along the route are said to be in favor of granting the franchise.

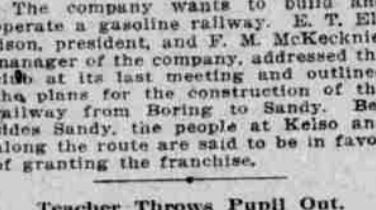
