

ASSAULT ON MOYER NOT TO BE PUNISHED

Witnesses Fail to Identify Those in Crowd, and No Indictments Are Found.

17 CITIZENS ARE CLEARED

Cases Against Numerous Strikers Accused of Assault Also Fail. Copper Mine Strike Situation Is Unchanged.

HOUGHTON, Mich., Jan. 24.—None of the members of the crowd who assaulted Charles H. Moyer, president of the Western Federation of Miners, in Hancock on the night of December 23 and then destroyed his residence, testified to the satisfaction of the special grand jury and a "not true" bill was returned in the case today.

George E. Nichols, the special prosecutor, decided that there was no law under which the men who are alleged to have forced Moyer on the train could be punished, even if they could be identified, and he so informed the jury. He presented the names of 17 prominent members of the Citizens Alliance, who were alleged to have been involved in the affair and sought their indictment on the charge of assaulting Moyer "with the intent to do him great bodily harm, less than the crime of murder."

Twenty-seven witnesses heard. The jury made a thorough investigation of the case, pursuant to special instructions from the court. O'Brien, twenty-seven witnesses, including Moyer and Charles H. Tanner and other federation officials who were reported witnesses, were examined. None of them, it is said, was willing to swear as to the identity of any members of the crowd.

The prosecution's contention was that W. P. Hensley, Peter Murphy, H. Stuart Goddell, John MacNaughton, R. E. Hackness, John Hickox, Ferdinand Petermann, Edgar Raschleig, James Wills, Harry Reed, Leigh Swift, Paul Swift, James Michels, Mart Hoon, William Dillie, Joseph Hodgson and John A. McAuley, of the townships of Portage and Calumet, Michigan, made an assault on Charles H. Moyer with the intent to do him great bodily harm, less than murder, by his great injury and against the peace and dignity of the commonwealth.

Moyer Says He Picked Three Miners' President Says Evidence Warranted Indictments.

INDIANAPOLIS, Jan. 24.—"I do not mind saying that I identified at least three of the men who took part in the attack on Tanner and myself, and both of us identified the assailants," Charles H. Moyer, president of the Western Federation of Miners, said tonight when testifying before the grand jury at Houghton, Mich. "If Tanner's identification of the men and my testimony were not sufficient evidence for an indictment, I confess I do not know what a grand jury wants," Moyer continued. "As to Governor Ferris, I am surprised that he expressed no dissatisfaction with the finding of the grand jury. I base this statement on the ground that, after visiting the district and seeing conditions as they really were, the governor asserted that he believed the grand jury would do its full duty, and that the strike would undoubtedly be settled if the agitators from the outside were not allowed in the district."

"IDLE ARMY" AT ASHLAND
