

## NEW SCHOOL WILL STUDY AGE PROBLEM

Woman Who Gave \$2,000,000 to Work Is Present at Dedication Ceremonies.

## SAVANTS STAND IN LINE

Study of Tropical Diseases Also Furthered by Gift to School of Medical Research of University of California.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 7.—(Special.)—Beginning with music by the University of California orchestra and ending with a reception to Mrs. George William Hooper, whose gift of \$2,000,000 made possible the inauguration of the work, the Hooper School of Medical Research of the University of California was formally dedicated today.

Mrs. Hooper stood in the receiving line and was greeted by the hundreds of guests, savants from every state in the Union, educators, physicians and surgeons and their wives, who had been invited to attend. Twenty-six hundred invitations were sent out, many men of other professions being included in the list.

Opportunity Is Described. Dr. Benjamin I. Wheeler, president of the university, presided at the exercises at the University of California Hospital. Following the invocation by Rev. C. S. Dutton, of the First Unitarian Church, Judge Curtis H. Lindley delivered an address on "The Value of Medical Research to a Great City."

Research Plans Made. In the reception line, besides Mrs. Hooper, in whose honor it was given, were Mr. Pritchett, President and Mrs. Wheeler and Dr. and Mrs. W. L. Perry. The plans for the research work, which were made at a meeting of the trustees of the Hooper Foundation, are for the study of tropical diseases and diseases of old age. For the time being this work will be carried on through the University of California Hospital.

## WOMAN HAS MARKED BILLS

Active Figure in Social Work Arrested for Extortion.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 7.—Mrs. Lillian May Evans, long a familiar figure about the police court and active in politics and social work, was arrested today with \$425 in marked bills in her possession, said to have been given to her by Mrs. Virginia Holland, who accuses her of extortion.

Mrs. Evans was recently expelled from Judge Lawlor's department of the Superior Court, where she was in attendance on the case of Mrs. Mary Vaughn, also accused of extortion.

Mrs. Holland's husband, a small merchant, was interested in a case of alleged swindling, which was decided in his favor. Mrs. Evans, said Mrs. Holland, asserted that she had "fixed" the case and demanded a reward. On the advice of Chief W. J. Egan, she was today, with the result that the arrest followed.

## NORMAL PLANS ARE MADE

Summer Classes at Lewiston to Follow Regular Term at Once.

LEWISTON, Idaho, March 7.—(Special.)—Immediately following the close of the regular session of the Lewiston State Normal School the second annual Summer session will open in charge of the regular faculty, assisted by special lecturers.

In addition to offering a quarter's work in the regular courses for certificates and diplomas for both graded and rural school teachers there will be offered all review courses and all professional courses required by law for candidates for third, second and first grade certificates and for state and state life certificates. Professional courses for the renewal of all such certificates will also be offered.

## INSURANCE PREMIUM TAXED

Kentucky Bill, Which Has Driven Companies Out, Becomes Law.

FRANKFORT, Ky., March 7.—The Glenn Insurance bill, passage of which by the legislature has driven foreign and domestic fire insurance companies to notify their agents to cease doing business in Kentucky, was signed today when Governor McCreary signed the measure.

The new law creates a state rating bureau empowered to determine insurance rates and provides for a tax of 1 per cent on all fire insurance premiums, the tax being collectible on the basis of the business of the preceding year. The money derived from this tax shall be used to pay salaries and expenses of the rating bureau in its work.

## PUBLISHER SERIOUSLY ILL

John Scripps, Suffering From Heart Disease, in Sanitarium.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 7.—(Special.)—John Scripps, of San Diego, a newspaper publisher with interests in many cities, including San Francisco, is seriously ill at a sanitarium here. For a year he has been suffering severely from chronic heart disease. He came north for treatment.

If he improves he expects to return to San Diego in a few days.

## Centralia Draymen Protest

The Centralia Draymen and City Commissioners endeavored to settle their differences at a meeting last night. ## IDAHO RATES PROTESTED

FREIGHT TARIFFS ON COAL SAID TO SHOW WIDE RANGE.

Interstate Commerce Commission Asked to Have Railroads Base Charges on Length of Haul.

BOISE, Idaho, March 7.—The Public Utilities Commission, of this state, has called upon the Interstate Commerce Commission to conduct an investigation into the freight rates charged on coal by the Oregon Short Line and Union Pacific railroads from the Wyoming mines to Idaho points.

It is alleged that the Union Pacific and the Short Line are charging at the rate of \$3.50 a ton for coal that is mined in Kemmerer, Wyo., to various destinations in Idaho.

Coal sells in Boise at from \$8 to \$8.50 a ton in the winter months and during the summer months from \$7 to \$7.25 a ton. Dealers declare there is practically no profit in the sale of the coal after they pay the freight rate of \$3.50 a ton and allow for the loss in transit.

## TIMBER CRUISE FAVORED

Idaho Tax Commission Opposes Only Incomplete Job.

MOSCOW, Idaho, March 7.—(Special.)—The Idaho Tax Commission is not opposed to the cruising of timber lands in this state for assessment purposes, as has been stated in the past, according to John D. Robertson, secretary of the Tax Commission, who is here today.

"He said the board is opposed only to a partial cruise, because the members believe that a fair and equitable balance cannot be taken unless all the timber is cruised."

"We are desirous of correcting the impression that has been given wide circulation in the northern end of the state," said Mr. Robertson.
