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




LOWER YELLOWSTONE FALLS
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FTER its mad plunge of 109 feet over the Upper Falls, the turbulent Yellowstone River hastens to its greater leap of 308 feet into the great declivity of the Lower Fall. The grandeur and sublimity of this creation of nature have been both the inspiration and despair of artists and orators. Below the Lower Falls is the grand canyon of the Yellowstone, which, while not so long, so deep or so wide as some other canyons, contains a more wonderful combination of colors and a more weird and interesting variety of sculptural effects. Both the falls and the canyon are accessible from the roads and paths of Yellowstone National Park and annually are viewed by thousands of tourists.
