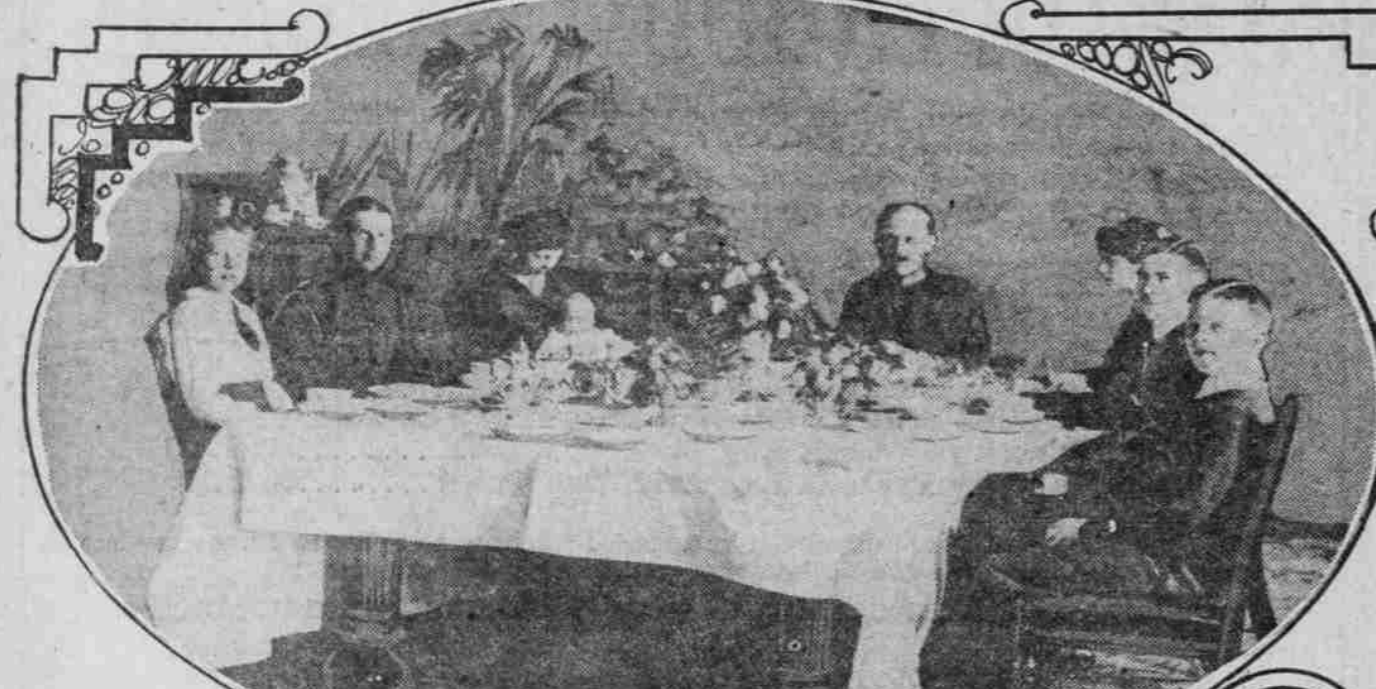
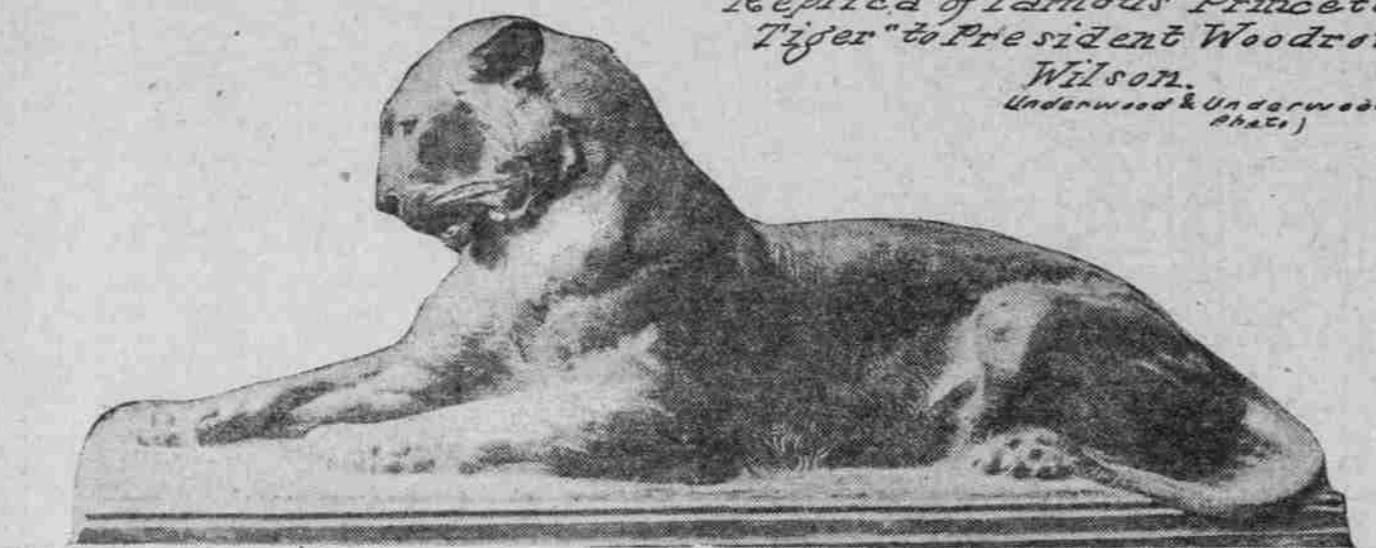

King of Greece and Family at Breakfast Table.

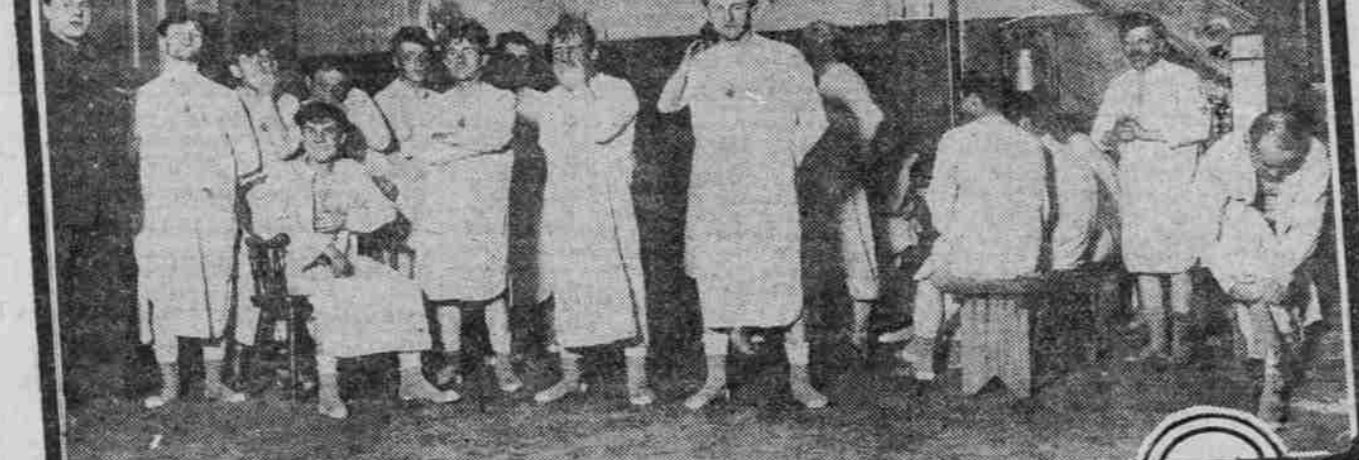

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—(Special).—The Municipal Lodging House in New York broke all its records for housing homeless men this winter. In fact there has been one record-breaking night after another. 1700 men and women were cared for one night this week. This does not mean that this number was housed in the city's building. Its capacity is a little more than half that number and it is not infrequently filled. But the overflow sent to one of the piers to be housed over night has been larger this winter than ever before. Superintendent Yorks says it is not because of the severity of the winter but because of the flocking to New York of men thrown out of jobs on railroads up the state. In point of fact this has been a rather mild winter in New York.

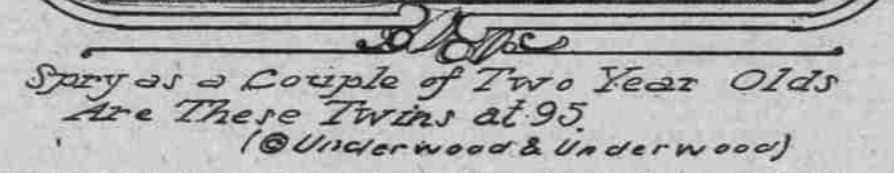


New York Lodging House—After the Bath.

The Municipal Lodging House a good many years ago took the place of the station house as a place for housing homeless men. It is a model institution. There homeless men of decency used to shrink from sleeping with tramps and human derelicts in the police stations. Any self-respecting man can now accept the city's aid in finding a place to sleep in an emergency. If he has as much as 25 cents in his possession he may not apply for lodging because that would buy him a sleeping place elsewhere and the city's lodging is only for those who are "down and out."

The lodging house is not open during the day, but in the evening a long line of men gathers in East Twenty-fifth street waiting for the doors to open. The line is admitted in single file and each man's "pedigree" is taken. The contents of his pockets are put away and a check for them handed to him at the end of a string which he can put about his neck. Then he sits down to a supper of bread and coffee, after which he is taken to the bathing room, where he strips. His clothing is put in a net bag and fumigated and is not returned to him till morning. In the bathing room he is required to take a good soap scrub under the eye of an attendant. Then a clean flannel night gown is handed to him and he goes to the dormitory. The beds in these rooms are of iron. They are in two tiers. Bed clothing is clean and plenty of it is supplied. In the morning bread and coffee and oatmeal are given to the men before they go out. A man may not lodge in the city's hotel more than three times. After that he is regarded as a vagrant and sent to one of the penal institutions. There is a section of the house devoted to women and children and many who have been evicted from their homes find lodging here till they can make arrangements elsewhere.

Knights of Columbus gathered in Baltimore and contributed \$500,000 to the maintenance of the Catholic University at Washington for scholastic benefit. The presentation was made in the form of first mortgages and bonds from a distinguished gathering of clergymen from all parts of the United States. In response to the presentation the Cardinal said, "In an age of spiritual unrest and despair you have renewed that miracle of faith."

So famous have become the "Princeton Tigers," which guard the portals to Nassau Hall, Princeton University, that the members of the class of '79 (which, it is said is the largest ever graduated from Princeton) have subscribed to the purchase of a replica of the "Tiger" for this sum, with the presentation to the most distinguished member of the class, President Wilson. This beautiful reproduction of the Princeton "Tiger" modeled by A. Phimister-Proctor, reputed to be the greatest living sculptor in America of animal life, and retouched by him after being cast by the Gorman Company, is on exhibition in the window of that concern, on Fifth avenue. The "Tiger" measures 22 inches from tip to tip, is 8 inches high from the brim to the crown of the head and costs \$200. Any graduate or undergraduate of Princeton University may purchase one of the "Tigers" for this sum, with the knowledge that every copy turned out by the factory will be retouched by the sculptor; to anyone who is not a graduate or undergraduate of the University, it will be as impossible to secure a copy of the bronze tiger as it is impossible for the proverbial camel to pass through the eye of a needle. The bronze is considered by connoisseurs to be the finest miniature animal bronze in America.

NEW YORK BOY SCORES SYSTEM OF EDUCATION AS IMPRACTICABLE

Youth Points Out That He Graduated High, But That Owing to Impracticable Nature of Knowledge Acquired He Is Still Without Position—Interesting Ticket Agent Railroad Case Decided.

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—(Special).—The present course of study, as laid down by the local Board of Education, is impracticable. This is a subject that has led to many discussions, but fresh interest has been aroused by the action of a schoolboy, who has taken up the matter before the newspaper. His first pupil has studied pottery and other manufactures. "We are feeling our way," says Superintendent Maxwell. "Vocational fitness is extremely difficult to determine." Workhouses Thought Wrong. One of the most picturesque figures in our new "business municipal administration" is Miss Katherine B. Davis, the new Commissioner of Corrections. She has been devoting much attention to conditions in the local penal institutions, and for one thing she has already satisfied herself that the workhouse system is all wrong. "It is absolutely foolish to send men and women away for a period of 10 days or under," she says. "In my opinion those convicted should either be

35 motorcycle men on duty, and it is admitted generally that these are the only class of police who can adequately cope with speeders. The claim is made that only 1 per cent of the accidents have taken place at points where traffic cops are on duty, and it is figured that more officers on this duty will cut down the accidents. During the year just closed 342 persons were killed by vehicles in New York City, and it is stated that fully half of them were due to careless drivers.

Railroad Can Demand. An interesting suit has just been decided against a railroad company, Municipal Court Justice Welles ruling that a railroad cannot enforce a larger price for a ticket than its agent asks. It seems that a man went to the New York Central office in this city, and bought a round-trip ticket to California and British Columbia. He paid \$108.45, but when he returned the agent wrote, explaining that he had made a mistake, and should have charged \$513 more. For the agent's sake, the tourist sent him the money, which seems to have encouraged the railroad man, who promptly replied by asking for \$9 more for berth and meals on the lake steamer of the Canadian Pacific. This time the tourist decided that there was nothing doing, and the next move was a suit by the New York Central. In his decision the judge declared that he was at a loss to understand how the interstate commerce act, which was invoked, could fix the price of meals on Canadian steamers.

In question, he expended \$50 in lawyer's fees, and was also out his time, so it would seem that it would have been cheaper for him to have paid the \$9 at the start and let it go at that. He has, however, the proud satisfaction of having won a legal victory, and afforded a precedent that may help other travelers who meet inexperienced ticket agents.

What promised to be a great legal battle, the Van Ness will contest, has been settled out of court. The estate is only \$600,000, and the parties at interest, after careful figuring, decided it would be another Jarndice case, and that all the cash would go to the lawyer in the end. Therefore they came to terms, showing that they have much more sense than the average litigants. Cornelius Van Ness, who left the \$600,000, was married three times. His first wife divorced him, and is now suing for alimony. His second wife died, leaving him a life interest in \$100,000 with the understanding that his death it should go to her niece. Then Van Ness took a third wife, and after he had passed away, it was discovered that he had given her the bulk of the property before death, and left her the rest. The niece kicked, most naturally, the first wife wanted her all money, and there were a few other little complications. Everyone admitted that there were enough legal points involved to keep the courts busy for years, and it would have been a feast for the lawyers. Now that the matter has been settled all parties at interest will receive something.

LOS ANGELES WOMAN DEFENDS MRS. STETSON

Attention Called to Recent Decisions and Arguments Favorable to Her Side of Question—Those Who Go Into Healing Business Censured.

I HAVE been deeply interested in the movement and progress of Christian Science, and the following article, written in defense of Mrs. Stetson, is based upon an unprejudiced view of the existing conditions relative to Mrs. Stetson's rights and the injustice of those who are in control of the First Church, Boston. As has been said, in matters of spiritual importance, it is well to get at the truth of things. In giving my views of the situation for publication I will also include statements from others who are looking on from the outside, among whom are writers whose opinions are worth while considering; in view of which it must be admitted, that not only her adherents, but those who have been most detrimental to the advancement of Christian Science. That the action of the board of directors is deplorable, is well established by the following excerpt from a publication written by an editorial writer of the New York Times, and published in that paper. "Those of us who view Christian Science from the outside, and therefore with impartiality as regards its factions, can plainly see that its present managers are of

heterodox beliefs and practices—that they have not kept the faith, but have made, in an effort to conciliate the negligible antagonism of those who do not understand Mrs. Eddy's doctrines, one weak concession after another to a worldly reason till now the system is hardly distinguishable from New Thought or Mental Healing." Result Declared Noticeable. That this is the case has been the growing conviction of all those who possess a clear understanding of Mrs. Eddy's teachings, for to them not to apprehend would be impossible. Following fast upon this condition are results already noticeable, one of which is clearly defined, that of the decision of the New Hampshire Supreme Court unfavorable to the trustees of the First Church of Boston, who have claimed should be turned over to them outright. In matters of spiritual import, justice reigns supreme, as it will in

the inevitable reinstating of Mrs. Stetson to her rightful place, not only as spiritual head of her own church, but of all the Christian churches. Any one wishing to be convinced of the truth of my statements will read Mrs. Stetson's book, "Reminiscences, Sermons and Correspondence," now in the hands of her publishers, G. P. Putnam & Sons, proving Mrs. Stetson's adherence to the teachings of Mrs. Eddy, and which is spoken of in the book reviews, as the most accurate, systematic and authoritative elucidation of the truths, principles and teachings of Christian Science that has appeared since Mary Baker Eddy's "Miscellaneous Writings."

Press Defense Explained. The press of New York City would naturally defend so distinguished a resident as Mrs. Stetson, but aside from all this, they are witnesses of her great work in the building of her church edifice at a cost of more than a million dollars, and what is of more importance, her remarkable demonstration of Christian Science, as taught by Mrs. Eddy, and by the healing of hundreds that have called upon her for relief. Those who do not uphold Mrs. Stetson, are they who are confused with the statements set forth at times by those who unjustly accuse her, or by those who, as she says, not apprehending the spiritual import of Christian Science, are unable to grasp her meaning. Mrs. Stetson's loyalty to Mrs. Eddy's teachings cannot be questioned, and the accusations to the effect that she aims at the leadership of the Christian church organizations are proved false by her words. "Any suggestion or question of a successor to Mrs. Eddy as the leader of the Christian Science movement, is one that could not be considered by any loyal Christian Scientist." Mrs. Stetson claims to be the spiritual head of her own church which she founded at the request of Mrs. Eddy, and her right to this claim no conscientious Christian Scientist can deny, at least there has been no just accusation put forth to enable them to conscientiously do so.

Reasons Are Told. My reasons for defending Mrs. Stetson in her claim to be the head of her church, and also her right to this acknowledgment of all Christian Scientists are, first, that she undoubtedly possesses the greater knowledge and a clearer understanding of Christian Science than any one who is at present actively engaged in the promulgation of that doctrine; and personally I feel honored that Mrs. Eddy considered her her most advanced and valued student. This becomes evident to all by Mrs. Eddy placing Mrs. Stetson at the most advanced position of her church, by selecting and appointing her to build and teach purely upon a spiritual foundation, than which, as she taught, there is no other, and I agree with the New York Times, in saying that it honestly believes that the wisest of Christian Scientists will side with Mrs. Stetson in this wily attempt at hand. As evidenced in her articles in current magazines, her pamphlets, and as before stated, her book, Mrs. Stetson must be acknowledged by all thoughtful readers and thinkers, as the most convincing writer of the day along Christian Science lines. She has been thoughtfully and carefully studied by called Christian Scientists for having permitted certain practitioners to occupy offices in the corridor of her church in New York. This privilege was accorded those in whom Mrs. Stetson had absolute faith, and was a tacit indorsement of their ability as practitioners, and a consequent acquiescence to those seeking relief. The censuring of countless ones who are registered throughout the world as Christian Science practitioners, practicing Christian Science from a material concept of a spiritual fact, would be timely and not ill-placed.
