SCHOOL TAX DISCUSSED

GRANGE COMMITTEE FINDS OTHER CITIZENS' METHODS CONFUSING.

Change of Present Plan Will Require Passage of Law Framed to Suit Conditions.

The committee appointed by Pomona Grange to frame a tentative amendment to the present method of levying school taxes in the Portland district has found that the method employed in other cities and states are varied and confusing, and of small value to the committee.

It was the opinion of the members of the committee that to change the present method of levying taxes in the Portland district will require practically an original law to suit conditions in Portland. Miss Willida Buckman, secretary of the committee, reported that she had received from the 15 school districts of the Portland area which includes their general financial plans and government.

It was the sense of the meeting that the plan of levying taxes in a mass meeting had outlived its usefulness, and various substitutes were suggested. In some of the larger districts the school taxes are levied by the Board of Education and then confirmed by the City Council.

S. F. Ball, principal of the new Creston High School, reported that the State Teachers' Association had endorsed the action taken to change the plan of levying taxes by a mass meeting. After full discussion it was decided to confer with other organizations in Portland which had attempted to amend the school laws and get their information and experience.

Mr. Ball said that to change the present laws in Portland and do away with the mass meeting plan would require a united effort on the part of all organizations and individuals. Chairman Peters was instructed to confer with John H. Haak and others who had tried to frame amendments in the past. The different reports received from school districts were distributed to the members of the committee. The committee adjourned subject to the call of Chairman Peters. A report from this committee is due at the session of Pomona Grange, to be held March 18 at Russellville.

WHITE SLAVE FILM COMING
