Events follow each other in this production in such quick and rapid succession that it is impossible to describe the picture in all details, but for one hour it will hold the most complete attention there is no question of doubt.

Mary Fuller in "The Perfect Truth" of the "Dolly of the Dailies" series, tells the story of a young graduate girl who emerges from the simple life of the country village into the big and important life of a big city. The attractive quality of the pictures lies in the most remarkable series of character delineations of the people found in a small New England country village. In this respect it is a fine contribution and will be welcomed to lovers of real good motion pictures.

This, together with excellent music and splendid effects, will present an excellent show.

Owing to the possible need of troops along the Mexican border, the War Department feels it cannot send a full regiment to Alaska, but will recruit to its full strength whatever battalion is sent North.
